

MOSS VALE

Centred around the impressive
Victorian-era railway station, Moss Vale
is known for its gardens, walks and
shopping. The annual Agricultural Show,
one of the biggest in NSW, is a wonderful
old-style country fair. The main drag,
Argyle Street, is undergoing a revival,
with amazing homewares stores to tempt
every taste, and fantastic cafes, as well
as the retro-cool Bernie's Diner. Not far
away is cosy Mount Ashby Estate cellar
door and restaurant. The town's indoor
aquatic centre is open year-round.

MITTAGONG

Historic Mittagong has plenty to offer, from parks (try Lake Alexandra) to walks (such as the Box Vale Mine walking track with its incredible views of the Nattai Gorge), wineries including Marist Wines and Howards Lane Vineyard, and the treasure trove that is the Mittagong Antiques Centre. A highlight for artlovers is contemporary craft and design gallery Sturt. It's well worth a stroll along Main and Victoria Streets to see charming country homes, impressive gardens and to drop in on the cafes and speciality and vintage shops.

BOWRAL

Looked over by Mount Gibraltar, Bowral is the largest town in the Highlands. Full of historic public and private buildings, stunning country gardens and grand estates, this beautiful township is known for its antiques and homewares stores, as well as markets, galleries, bookshops and unique boutiques. Bowral's drinking and dining scene is heating up, with new openings like The Mill Cafe, Grand Bistro and Bistro Officina complementing stalwarts like Biota, Onesta Cucina and a raft of loyal local favourite cafes and pubs. Visitors and locals are drawn to landmarks such as the Bradman Museum & International Cricket Hall of Fame, and the many festivals, including spring's Tulip Time, the Bong Bong Picnic Races and the Bowral Autumn Music Festival.

BERRIMA

This picturesque 1830s village has history (think the heritage Berrima Gaol, the iconic Berrima Court House, and National Trust-listed Harper's Mansion); nature (the Wingecarribee River runs through it); fantastic food (there's Richard Kemp's Eschalot, as well as excellent cafes and patisseries), and Australia's oldest continuously licensed inn, the Surveyor General. The Schoolyard Markets are held on the



ROBERTSON

The small, character-filled town of Robertson combines a rolling pastoral setting (did you know the movie Babe was filmed here?) with fabulous fresh produce such as potatoes, truffles and pears; a famed cheese shop selling local dairy delights; and institutions like the grand old Robertson Hotel and the cosy Robertson Inn. The pie shop has long been an essential pit stop for those passing through.

BUNDANOON

Packed with old-world charm, Bundanoon is a vibrant town with cafes, tea rooms, restaurants, guesthouses, antique dealers and a renowned health retreat, Solar Springs. Market days, held on the first and third Sunday of each month (except Jan), feature fresh produce, handicrafts and plants. Bushwalking in nearby Morton National Park is popular, as is bike riding (bikes can be hired in town). The annual Scottish Highland gathering, Brigadoon, is held every

CANYONLEIGH

Made up of vast rural properties, Canyonleigh lies at an altitude of 700 metres and is fast gaining a reputation as a wine-producing area, known for shiraz, pinot noir, pinot gris, chardonnay and cabernet sauvignon. Situated on the drier western edge of the Highlands, it's nicknamed the 'outback' of the region and is a great place for kangaroo spotting and for a visit to the Birrong Suri Alpaca Stud to see baby alpacas (bookings essential).

FITZROY FALLS

The tiny village of Fitzroy Falls is surrounded by farmland and wilderness, and takes its name from an 81-metre waterfall in adjoining Morton National Park. The nearby Belmore Falls are equally spectacular. Head for the Fitzroy Falls picnic area for great views of the falls and for bird-watching opportunities – and the sounds of lyrebirds if you're lucky. The deck at the Falls Cafe is a lovely spot for refreshments.

HILL TOP

This northern village has a rich history as a former railway town and now gateway to Australia's

EXETER

The historic Tudor-style Exeter Village Hall and adjoining park and oval are the heart of picturesque Exeter, a village of leafy streets, neat hedges and grand rows of trees. Another local icon, the Exeter General Store, performs its role as bookshop, post office, gourmet food store and cafe admirably. If browsing is on the cards, you'll find The Village Pump Antiques next door. The Exeter Markets are held on the first Saturday of each month in the village hall.

BURRAWANG


Quaint and pretty, Burrawang boasts old-world charm, country hospitality and historic character buildings. The Burrawang Village Hotel, with its huge grassed area overlooking beautiful rolling hills, is a popular spot; as is the Burrawang General Store Cafe. The 1883 School of Arts building plays host to the town's annual ball and other events. Burrawang is also becoming known as a hub of creative talent.

SUTTON FOREST

It might be small, but historic Sutton Forest packs a punch. Along with heritage houses, churches and cemeteries, another attraction is The Everything Store, which is true to its name and a popular pit stop. The area's wines and cellar doors are making a name for themselves, and Montrose Berry Farm (you can pick your own berries when in season) and the stunning garden at Red Cow Farm are well worth a visit.

JOADJA

Joadja, a region of farms and beautiful bushland on the periphery of the Southern Highlands was once more an area than a destination. But the success of Joadja Estate winery, and more recently Joadja Distillery, built among the ruins of the historic late 1800s township that thrived there, is changing that. Owners of the distillery run heritage tours of the historic site, once home to 1200 Scottish immigrant miners and their families. **E**

This shop is heaven on a stick, especially if you love putting pen to paper or harbour an affection for greeting cards (guilty). Give yourself time when you visit. You'll want to browse because this is more than a just a shop. Behind floor to ceiling glass walls, watch work in The Press Shop, as Bespoke

Letterpress's ancient yet beloved presses get on with the art of printing. Each press was found in a varying degree of disrepair, before being refurbished and named by Alischa and Hayden. Creating bespoke wedding invitations is one of Bespoke Letterpress's real talents, and the team creates hundreds of handmade bespoke invitations each year, for brides and grooms the world over. Find that perfect congratulations/commiserations/ felicitations missive you have been searching for, and while you ponder the right words to write, imbibe something delicious from the stylishly designed cafe with fittings and fixtures from Schoolhouse Electric and Barnaby Lane. Every design element of this shop flows seamlessly. A bit like ink on paper.

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Escape Southern Highlands stays at a new five-star boutique hotel and finds a splendid historic establishment with a big future.


magic otherworldliness appears in the Highlands as autumn's first chill wind arrives. Trees blaze with colour, woodpiles are stacked and woollens unpacked as the rhythm of time resurrects an old friend.

Checking into The Old Bank is a bit like that. A new boutique hotel with beautiful bones, restored to the cycle of life. A grand former bank built in 1892 the Old Bank underwent a seven-year restoration. Walking inside feels like going back in time to a bygone era 125 years ago when Mittagong's streets were filled with horse-drawn carts, the 7th Earl of Jersey was Governor of NSW and Queen Victoria was on the throne.

The Victorian-Romanesque building with its towering ceilings, intricate rose cornices, wood panelling and grand cedar staircase was first used as a branch of the Commercial Banking Company of Sydney. The first bank manager, resplendent with handlebar moustache and felt hat, can be seen in the many heritage photographs that line the hotel's walls. He lived upstairs with his large family, and saddled his horse in the stable, now one of the hotel's two self-contained options in the courtyard area, and rode out to collect mortgage payments.

The building ended its life as a bank in 1970, and fell into disrepair. Restoration man and new owners Warwick Wainberg and wife Barbara Whitehouse bought the building in 2009. Its future looked bleak. A flock of pigeons was resident, and developers were circling.

'Warwick actually didn't mean to buy the building,' says the charming Barb, once personal chef to Kerry



Packer, who does all the cooking for guests. One-night stays come with afternoon tea, after-dinner port and shortbread, full breakfast, and a takeaway jar of Barb's jam, made from the cumquat trees outside in the sandstone courtyard.

'Another bank from the Victorian era had recently been demolished in Bowral, and Warwick was so upset,' says Barb. 'When this one came up for sale he couldn't bear to see the same thing happen, so he bought it.'


Warwick, a long-time farmer at Cayonleigh, and a former owner of Eling Forest Winery, worked with builder David Feld and other local tradespeople. Together, they breathed new life into the large twostorey building with its grand Victorian proportions. The finish and look they have achieved is lavish and elegant with every effort made to remain true to the period. The hotel has six luxurious suites with wood detailing, ornate drapery and shuttered windows. We stay in the Gibraltar Suite, with its sumptuously grand king bed and Egyptian cotton sheets. The designer bathroom, with its granite tiling, monsoon shower, heated floors and Australian-made toiletries by Biology, a welcome 21st century touch. We breakfast like... well, bankers... in the dining room with its views of Barb's eclectic tea cosy collection on the dresser, the orangery outside and Lake Alexandra in the background. Barb's yoghurt and mixed berry compote is followed by a full Highlands breakfast of bacon, pork sausages, eggs, grilled tomatoes and toast accompanied by jams.

We have only been here overnight, but it is hard to drag ourselves away. We will be back. Perhaps to enjoy dinner or to relax in the sitting room with its Chesterfield sofas, and enjoy another drink from the

original bank vault and its onetonne door, cast in London in 1852, which now doubles as the cellar and bar. The place feels like an old friend already.

endearing about staying at a place called Book

Berrima. If you know and love books you may also know this place was built on the success of books. The sixth inter-generational success of buying, sourcing,

Bendooley Estate is the home of the famed Berkelouw dynasty. Isidoor Berkelouw, a fourth generation book dealer and seller from Rotterdam, The Netherlands, came to Australia in 1948 to escape the horrors of World War II. He opened his first bookstore in Sydney in 1950 and became a pre-eminent dealer in rare, antiquarian and second-hand books. His son Leo began operating the family business from the historic 1839 Highlands estate Bendooley in 1977. He still lives there today alongside son Paul and his wife Katja, who continue the family affair.

Everything at Bendooley Estate is done with quiet good taste. Whether it is the newly renovated book barn situated up the poplar lined driveway from Book Barn Cottage, or the stone cellar door that sits quietly in front of growing vines, Bendooley is elegance personified. Book Barn Cottage is the newest addition to the Bendooley



estate. Formerly the gatekeeper's cottage, it has been extensively refurbished and is now available for weekend and short term lets. The first thing I notice when collecting the key is the key-ring: a tiny book attached to a string and the key. It is a nice touch. Inside the twobedroom house, the smell of wooden floor polish sits nicely alongside the aroma book lovers will recognise: that waft of words captured forever on ageing paper.

In the sitting room with its huge leather sofa, armchairs, and open fireplace there is a large bookshelf filled with every genre of book. There are also books on the mantelpiece and coffee table, each one telling its own tale of mystery, adventure, love and loss. To me a house without books is not a home. I settle in immediately.

The refurb job is beautifully finished. There is a large master bedroom with a king bed, designer bathroom ensuite and large French windows looking out over green gardens. The twin bedroom across the hall has two king twins and a trundle, and its own bathroom with shower and bath. Serenity toiletries from Byron Bay are a welcome touch. Sheets are fine cotton, carpets wool, the laundry fully equipped and roomy. The cottage comes with all the mod-cons such as an LCD TV, DVD and CD player and iPod connector. There is a compactly designed kitchen opening onto the sitting room for those nights when staying in and cooking feels right. French doors open onto a verandah with a BBQ and small table for a meal or a pre-dinner drink to enjoy the lovely autumn evenings.

Staving here is a very civilised affair. Sleeping up to five people, the property is close to Mittagong and even closer to historic Berrima and is a terrific launch pad for exploring the Highlands. Arriving late in the day, we welcome the teabags and coffee which are provided. A few other extra essentials such as milk, bread and maybe some local jam might also go down a treat with guests. But there is little to find fault with this place. My only regret is I didn't have time to curl up in front of the fire with a good book.





Q: Do you have to be a bit of a chemist to be a cheesemaker?

A: Yes. Cheesemaking is an incredibly complex science. What we do, milking a single flock of animals and making cheese, is the

most technically difficult of all. We need to work with the seasonal variations of the milk, allowing the nuances of the time of year be expressed in the cheese. After the ewes lamb in July and August, the milk is sweet and clean. It produces exquisite fresh cheeses like our Bloomy White, and our Fresh Curd. Spring milk is beautiful and consistent for cheese making. During summer, with its more diverse range of grasses, the milk becomes more rounded with a balance of fats and sugars. Autumnal milk like we are getting now is rich and creamy with a high percentage of solids. It lends itself beautifully to our Jamberoo Mountain Blue and Mezza.

Q: How have Farmers markets helped Pecora?

A: The story behind our cheese is not something you get off the label. The cheese that will be made in a year's time, starts today, whether it be through improving pastures, raising lambs or selecting rams. A cheese, on any given day, has taken years of development, breeding and farm improvement. It's a different proposition to a commercial block of cheese. Farmers markets, and collaborating with chefs is the only way to tell our whole story.

Q: You recently invited some of your customers to your place for a celebration. Who was there?

A: Our chef collaborations are really important to us. Especially the long standing relationship we have with James Viles at Biota, Bowral. We celebrated our fifth anniversary last year, with a long table lunch at our property, and our guest list read like the who's who of Sydney restaurants. Quay, Tetsuyas, Bennelong, Bathers Pavilion, The Bridge Room, Pilu at Freshwater and Rock Pool have all made beautiful dishes featuring our cheese. It's something we are immensely proud of.

Q: Where can we sample or buy Pecora cheese locally?

A: Biota and Bistro Officina in Bowral; The Robertson Cheese Factory, Robertson and a bit further afield at the Kiama Farmers market which is held every Wednesday afternoon.

Q:And finally, please finish this sentence 'sheep get a bum steer because ...'

A: Sheep have a strong flocking instinct which often makes them appear to do silly things. So ill-tempered sheep that aren't used to being handled are very frustrating and can do some pretty dumb things out of pure instinct. But a docile sheep breed that is well handled, particularly dairy sheep, is trusting, personable, cheeky and very trainable. They will come when called, remember faces and open farm gates and steel drums to get to feed.

The family meal

CELEBRITY CHEF AND LOCAL GEOFF JANSZ LOVES NOTHING BETTER THAN PREPARING A SIMPLE, WHOLESOME MEAL FOR HIS FAMILY. HE TELLS ESCAPE SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS WHY GOOD FOOD DOESN'T HAVE TO BE COMPLICATED, AND WHY THE SIMPLE MEALS ARE THE BEST.

he family meal... let's face it, is anything more potentially explosive? The kitchen table, more than any other location in the house, is the hallowed ground on which life-long memories are born. But family dinners can also quickly descend into battlegrounds: a figurative killing fields where tears are shed and wiped away, as we parents' come to first hear those dreaded words from our children.

What's that? I hate that. You know I hate that Dad. And you know, perhaps the ungrateful little sods have a

point sometimes. The other day when I was considering what to cook for those kids of mine still at home, it occurred to me my parents never cooked lobster for me.

Or scallops. Or foie gras for that matter. Nor did anything vaguely resembling dry-aged Rib Eye ever step foot over the entrance to my family home.

What I have come to realise through parenthood is if you want happiness to descend on your kitchen table over family meal times, don't sweat it stupid. Cook simple, nutritious meals you know the kids will like and eat. Like pasta with fresh seasonal ingredients and salads with ingredients picked straight from the garden. Save the gourmet fare for meals out without the kids, and restore peace to mealtimes.







WARM SALAD OF EGGPLANT AND TOMATO WITH FETA, OLIVES AND CHILLI

Serves 4

Here's one that is all about local seasonal produce, where the mighty eggplant also known as an aubergine, is king. Make this en famille and eat al fresco with loved ones.

Ingredients

1 large eggplant Extra Virgin Olive Oil (EVOO)
2 large tomatoes Finely sliced 1/2 red onion
Chilli to taste 1/4 cup feta
Enough sourdough for 4 12 Kalamata olives

Croutons

Char grill sourdough slices brushed with a little EVOO and sprinkled with a little salt and pepper. Keep warm.

Dressing

- Mix together 4 tbsp, red wine vinegar, 1/2 clove garlic crushed to a paste with some salt, 1/2 tsp dry oregano, a few grinds of black pepper, 1 tsp Dijon mustard, 1/4 cup EVOO and chilli and salt to taste.
- Slice the eggplant into discs and fry gently in plenty of EVOO on medium heat until lightly brown on both sides and the oil has been released. Eggplant is like a sponge, but upon further gentle cooking will release absorbed oil. Remove and drain on kitchen paper.

When ready to serve

On an oven proof platter (that fits in your oven) assemble the eggplant and tomatoes and warm through in a low oven. Just before serving scatter over in the following order: olives, the dressing, onions, feta and croutons.




The Fruits of ROBERTSON

Robertson is an area of rolling hills with mist like a Scottish haar that slips in, enfolding the land in a cloudy embrace. It is also a foodies' delight and is renowned for that most humble of vegetables, the potato and the spud farmers who have worked this land for generations.

Local families supply the Sydney market with varieties King Edward, Kipfler, Pink Fur and Dutch Cream, and every second Sunday of the month, sell locally at the Robertson Country Market. They are part of a wider community, working together to live and farm more sustainably.

Food/Produce

Robbo holds the record for the largest truffle ever found in Australia. Uncovered at Yelverton Truffle Farm by grower Ted Smith, the black Perigord monster weighed 1.172 kilograms and didn't take a dog to unearth it because it broke the soil, nudging above the ground. Yelverton opens its doors to truffle hunters in June to try their own luck. Down the road Pecora Dairy has built an enviable reputation providing East Friesian Ewes cheese to some of the Highlands and Sydney's best chefs (see our story page 38) while Robertson Trout Farm has put trout back on menus locally. Pick your own pears at



family run Chiron's Garden Nashi Pear Farm (see page 57); wash it down with a bottle of Southern Highland Springs naturally still water from a local spring 740metres above sea level, and if you're in town on Saturday morning check out Crop Swap, an initiative bringing local producers together.

Places to Eat, Stay, Entertain

Down the road at The Old Robertson Cheese Factory, sells a huge range of local cheeses including Pecora's four varieties. The food emporium also makes delicious gelato and sorbet on site. Crowd favourites include blood orange and salted caramel. Pop next door for breakfast or lunch in the cosy cafe. If a pie is more your thing, hightail it up the road to the famous Robertson Pie Shop with its 24 varieties of sweet and savoury pies or get along to Rockabella's Roadside Diner where Ely cooks up the best chimichangas and gluten-free food around. If organic food is more to your liking, Moonacres Harvest Kitchen serves up wholesome food picked right from the vines, trees and fields of their organic farm each morning. The Robertson Inn is Australia's last remaining fully wood-constructed hotel and offers great pub fare with space to hold private events. As does Wombat Hollow nearby which regularly hosts exhibitions, lunches, forums and private celebrations.

Finally, if want to make an overnight stay of your visit you are spoilt for choice. If privacy is what you seek, The Cottage on White Birch Farm offers rainforest walks while Laurel View, a classic farmhouse on a working farm has country ambience. If you are looking for something historically opulent, book into the Robertson Hotel. Deemed the 'most luxurious hotel in the Commonwealth in the 1920s' this historic location with its Gatsby-esque ambience, log fires and rambling gardens even has its own railway platform where on occasion the old steam train from Sydney pulls up at the base of the steps to the mansion.



ESCAPE EATS AT... BERNIE'S DINER, MOSS VALE

ESCAPE SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS **STEPS BACK IN TIME** AT MOSS VALE'S BERNIE'S DINER, AND CHATS WITH INDEFATIGABLE **OWNER IOANNIS BENARDOS**

One of the first things Ioannis Benardos heard after opening his American-styled diner in Moss Vale in 2013 was 'I give you a year, mate.'

He wisely chose to ignore the proclamation and last month Bernie's Diner celebrated its fourth birthday. Now a loved fixture, the diner is quiet on this early evening. However, pretty soon the locals will arrive with kids in tow and regulars travelling through to Sydney, Canberra and Melbourne will make the detour off the Hume Highway to eat

My dinner mates and I order Bernie's specialities: the Whole Kit & Kaboodle burger; the house-made beer smoked pastrami and corned beef sandwich; and a pulled pork burger with fries on the side. Mouths watering, we take our seats in a red leather booth to await our food, and look about.

Bernie's Diner is named in honour of Ioannis' grandfather Emmanuel Benardos, commonly known as Bernie.

Originally from the Greek island of Kythera, he came to Australia on a voyage that took six weeks and, like many Greek immigrants before him, decided his future lay in opening a milk bar. He opened his first business, The

Central Cafe, in 1925 and two years later moved to the site of his grandson's reincarnated version. The Benardos family ran Bernie's Cafe until 1958 when they sold the business. Black and white photographs on the walls depict Emmanuel's life.

Bernie's Diner channels decor from 1950s America. Ioannis spent six months on a US road trip and loved the formicatopped tables and swirling bar stools. There is something about Bernie's that takes you back to a lost age: to a time when burgers and chips were served in baskets, and giant ice-cream sundaes came with a glace cherry on top.

Full of hungry expectation, our meals don't disappoint. The Whole Kit & Kaboodle is as stupendous as it sounds on the blackboard: dill pickle, mayo, tomato sauce, onion, lettuce, tomato, beetroot, Angus beef burger, cheese, bacon, egg, pineapple and onion rings on a sesame seed bun. The pastrami sandwich, made from brisket cured in a salt and sugar brine and then smoked over American beechwood soaked in Budweiser is heaven, and my pulled pork burger made from free-range pork, slow cooked for nine hours and served with slaw on a sesame seed bun, is a triumph. A messy one but a triumph nonetheless. It is a nice touch when we learn all Bernie's meat is provided by local butcher, Maugers. Ioannis joins us as we polish off the last vestiges of a delicious hands-on meal.


'I couldn't be happier,' he says, grinning. 'When I opened, my ethos was simple. Cook simple food and smash it out of the park. Some people won't get it and I'm cool with that. But do what you love. Build it and they will come.'



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



Getting there

46 Sir Charles Moses Lane Off the Old Hume Highway, Mittagong In 1997 the family planted pinot noir. A grape favoured in Burgundy, France, it was unfamiliar to Australian wine drinkers. Today, sitting in Artemis' cellar-door with tasting bar, tables and stools handmade by Joseph from natives cleared for vines, Barb recalls the tough years.

'Twenty years ago we would go into local restaurants and say 'are you interested in taking any of our wines?' and people would look at us as if we were mad. Now we have people ringing looking for our wines all the time. Cool climate wines are finally having their day, which is so wonderful to see.'

With seven acres under vine, Artemis is hard pushed to keep up with demand. Its Pinot Noir 2015 is stocked nationally by Dan Murphy's, and recently won a silver medal at the Vienna International Wine Show. One of only a handful of Southern Highlands producers growing and making onsite, Artemis bottles between 5000-7000 cartons of wine annually. The commercial success of its Pinot Noir 2015 allows room for other wines to be produced such as the Close Vine Pinot Noir 2015 and Pinot Grigio vintages 2014.

'We are a small family business and to get a foot in the door at Dan Murphy's has been amazing for us,' says Sanne, Mark's fiance who runs the cellar-door, and with the help of Barb and a dedicated team has established a calendar of events at Artemis.

'Locals have also been incredibly supportive, and people are getting to recognise the wines and labels widely.'

Events at Artemis are well patronised. Taking place on the lawns in front of the vines, these include yoga mornings, open mic afternoons, wood fire pizza evenings and an active wine club.

The cellar door and lawns are also available for private events, and Sanne is considering events such as cinema nights and a Winterfest for later in the year.

Artemis also produces Sunshack ciders, BEE Mead, Australia's first sparkling mead and one beer a year, and has branched out into food. I spend a very pleasant interlude in the cellar door, which looks out over the vines, tasting wines while devouring a Southern Highlands Tasting Board. Jane Brabon, team member and former owner of the Bowral Cheese Shop, gives me the rundown.

'Everything was chosen to accompany Artemis' wines and showcase local producers of the Highlands,' says Jane.

The extra virgin olive oil is from Scarlett Grove, free range salami from Redleaf Farm, smoked pepper ham from Polish deli Nasz Stolik and the relish is made by retired Werai chef, Ian Morphey. Even the balsamic reduction is made locally, by Jake Warwick, a team member who works in the vines and runs the pizza wood fire oven on Artemis pizza nights.

It is a delicious feast for two and although I am only one, I put quite a dent in it, as I enjoy Artemis's delicious Sparkling Riesling 2015, the cellar door's first sparkling. Cold and delicate, with wafts of apple, citrus and honey, it is delicious. It's clear talking to the Artemis team that hard work and innovation is at the heart of this business. And the team is not finished yet.

'We are considering going down the wedding track as a venue for couples wanting smaller more bespoke weddings,' says Sanne. 'We already do a lot of pre and post wedding get togethers, and there is no doubt the amount of weddings in the Highlands helps us with that. But we'd also like to think it's down to the name Artemis is making for itself.'

Pob MacDonald, chairman of Burrawang Easter Market, estimates approximately 9,000 visitors showed up at last year's market and expectations are high for huge crowds again this year. Not that the locals are complaining. Far from it as monies raised go towards supporting great causes, the local primary school and The Burrawang School of Arts.

But in order to ensure the whole event doesn't descend into a logistical nightmare with the highway into Burrawang blocked and traffic into the hilltop village at an unholy standstill, much planning and foresight is required.

'The leg work is divided among many of the village groups,' says Rob. 'In the past few years the Hockey club has run parking at the oval in conjunction with the oval committee but the set up and volunteering is done by a wide range of volunteers from the community.'


2.30pm: Shop, shop, shop
