


Our writer Jane O'Connell learns the art of long lunching in spring on page 46, and local award winning

# OUR TOWNS AND VILLAGES

THE SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS IS MADE UP OF MANY TOWNS AND VILLAGES, EACH WITH ITS OWN UNIQUE CHARACTER, CHARM AND ATTRACTIONS. HERE'S A CHEAT SHEET SO YOU CAN GET ACQUAINTED WITH JUST SOME OF THEM. TO DISCOVER MORE, AND FOR MORE DETAIL, MAPS AND OTHER ESSENTIAL INFORMATION, VISIT DESTINATION SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS (SOUTHERN-HIGHLANDS.COM.AU).

#### BOWRAL

Watched over by Mount Gibraltar, Bowral is the largest town in the Highlands. Full of historic public and private buildings, stunning country gardens and grand estates, this thriving country township is known for its vintage, interiors, antiques and homewares stores and precincts such as Dirty Janes and Green Lane, as well as markets, galleries, bookshops, nurseries and boutiques. Its dining scene has become all the richer recently with the opening of The Mill, Grand Bistro and Bistro Officina, which complement winning stalwarts such as Biota Dining, Onesta Cucina, Cafe Rosso, Eccetera Trattoria Pizzeria, The Royal, Gumnut Patisserie and a raft of other local favourite restaurants, cafes and pubs. Visitors and locals are drawn to famous landmarks such as the Bradman Museum and International Cricket Hall of Fame, as well as the many festivals and events that include Tulip Time, the Bowral Classic and Bong Bong Picnic Races. And of course there is a plethora of award winning vineyards nearby, such as Centennial Vineyards, to visit as well.

## MOSS VALE

Centred around the Victorian era railway station in Argyle Street, Moss Vale is known for being a down to earth country town. The annual agricultural show is one of the biggest in the area, and recently the main street has undergone a revival with the opening of many independent artisan and homewares shops. Fantastic cafes and eateries such as Bernie's Diner, The Vale, Highlands Merchant and II Pranzo offer delicious eating choices, with newcomers Southern Highlands Brewing Kitchen & Taphouse, Birch and the Wine Mosaic Lounge bringing some well received glamour to old favourites such as Seafood Affair, and Briars Country Lodge and Historic Inn just up the road.

#### **MITTAGONG**

Historic Mittagong, the site of one of the first iron ore discoveries in Australia, has plenty to offer. From parks (try Lake Alexandra) to walks (the nearby Box Vale track with its incredible views of Nattai Gorge) to wineries (including Artemis Vineyard and Winery and Tertini Wines). There's also the treasure trove that is the Mittagong Antiques Centre, and fabulous craft and design centre Sturt with its shop, cafe and wood school as well as gem Twisting Vintage for preloved designer and couture clothing and the award winning café, The Shaggy Cow.

Stop off at Destination Southern Highlands Welcome Centre on the way into Mittagong and get informed about what's on locally.

#### **EXETER**

The historic Exeter Village Hall and adjoining park and oval lie at the heart of picturesque Exeter, a village of leafy streets and grand rows of trees. Exeter General Store performs its role as bookshop, post office, gourmet cafe and food store admirably. If browsing is on the cards, you'll find The Village Pump Antiques is worth a look. The Exeter village markets are held on the first Saturday of each month in the grounds of the village oval.

#### **BURRAWANG**

Quaint and historical, Burrawang boasts old world charm, country hospitality and one of the best NAPLAN achieving primary schools in New South Wales. The newly renovated Burrawang Village Hotel, with its huge grassy lawns overlooking rolling hills, is a popular accommodation and dining spot. As is the award winning Burrawang General Store Cafe across the road, with its great food served all day long and restored self contained accommodation. The 1883 School of Arts building in the main Hoddle Street plays host to the village's annual ball and don't miss the village's Easter markets, which are a highlight of the Highlands market calendar and attract more than 10,000 visitors.

#### **SUTTON FOREST**

It might be small but Sutton Forest has stuff going on with Montrose Berry Farm, where you can pick your own berries in summer, The Everything Store, which lives up to its name, and the stunning Red Cow Farm gardens with its recently opened seasonal garden shop, definitely worth a visit or two.

#### **BERRIMA**

This pretty 1830s village has history (the heritage Old Berrima Gaol, iconic Berrima Courthouse and National Trust listed Harper's Mansion); nature (the Wingecarribee River runs through it); fantastic food (Eschalot, Josh's Cafe and Feast at Berrima, plus excellent patisseries, cafes, local makers and artisans) as well as Australia's oldest continuously licensed inn, the Surveyor General. The Berrima Schoolyard Market is held on the fourth Sunday of every month from February to November in the grounds of the local primary school

## HILL TOP

This northern village has a rich history as a former railway town and is now gateway to Australia's largest rail museum, Trainworks at Thirlmere.

Don't miss the exhilarating Cave Creek walking track too.

#### ALDAOL

An area of farms and bushland on the periphery of the Southern Highlands, Joadja is steeped in history, once home to more than 1000 Scottish immigrants who mined shale oil in the late 1800s. The success of Joadja Estate winery, and more recently Joadja Distillery, has firmly put Joadja on the map.

## **CANYONLEIGH**

Made up of large rural properties, Canyonleigh lies at an altitude of 700 metres and is fast gaining a reputation as a wine producing area of the Highlands. Situated on the drier western edge of the region, it is a great place to spot native wildlife.

#### **FITZROY FALLS**

The tiny village of Fitzroy Falls, surrounded by farmland and wilderness, takes its name from the 81 metre waterfall in adjoining Morton National Park. The nearby Belmore Falls are equally spectacular. Head to the Fitzroy Falls picnic area for great views of the falls and for bird watching opportunities – you'll experience the sounds of lyrebirds if you're lucky. The deck at the Falls Cafe is a nice spot for refreshments as is the nearby Fitzroy Falls General Store.

#### **ROBERTSON**

The small, character filled town of Robertson combines a rolling pastoral setting (did you know most of the movie Babe was filmed there?) with fabulous locally grown produce such as potatoes, truffles, pears, paddock raised eggs and award winning Pecora Dairy ewe's milk cheese. The Robertson Inn is a great place for a family meal, and the stylishly revamped Robertson Hotel is a luxurious launch pad for a night, weekend or week in the Highlands. The iconic Robertson Pie Shop has a huge range of sweet and savoury pies and is open all year round, and Crop Swap every Saturday morning at the Bowling Club is a great place to mingle with the local Robbo green finger gardeners.

## BUNDANOON

Packed with old world charm,
Bundanoon is a vibrant town with
cafes, tearooms, antique dealers
and health retreats. Market days are
held on the first and third Sundays,
and bushwalking and mountain
biking enthusiasts are drawn to the
nearby Morton National Park. If you
are overnighting or holidaying, stay
and eat at the newly refurbished
Bundanoon Guest House, or at tasty
DeliLicious down the road.





# THE ART OF GIVING

It's better to give than receive. That is the sentiment behind both Retford Park and artist Ben Quilty's latest projects. The Art of Giving is an exhibition from November 10 to 30 at the National Trust property, when reproductions of 19 important Australian paintings gifted by former owner James Fairfax to the National Gallery of Australia will return to the Bowral mansion for the public to enjoy. These include works by masters Fred Williams, Russell Drysdale and local John Olsen. See pages 97 & 110 for more information.

Robertson artist Ben Quilty is also giving this spring with the launch of HOME: Drawings by Syrian Children. Ben travelled with friend and Man Booker Prize winning author Richard Flanagan to Europe in 2016 to see first hand the desperate plight of families fleeing the murderous civil war

> in Syria. They talked to traumatised adults and later, as Richard recorded some of their horror, Ben, a father of two, encouraged the children to draw. From refugee camps in Lebanon, Jordan, Iraq and Greece, the children who have lived through eight years of brutal fighting drew planes dropping bombs, men with guns, stick bodies with red smudges and severed stick limbs. HOME honours their voices, and the promise Ben Quilty made that 'every child knew you would eventually see their drawings and so you could hear their voice, feel their story'. All proceeds from the sale of

this book will directly support World Vision's Child Friendly Spaces early childhood and basic education projects in Syria, Lebanon, Jordan and Iraq. Ben will speak about HOME at Retford Park on Saturday November 25 during The Art of Giving, and beforehand In Conversation with Jennifer Byrne at Centennial Vineyard Restaurant on Sunday September 23 thanks to The Bookshop Bowral (get tickets from the bookshop or indies.com.au/bowral).

# **PESS GANG**

Local dynamo Alischa Herrmann continues to spread her wings as she takes her Highlands print and design business global. The founder of Bespoke Letterpress, located at her flagship stationery shop and café, The Press Shop in Bowral, started her business in 2008 on vintage printing presses she was given and saved from the scrap heap. The clever businesswoman and mother of two has just returned from New York City's National Stationery Show, and recently opened another upmarket store in Sydney's The Strand. She is now the owner of five historic presses and two cutting guillotines, and Bespoke Letterpress stationery has 400 stockists around the world, including cult

fashion and lifestyle label Anthropologie. At Bowral HQ's The Press Shop cafe, chef Nathan West continues to gather fans with his organic cooking and a pantry almost entirely supplied by our local producers.

'Nathan's cooking is very creative but fresh and healthy with a strong use of local farmers,' says Herrmann. 'It's a big undertaking but we are proud to be offering a fresher organic approach to Bowral cafe food and living the "eat local, support local" motto.'

With the launch of new Bespoke Letterpress product ranges, including a kids' range, as well as launching into David Jones later this year, these are busy days for Herrmann. # Cheers to that

WINE LOVERS be aware that come September, the Southern Highlands will host the judging of the prestigious New South Wales Wine Awards for the first time. Expected to attract more than 800 entries from across New South Wales, the judging will take place at Cherry Tree Hill vineyard in Sutton Forest and will involve 10 judges and six associate judges from across Australia. It is a closed event but is a big win for our local industry, with our 25 local vineyards and 20 local wine brands. To make sure our industry can service the growing numbers of tourists visiting our vineyards and cellar doors (see our map on page

66), the Southern Highlands Food and Wine Association and TAFE NSW have introduced the Certificate II in Hospitality and Certificate III in Tourism – Wine and Events to equip graduates with skills in wine tourism, service, cellar door beverage tastings preparation and events planning. 'This partnership will answer the urgent call for qualified employees to work with local hospitality and events operators, cellar doors, visitor information centres, tourism attractions and any small businesses in the region,' said the association's president, Mark Bourne.

# FOUR, MOON, POST

Three recent very welcome additions to our foodie scene. In Mittagong, vegetarian, vegan and rawist Four Seasons Bistro is making waves with diners of every persuasion. Chef and owner Derek Hamlen (former executive chef at Milton Park) and wife Sue at front of house are vegans and vegetarians and responded to the needs of vegetarian, vegan and raw foodies in the Highlands. Open for breakfast, lunch, coffee and cake, and newly added occasional dinners (such as curry nights and

Saturday bistro nights), Four Seasons invites you to drop by and try Derek's matcha and pecan mufflings with a spiced red velvet (beetroot) latte, or for the person with allergies in your life, order one of their vegan and raw celebration cakes.

Moonacres Kitchen in Robertson reopened recently after a flash reno with a bakery, a fabulous prosciutto and cured meats viewing window, and a knockout menu to match. With chef Stephen Santucci (formerly of Vini, Surry Hills) cooking creative, delicious food grown by farmer and owner Phil Lavers on his organic treasure trove, Moonacres Farm, this is an award winning combination you must visit.

Not to be outdone The Post Office Cafe in Moss Vale opened recently after a two month refurb, serving brekkie, lunch and coffee. According to local historian David Baxter, the heritage listed Victorian building originally opened its doors for business as a post office in December 1891 and served the Moss Vale community until the mid 1990s. New owners Elianne Noble and Sumeet Bhatnagar have played up the building's traditional postal elements, with a full sized wall mural of a moustached postie by artist Annette Barlow bearing a postal satchel from 19th century. The black and white image was sourced from the National Archives showing an original Australian letter carrier from 1905

# FOOD & WINE FESTIVAL AT BRADMAN

Southern Highlands Food & Wine Festival has hit a six with its new home at Bradman Oval this year. The Don grew up in Bowral and scored his first century at Bradman Oval at 11, and with some of our local producers doing so well and smashing it out of the ball park, it's a lovely fit. Organisers are expecting more than 10,000 will descend on the two day festival, which will include pop up restaurants, food and wine tastings, and stalls with more than 50 local producers, including Eden Brewery, The Original Smoke and Spice Company, Farm Fresh Strawberries, The Backyard Picklery and Pomologist Cider. Adam Liaw is this year's celebrity chef, and will present two cooking demonstrations, using local produce of course, on each day of the festival. Liaw has published five Asian cuisine cookbooks and is host of SBS food and travel program Destination Flavour. In 2010 he became the nation's darling when he won the second series of MasterChef Australia, with more than 4 million (yes, 4 million!) people tuning in to watch. His victory remains THE

most watched nonsporting event ever

in Australian television history. We get

# FARM HELP

It's always sobering to remember that even amongst the affluence of the Highlands, local folk can face hardship too. Hats off to local stalwarts Bowral Co-op, Ashcroft's SUPA IGA Moss Vale and all the businesses, schools and P&Cs holding sausage sizzles, mufti days and buy a bale drives to help drought stricken farmers. If you are a landowner, you may not be aware that Conservation Partners Grants are available from the NSW Biodiversity Conservation Trust. Designed to assist landowners actively protect the ecological value of their land, these grants of up to \$15,000 over three years are given to farmers who improve the ecological value of their properties. 

## HAPPY BIRTHDAY CANYONLEIGH COMMUNITY HALL



# **PUB WITH GOOD CHEER**

IF YOU'RE AFTER A GOOD DOSE OF CHARM AND ATMOSPHERE, A NIGHT OUT AND A SLEEP IN AT THE **BURRAWANG VILLAGE HOTEL** IS JUST THE TICKET. WORDS **ALEX SPEED IMAGES ELISE HASSEY** 

art of my childhood was spent in sheep country in the central west of NSW. We lived in a one road village where Friday night at the pub was the highlight of the social calendar. Only problem was, with my dad being the local school's headmaster, the pub was strictly off limits for our family. So come Monday morning, as my classmates gleefully recounted Friday night's shenanigans, I was left to imagine what it was like at this mysterious place.

Which is probably why, more than a quarter of a century later, I feel an instant affection for the Burrawang Village Pub as I check in for a night. Located in the historic town of Burrawang, it's one of the few surviving pubs in the Highlands that hasn't been totally gentrified. Its first incarnation, the Prince Alfred, was built in 1866 just down Hoddle Street, and this newer version, an imposing two storey brick building, was built in the 1920s.

Its big wooden front door is heavy with history and as I go inside, the smell that greets me is warm and beery. For 25 years, the Burrawang Village Pub was owned by locals Ed and Julie Woolfrey but since last year it has been run by lessees Peter and Kate Dean, and Kate's father James Couche.

It's early evening and there are a few locals in the public bar enjoying a drink. Along the hall, Peter and Kate have put in a new kitchen and renovated the restaurant, which seats up to 40. Like the pub, it is open seven days for lunch and dinner, but for now I am shown to my room up the central wooden staircase.


'We haven't got to the accommodation renovations as yet,' Peter tells me. 'So the rooms are pretty much as they have always been.'



Perfect. For me that's all part of the charm. Upstairs there are eight rooms, all with a queen bed and one a queen and a single. I'm in Room 2. It is small and spartan with whitewashed walls, and sits above the bar. There is no television, WiFi or pictures on the wall, although a window does look out onto some of Burrawang's high end property (the median property price in June was \$1.3 million).

There is fresh white linen on the bed, a small leather couch and two matching bed side tables with small lamps. It reminds me of a priest's cell, and I like it instantly. I take a wander around the floor and poke my nose into the unoccupied rooms. All are similarly spartan with beautifully made beds and white bath towels. Just how I imagined a country pub built nearly 100 years ago should be.

Two separate shared bathrooms with showers, basins and loos are a dash down the hall. I turn on my electric blanket and small radiator and go downstairs to mingle with the locals. The newly added open fireplace with armchairs are taken by fellow guests who look like they are bunking down for the night. I take a table near the wood burning stove with my gin and tonic. Local potato and cattle farmers catch up at the bar. There is a television at the far end of the bar but no pokie machines.



pork and fennel sausages on the offing but I order a rump steak with chips and salad, and share the

fireplace with a couple of South American backpackers passing through. By 8.30pm I am ready for bed. I return upstairs and make a dash along the corridor to the shared bathrooms, which are clean, with good water pressure and securely locking doors.

Slipping into my bed, toasty warm thanks to the electric blanket, I am vaguely aware of distant pub mumbling and the gentle clinking of glasses. I sleep deeply.

A continental breakfast at the nearby Burrawang General Store & Cafe is included in the cost of staying at the hotel, but I go for an egg and bacon roll and a coffee, which is excellent. It goes down a treat in the historic store, which celebrated its 150th birthday in November (see our story on General Stores on page 54). With the pub still waking up from the night before, it is a clever collaboration between two equally loved Burrawang businesses. I return to the hotel to collect my bag. I have enjoyed my stay here, and plan


on coming back for a relaxed Sunday lunch in spring and summer, out in the lawn covered beer garden with its shady trees and views over the Highlands hills. Perfect spot for a garden party wedding or function.

I would definitely recommend this accommodation to groups of friends visiting for a wedding, or as a base for an affordable and comfortable few days in the Highlands. Or just to experience what a country pub used to be like, because nostalgia, even the imagined sort, is a powerful driver.

entry pin code at the ready, we were thankful for the smattering of discreet lighting guiding us to the Patrick White cottage, down a neat gravel driveway a short distance from the main building.

For lovers of literature, stepping inside one of the charming cottages is like turning the pages of a new book with a story waiting to be discovered. Each of the Grant McConnell designed hardwood timber huts, in configurations of studio, two or three bedrooms, is named after a legend of Australian literature, including Norman Lindsay, May Gibbs, Henry Lawson and Banjo Patterson. An information plaque inside our studio reveals more of the story, recounting Bendooley Estate owner Leo Berkelouw's meeting with Patrick White at their King Street Sydney bookstore. The writer paid Berkelouw £50 for a secondhand copy of his The Ploughman, and other poems, then ripped out the pages and binned what was left, wanting the collection of poetry out of circulation. The few copies that survived White's self imposed buy back scheme are now highly sought after by collectors.

Inspired by the eclectic and vibrant style of British designer Kit Kemp, the cottages ooze Highlands hospitality with timber floating floors of locally sourced oak and a striking mix of pattern and colour only an expert stylist could pull off. Mittagong designer Jennifer Gill creates drama with the upholstered bedheads and feature walls using fabrics from Christopher Farr Cloth (available at Ascraft in Australia). The Carnival Grass wallpaper in the Patrick White cottage has a sense of whimsy with giant green and blue flower pods offset by more restrained white tongue and groove panelling. A selection of artwork from the Berkelouw collection, including mid century hotel posters, ancient maps and agricultural drawings, has been thoughtfully put together to reflect the theme.

> Outside, a tiled verandah with a pair of elegant cane chairs is the perfect vantage point to gaze out over the paddocks, watch ducks splashing in the stream and take in the rolling hills beyond. The cottages are positioned for privacy with just a glimpse of neighbouring rooftops nestled into surrounding hillocks. Landscaping is natural and barely there; a small garden with a thriving rosemary bush borders the terrace and, in time, native seedlings will grow to provide more buffer between the cottages.

The bathroom is generously sized, with heated tile floors deliciously warm underfoot and an irresistible bath with a handy side table for a book or cuppa. Continue exploring to discover the walk in rain shower with enough elbow room for the lankiest of guests.

A 'petite kitchenette' beside the comfy king sized bed has basic dining necessities, including glasses, cutlery, coffee cups (but no plates) plus a selection of T2 teas, a Nespresso machine and a bar fridge. Next morning's continental breakfast of crusty bread, jams, granola, pots of yoghurt and freshly squeezed juice arrived in a basket at dusk. Other dining options include the Bendooley Estate restaurant for lunch, or a room delivered light snack for dinner. For a more substantial evening meal it's a short drive to Berrima or a little further to Mittagong or Bowral for dine in or takeaway.

#### Wine Harvest Feast

At the Wine Harvest Feast at Canyonleigh's Far Ago Hill vineyard, diners stepped through an Alice in Wonderland style door to an irresistible scene; a long row of rustic timber tables shaded by calico umbrellas and surrounded by vines ready for harvest. Platters appeared piled with food as guests sipped Far Ago Hill wines, grown in the earth beneath their feet. The quiet mingling on arrival was soon replaced with laughter and music as guests made new friends and fell further under the magic spell of the Highlands. Event organiser Amanda Fry from Wild Food Adventures is already planning next year's Wine Harvest Feast, with tickets on sale from mid October.

#### The Loch Berrima

The Loch Berrima has regular paddock to plate long lunches as well as special occasion events. Their King for A Day father's day feast offers a choice of shared 'royal' platters with local craft beer or a three course set meal. The Sparkling Spring lunch on Sunday September 23 is accompanied by a selection of local beverages (everything has a bubble), including wine, water, craft beer and cider. Chef and owner Brigid Kennedy believes it's the sense of community and genuine interest in sampling Highlands' produce that make their long lunches such a hit. 'A lot of locals come and make new friends, it's the joie de vivre, the enjoyment of loving where they live,' says Kennedy.

#### The Bowral Long Lunch

Hosted by the BDCU Children's Foundation, the Bowral Long Lunch is in its fifth year, with this year's event held at Centennial Vineyards Restaurant. Whilst still very much about a long leisurely meal, fundraising is front and centre. For the past four years, the proceeds have funded an adolescent mental health nurse at Bowral and District Hospital. With funding of that role now taken over by the state government, this year's proceeds will go towards an additional role. Restaurant chef and owner Robin Murray is in charge of the menu and as guests dine, a group of artists from the Bowral & District Art Society (BDAS) will paint in the restaurant's courtyard then donate their artworks to be auctioned to guests. Past Archibald Prize winner artist Cherry Hood is the 2018 Ambassador and will judge the artworks. If you love our fabulous kids, and art and great food, this is one not to be missed.

Also doing as much preparation as possible ahead of time, and selecting dishes that work well warm or cold, such as rare roast beef, baked salmon and large sharing platters. Why bees? We were inspired by watching the UK TV series River Cottage with Hugh Fearnley-Whittingstall, Being self sufficient really appealed to us. Did you grow up on the land? No, we moved here from Newtown in 2011. The hives came shortly after, although we were told by a local permaculture consultant that bees wouldn't work in the Highlands as it was too cold. Nevertheless, we took a punt and started with three hives situated amongst the orchard. How did you know your first batch of honey was any good, Deb? I remember Greg trying the honey and saying, 'It's really good!' and me thinking, honey is honey, it all tastes the same. If you've been buying your honey from supermarkets all your life, it does, because they want consistency; amber in colour, mild flavoured. So I dipped my finger straight into our honeycomb and it was a serious 'Wow!' moment. And then you won first prize at the Moss Vale Show? In 2015 Grea was keen to enter our honey into the show. We won first prize and the \$2 prize money. A few months later Greg entered our honey into the Sydney Royal National Honey Show, and we were so excited to win second prize, it took a few days to realise we'd actually received a first prize for our dark honey in another category for small producers. So how does it taste? The Bowral Dark has more intensity than our Amber and Light varieties, but it works and is balanced out by other delicious qualities that resemble Christmas cake and maybe rum and raisins. Why the name Bulwarra Bees, Greg? It's named after the street where Deb grew up in Sydney. Bulwarra is an Aboriginal word meaning 'view from lofty height'. Our property is on the south side of Mt Gibraltar, where we have 'lofty' views to Moss Vale. Is there a family history of farming or apiculture? No, all our apiarist skills were developed through joining the local bee keeping club (Southern Highlands Apiarists Association) and you can't beat YouTube sometimes. How many beekeepers in the Southern Highlands? Highlanders love bees! Since joining the Southern Highlands Apiarists Association in 2013, memberships have increased exponentially. We now have more than 60 active members. **Tell us about bees.** They are fascinating, intelligent creatures. They may appear domesticated, but they are independent and tenacious beings with a clear set of roles for each. Bees do what they do with precision. If the moisture content of honey is too high it will eventually spoil and start to ferment. Bees instinctively know exactly the right proportions, so the honey will never spoil. How wild is that? How big is your colony? We have 40 hives, and a hive is at its peak in summer with numbers in excess of 50,000 bees. What qualities do you need to be a successful beekeeper? Obviously you don't want to be nervous around the bees; they're a bit like horses in that they sense your fear. Bees are unrelenting and they don't give up their pursuit. Multiple stings are commonplace, so a high pain threshold and a calm demeanour help. Biggest challenges facing bees? Airborne contaminants. We worry that mining and land clearance will potentially bring an end to the honey industry here. Our region is producing some of best honey in the country, and we all need our bees to support agriculture. They are the world's pollinators. Where can we buy Bulwarra Bees honey locally? Bowral Markets on the second Saturday of each month, and Mrs Old Bucks Pantry in Berrima. We also do a dessert mead; Damsel which you can try at Bendooley Estate, and on tap at Southern Highlands Brewing & Taphouse, Moss Vale. We also make a Cough Serum and recently released our 2018 Creamed Honey. What can we personally do to help bees thrive? Look for alternatives to the herbicide glyphosate. Try to source a nonsystemic herbicide based on pine oil, vinegar and clove oil. These are safe to bees. Are bees busy Deb? Spring is a time of rapid increase for bees, and heightened vigilance for beekeepers. We get several calls a week to capture swarms as people are increasingly aware spraying them isn't an option, an obvious win for the bees. What finally what do they love in our gardens? Purple flowering varieties are bee porn. They adore all varieties of lavender, salvia, stachys (lamb's ear), catmint, thyme and rosemary. bulwarrabees.com.au

#### Ingredients

- 4 pieces of salmon, skin on
- 1 tbsp Extra Virgin olive oil
- 2 tsp salt (don't worry we wash it off)
- Slight dusting of rice flour or corn flour this is a great technique to keep your salmon moist and intact and have the option of eating a crispy (healthy) skin

#### Method

- On a plate scatter all pieces of salmon with the salt, gently rubbing onto all surfaces.
- Cover and leave at room temperature for 30 minutes. Wash off each piece under cold running water and pat dry (thoroughly).
- Smear the olive oil evenly over the heavy based non-stick fry pan that fits all 4 pieces.
- Lightly dust the salmon skin only and lay skin side down onto the cold, oil covered pan and turn to low medium heat.
- The salmon will gradually start to sizzle... approximately 4-7 minutes.
- Keep cooking on this setting until the salmon looks 3/4 cooked looking at it sideways.
- Turn it over... the skin should be golden brown and crispy.
- Pop into a pre heated 180c oven to finish cooking, 2-3 minutes or finish cooking on gently heat in the fry pan for 2 minutes.
- Serve with the salad.

#### Fresh spring leaves with Rosemary Balsamic dressing

- 4 huge handfuls of young spring leaves... I have rocket, baby spinach and lots of mixed lettuce growing right now.
- 1 cup of tender young herbs, picked very young and 'picked' as whole leaves.

#### For the dressing

- Reduce 200ml balsamic vinegar with 100g brown sugar and 2 sprigs of rosemary on low heat stirring occasionally for 10-20 minutes until slightly syrupy. Not too much as it thickens as it cools. Strain off the rosemary and cool.
- Put 4 tbsp best quality extra virgin olive oil, salt and pepper to taste into a large mixing bowl, gently toss the greens in a lift, twist and drop motion so everything is lightly coated.
- Pile high onto a serving bowl or platter and drizzle over some of the balsamic reduction. Scatter over grated or shaved parmesan.

#### **Burrawang General Store Cafe**

**OWNER ERICA LEEMING** 

How long have you been in Burrawang? Three years, via Boston, USA How did you find yourself here? We love old buildings and believe that when a building has a purpose, it has a future. Was it a tree change or have you always lived in the area? We had been living overseas for a long time and our daughters finished their schooling boarding at Frensham here in the Southern Highlands so it seemed like time to move back to Australia. Was your store operating when you bought it? Yes, as a cafe, but on a part time basis. What role did it play in the community then? It was purpose built as a general store in 1867 and operated as one until the early 1990s. We love hearing from customers who have seen it in its many roles over the years. Would you call it a cornerstone of your community? Yes, locals catch up



here, we have a Knit and Natter group, and we provide school lunches for the public school across the road. We just want to operate a successful business that serves the needs of the community and, of course, visitors to the area. I'm also on the Burrawang Community Association committee. What do you sell and serve? Good food. All day. Every day. We are open 8am to 4pm seven days. Also newspapers, eggs, milk, homemade products, great coffee. We basically make everything on site except the bread we sell. We also have a great upstairs area where we can do afternoon teas, private dinners and groups, as well as garden lunches.

How do you feel about your general store? It's an iconic building that deserved a future and grounds this picturesque village. What would you say to people who have never visited you? You'll experience great food, stellar service and local wine in a 150 year old building that is enjoying a new start. BGSC 11 Hoddle Street, Burrawang



(pictured) is the oldest. She was manager of the store's post office at 17 when we first took over. Was it a tree change or have you always lived in the area? We've lived in Wingello since 2000 and really enjoy the village lifestyle. There is less stress, and everyone nods and waves. Was your store operating when you bought it? The store has been operating as a licensed post office for more than 100 years, and had a general store and basic cafe. What roles do you fulfil as general store owners? Post office, general store, café, restaurant and newsagency. We provide fuel and gas refills, banking, local produce, business college training for many of the young people in the village. We are a local employer, a local news source via our newsletter and noticeboard, a free lending library and local centre of information (not gossip). Do you see yourself as a cornerstone of your community? Definitely. We open every day and provide essential services. During the last bushfire emergency, when the Hume Highway was cut off and all traffic was diverted past us, we remained open until the crisis passed. Without the Wingello Village Store, there would be a core missing from the community. Being a post office and newsagency where people need to visit, it is inevitable that locals will interact. What do you sell and serve? All our staff are barista trained and we concentrate on simply good food. If you want a breakfast made from local bacon, bread and free range eggs, where everything is fresh, preservative free, tasty and simply done right, that is what we do. We try to source our produce locally. The meat for our patties is sourced from Wingello farms through Marulan Meats, eggs are free range, bacon and other meat is all real (not processed) from Marulan Meats, great bread and pies from Goulburn's Bryant's Bakery, vegetables from Bowral suppliers. Staff are all local, too. What would you say to people who have never visited you? Wingello is like a blast from the past with friendly service, comfy facilities and honest food, coupled with modern systems and features. Our store really is different to many others. We are a bit of an everything store.

#### **Berrima General Store & Cafe**

OWNER DIEGO ARATA

How long have you been at your general store? A year and a half. Was it a tree change? Yes, I lived in Sydney for two years and then Canberra for four years after moving to Australia from Modena, Italy. But I've always loved Berrima. Was your store operating when you bought it? Yes, but it opened and closed a few times in the five years before I arrived. Now I feel I have a strong relationships with the local Highlanders. What roles do you and your store fulfil? Chef, trouble solver, trouble maker, and all that. What do you sell and serve? Local produce, take away meals, all day menu breakfast and lunch. What are your best sellers? Shakshuka (baked eggs with capsicum, tomato, cumin, coriander and sauce, finishing with goat's cheese, dukkha and smoked paprika) is our menu best seller. Our lasagne, porchetta and tiramisu are also loved by locals. Favourite local producers? Rush Roasting Co, Taluca Park free range eggs, Living Earth Farm, Angela Dunollie Rare & Heritage Poultry, The Good Garlic Guy, Cuttaway Creek Jams, Currawong Creek extra virgin olives oils. Everyone has been very supportive since my first day. What do you hope you bring to the community? I can't really hope for much more to be honest. I am very happy already. I feel I have great relationships with local businesses, my customers and suppliers. I see great support between us, which I think is the key to growing a small town like Berrima. What do you say to people who have never visited your general store? Berrima has a great energy and if I've cooked a 25kg porchetta from Frank at Taluca Park overnight, it's your lucky day. We serve it with homemade focaccia and you don't want to miss it. BGSC 13 Old Hume Highway, Berrima

#### **Exeter General Store**

OWNERS LAUREN AND CRAIG JOHNSON

How long have you been at your general store? 10 years. How did you become owners? In 2007 we married in Exeter at Lauren's parents' property. The store was for sale and on our honeymoon we decided now was the time to become small business owners. We moved from Canberra, bought the Exeter General Store and were pregnant with our first son, Hamish, all in six months. What role does the store play in your community? The store's been central to our village's life for over a century. We have sought to maintain its heritage and evolution with the cafe, which has become a food and coffee destination for visitors and locals. The store is very much a hub. Lots of regulars come in daily to collect their mail and, with an older population, particularly in a rural area, helping give people a place and a reason to connect is something we enjoy immensely. What roles do you fulfil as general store owners? Back when we started, we were on the cafe floor all day, every day from open until close. As the business and team has grown (we now employ 22) our roles have inevitably changed to focus more on supporting and training our people, and to provide a consistently good experience for our guests. We are still very much hands on. Living and working in Exeter has also allowed us the flexibility to be involved as kids' soccer coaches, and involved in the P&C and the Exeter Fire Brigade. What do you sell and serve? Coffee is our biggest seller, and we serve breakfast and lunch seven days a week, from traditional favourites like pasta, pies and burgers, to recent additions like bowl foods and modern salads. We have walls lined with secondhand books for browsing and sale, along with plenty of gourmet food products and local produce. We also stock daily essentials such as milk and bread. Our post office provides banking facilities

and mail services. What are some of the specialities or special events you offer? In winter, customers love our whisky porridge with chai poached pears. Our bowl food has proven to be very popular also. As are our fresh daily scones with beautiful mixed berry jam. Please share some of your favourite suppliers... Exeter locals Taluca Park free range eggs, Morphy's Provisions condiments, Country Valley milk, Bougies de Luxe candles, Sutton Forest Olives, Alpine Berry Farm and Highland Apiaries honey. We also support Exeter Public School through the distribution of their cookbook, Our Village Table. What would you say to locals and visitors who have never visited? We love living in Exeter. For us it is a throwback to how people used to live before life got too busy. The drive out to Exeter is a beautiful one, and once here you can experience a small part of true 'village life' at our store.





## **BOWRAL'S LITTLE SICILY**

ESCAPE SH SAMPLES IMPRESSIVE CONTEMPORARY ITALIAN CUISINE CREATED WITH PASSION AND FLAIR. WORDS ALEX SPEED

t 34 Jonatan Fontecchio, head chef and owner of Eccetera Trattoria Pizzeria in Bowral, is a young man with retirement already in his sights.

'I started at cooking school at 15, got my own restaurant when I was 28, and always said to myself that when I am 40 I will stop,' he says. 'Running your own restaurant is very hard work but you need to do that in this game to see the money.'

The mention of money has him rubbing together his forefingers and thumb in the classic Italian way.

'One day, though, I want to have a life, too.'

It's plain to see that Eccetera, a charming little bolthole in the middle of Bowral that often does up to 80 covers a night, takes up all of Jonatan's time. It's 7pm on a midweek night and the joint is pumping. There are people waiting to collect their woodfire takeaway pizzas cooked by fellow Italian chef Marco, and at a table near the front door three mothers and their five young kids tuck into pasta. Inside, every table, covered in butchers paper, is full. Young and old, families and friends, lovers, and strangers, it is alive with chatting and eating. Like the best Italian feast.



An attentive young waiter seats us with a cheery Buona sera! (good evening), a delicious glass of chilled Italian prosecco and a plate of olives, bread and balsamic oil. We look around. On the counter, jars of Eccetera's homemade orange and apple jam, and bottles of its chilli oil and balsamic vinegar sit for sale. A large map of Sicily hangs on the far wall.

Jonatan was born and grew up in Palermo, the island's southwest capital and port city, founded in 734 BC. It was once part of the Roman Empire, and then the Byzantine Empire for more than 1000 years. Rich in history, culture, art and music, Palermo also has its own distinct gastronomy, with Italian, Spanish, French and Arab culinary influences. The city is also famous for its ancient open air fish market, La Vucciria. Eccetera's menu, set out in the Italian courses of antipasti, primi, secondi, contorni and dolce, is inspired by Palermo, and Jonatan sources many ingredients from Sicily.

'We cook traditional Sicilian dishes that we want to be as authentic as possible,' says Jonatan. 'The pizza flour comes from Naples, the prosciutto from Parma, all our cheeses, tomatoes, sea salts and cured meats are from Italy.'

We are seated among terracotta coloured walls hung with baskets and chalkboards displaying the specials, and start with antipasti fritto misto cooked by sous chef Cicco. Calamari, prawns and zucchini dusted in flour, deep fried and served with homemade aioli and lemon. It is deliciously light and flavoursome. We also try sardines marinated in vinegar and then fried sardines Sicilian style. Like the carpaccio on the menu, they are a Palermo speciality. Super flavoursome, not fishy, and no bones because they melt away during cooking.

Jonatan grew up in a home where cooking was everything. His mother, Maria, was always the cook. Along with Jonatan's father, Mario, Maria spends six months helping Jonatan in the restaurant and visiting his sister Irma in Melbourne, and six months in Palermo.

'She gave me the bug, and the love of food,' says Jonatan. 'She was the starting point for me.'

The other inspiration was Giorgio Locatelli. Jonatan began working for the Michelin starred Italian chef in his London restaurant Locanda Locatelli in 2004. But after two years, Australia beckoned.

'I worked with a dream to come to Australia to have my own restaurant,' says Jonatan, 'because I knew this is a country that loves Italian food and welcomes young chefs, and where if you work hard you can achieve.'

Jonatan arrived in Bowral in 2007 and worked with the restaurant's former owners, Carmen and Antonio Esposito, originally from Naples. He bought and took over the running of the business in 2013. Jonatan added the pizza oven, got an alcohol license (although Eccetera is also BYO) and started making his own name.

'I was here for many years helping them out before they decided to retire,' explains Jonatan. 'They thought of me as their son because they don't have one, and they were happy to sell their business to me.'


Our primi dish, gnocchi al tartufo e funghi e crema di finocchio, proves the Espositos made a great decision. Truffle and mushroom gnocchi with a fennel puree and parmesan, it is a knockout. The punchy flavours of the truffles and mushrooms are balanced by the subtlety of the fennel puree, and the gnocchi melt in the mouth. We follow this star dish with ravioli of slow cooked braised beef, red wine, sage, hazelnuts and parmesan, which is beyond good. Then we finish with the classic Italian dessert, tiramisu.

It is a meal fit for a Sicilian king and queen, and is crowned beautifully with a chilled glass of limoncello, a lemon liqueur native to Southern Italy, zinging with bite. A local Highlands winemaker produces it exclusively for Jonatan, but he is not giving away any trade secrets. Which is a shame, because it is delicious. Happy and replete we thank Jonatan for his fabulous food and service, won over by the authenticity of Eccetera's food.

Jonatan's final words stay with me: 'I still miss home. The smells, the flavours, the daily markets of Palermo. But Bowral gave me the opportunity as a young Italian chef to help change the way Italian cuisine exists in Australia. Many restaurants here base their ideas of Italian cooking on 1980s Italian food. We still do fine dining here but every day we are trying to make it contemporary, too, for a new generation.'

Cin Cin to that.







# CLOSE YOUR EYES AS YOU SIP THE LOVELY WINE AND SAVOUR THE TASTY FOOD AT **SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS**WINERY, AND BE TRANSPORTED TO A VERY ITALIAN STATE OF MIND. WORDS JANE O'CONNELL

he beautifully restored red Moto Guzzi on display at Southern Highlands Winery is a nod to the Italian heritage of this Sutton Forest vineyard estate, and chief winemaker Eddy Rossi's eyes light up when we ask about it. The post WWII classic motorbike from a friend's collection is the same type ridden by Italian farmers in their vineyards in the 1950s and '60s, and makes a perfect conversation starter for visitors to the cellar door.

Winemaking is in Rossi's northern Italian blood. His family emigrated to Griffith, NSW from the Tuscany and Veneto regions in the 1950s, and Rossi has fond memories from frequent trips back of watching his grandfather make wine near Venice.

'Walking through the vines during harvest, there was a particular aroma of fresh leaves and fragrant fruit,' he says. 'I loved watching my Nonno (grandfather) crushing grapes into his concrete tanks, preparing for fermentation. The best part of all of this was sitting down for lunch with all the family laughing, and after a few vinos, breaking out with Italian folk songs.'

Rossi's original career plan was to study engineering, but after working in a winery lab after school and with childhood memories at the fore, he soon changed his mind.

'I would see these winemakers every day, always laughing and having a good time, and I thought, that's what I want to do.'

land was purchased in 1998. It has 30 acres of vines that were planted in 2002, which are all under cultivation today. Rossi clearly remembers the early days when they were excited to have a single visitor come through the cellar door. These days it's a very different story. 'Saturday is wine day,' he says. 'The number of people tasting wine is incredible. They flock in.'

The recently introduced five dollar charge for tasting is unusual in Australian wineries, but tasting fees are de rigueur in other parts of the world. With the cost deducted from any subsequent wine sales, Rossi considers it a reasonable business transaction that genuine buyers are happy to pay. Escape SH's tasting took us through the full suite of Oldbury Reserve wines, described as Southern Highlands Winery's pinnacle series.

'It's all estate grown, and we only select the best fruit,' says Rossi. 'We put a lot of time and effort into getting the best of the best.'

Their sauvignon blanc has long been considered a signature wine, but fashion plays a part and the trend now leans towards pinot gris, with the light to medium bodied 2017 vintage somewhat similar to the sauvignon blanc, but softer.


One variety that stands out for its point of difference is the 2016 Oldbury Reserve Pinots. A blend of pinot noir and pinot gris, it was created by Rossi to be rosé in style but using different grapes to a standard rosé. The result is light and fresh with lovely fruit flavours. Ideal for warmer months, but our group agreed it could easily be enjoyed year round. The pinot noir was a firm favourite in our tasting, described as having a 'graceful curvy ending' and a true sense of the Southern Highlands terroir. It's delicious.


Both Oldbury Reserve and SHW wines are made on site. Rossi also collaborates with other local wineries, making wines for both St Maur and Sutton Forest Estate with their own grapes.

Beyond wine tasting, Southern Highlands Winery has plenty to offer. The restaurant (Italian, naturally), under the supervision of head chef (and Rossi's cousin) Marco Salvestrin, serves up mouthwatering dishes including rabbit ragu with homemade gnocchi, paired with the Oldbury Reserve Pinot Noir, and zuppa di cozze (steamed mussels with chilli and garlic), a great match for their Oldbury Reserve Riesling. For insider tips, cooking classes are offered once a month with Salvestrin instructing in the kitchen and Rossi showcasing wines, and they're consistently booked out.

Another drawcard is their wedding offering, with a choice of indoor and outdoor venues including the Tuscan style courtyard, depending on the time of year and size of the party. Some happy couples travel from as far as Asia and Europe to celebrate their big day with the vineyard as a stunning backdrop. The marquee outside seats more than 100.

If you want to get your hands on a bottle of SHW wine, you can buy online or visit in person (the cellar door is open seven days). Rossi's wines are also exported to Asia. China is their biggest market with a strong interest in premium wine and Hong Kong is a 'good little niche market', making this winery a truly multicultural Southern Highlands success story.



### Susan Heslin, Painter, Berrima

In a sentence, please tell us about your work. My style is contemporary realism. My work is inspired by others in theatre, writing and music, as well as those mark-making in pencil and paint. We are born with a creative spirit that demands to be used, and it is up to each of us to use whatever talents we have to explore our own creativity. Who or what inspires you? Many, many artists. The great masters of the past, Raphael, Johannes Vermeer and John Singer Sargent being particular favourites. Also Jude Rae, Chris Browne, Francis Giacco, Euan Uglow and Diarmuid Kelley, a young Irish painter. You can choose to have any piece of art in the world. What would it be? I have a print of a painting by the American Milton Avery that I have carried from home to home and have never tired of. Why do we need art in our world today? If the number of people taking up painting today is any indication, the relevance of art to our daily lives has never been more important. Art provides many of us with a respite from the chaos we observe 'out there'. What does the Studio Art Trail bring to the Southern Highlands? The Southern Highlands has many people and friends who live their lives engaged in art. There is a great feeling of community amongst us all and that is important for everyone involved in art on a daily basis. Opening our studios and welcoming friends and strangers gives artists a time each year to engage with and listen to the comments of our visitors, who get a look into our private working spaces and seem to enjoy the experience immensely. The French post impressionist painter Georges Seurat said

### Philip Turton, Painter, Berrima

How do you describe your style? My style is known as tonal impressionism as taught at Julian Ashton Art School under Phillip Ashton. When did you decide to make art your life's work? You cannot 'decide' to make art your life's work any more than you can decide to be a rock 'n' roll star. It's in your life or it's not. What have you still to achieve? A painting I'm satisfied with, and can truly say, 'It's finished.' Who inspires you? Nigel Thomson taught me at Julian Ashton and I am still inspired by the way he taught. I also find Max Meldrum inspiring in his tonal control, and Robert Hannaford is to be admired for his great brushwork. You can choose to have any piece of art in the world. What would it be? Head of Capri Girl by John Singer Sargent. I'd hang it in my studio. Why do we need art in our world? I'm not sure why we need art but to imagine a world without art seems very bleak and dark. Art is all about light, perhaps for that very reason. What does the local artistic community mean to you? The Southern Highlands has a strong artistic enclave and it gives me great pleasure to be accepted as a part of it. Comfort and inspiration can be had from belonging to a peer group. The French post-impressionist painter Georges Seurat said 'art is harmony'. Do you relate to that? There may be harmony in art sometimes but there's also a lot of cacophony.

#### Del Cooley, Painter, Bundanoon

How do you describe your style? Expressive brushwork and paint application to create dynamic use of colour, texture, movement and atmosphere. What inspires your art? The Highlands' skies throughout the seasons are a continual source of inspiration, and also coastal and rural landscapes. Abstract expressionism and Turner, too. When did you decide to make art your life's work? At a very young age I loved creating art and then went on to art school in Melbourne, graduating in Fine Arts.

You can choose to have any piece of art in the world. What would it be? To say one work would exclude so many others. I'd like a collection, as in a gallery, and to bring out different works at different times and places. I could happily live in an art gallery, say the National Gallery of Australia. Why is art needed in our world? Art is a nonverbal form of communication. It allows the audience to connect through their senses and feelings rather than being bombarded with constant written and oral information. It provides an opportunity for greater selfreflection and deeper personal insights. Is opening your studio to the public confronting? I'm quite comfortable doing it. Some people engage in conversation, others simply enjoy the experience of looking at the paintings. It's just a nice thing to do. What does the Art Trail bring to the Southern Highlands? It provides an amazing variety of artistic expression; a smorgasbord of creativity the public can choose to explore over two weekends while enjoying the natural beauty of the Highlands.

### THE ARTS STUDIO TRAIL

Part of the Southern Highlands Arts Festival, the Arts Studio Trail was initiated and has been run by the Wingecarribee Shire Council for the past 12 years. This year the event, which runs for the first two weekends in November and crosses the Highlands from rural villages to larger communities, involves 40 painters, printmakers, jewellers, woodturners, sculptors, potters, bookbinders, textile artists, ceramicists and photographers, and more than 30 open studios. Jenny Kena, cultural officer with Wingecarribee Shire Council, said last year more than 6500 studio visits were made by locals and visitors, who spent \$46,000 acquiring works. ### Neil Boughton, Cermasist, Robertson

How do you describe your style? Style is not something that I closely consider as I work intuitively borrowing ideas from many sources including Japanese and Western Neo-classical traditions. What inspires your art? Looking at the sky on a clear moonless night, seeing the stars and knowing that we are made of the same stuff. The improbability of my existence in that same universe empowers me to want to capture the beauty of that seeming paradox (even in a small way!) When did you decide to make art your life's work? As as a 19-year-old in 1978. I was in the Art Gallery of NSW standing in front of a beautiful stoneware blossom vase made by Peter Rushforth. I was already working in a commercial ceramics studio but that vase convinced me. What is art to you? All art is communication. Successful art asks the questions at the right time rather than preach. How important is the Highlands artistic community to you? I came to live in Robertson in 1984 and was pleasantly surprised to meet some of the local practitioners. In recent years there seems to be so many more which can only be good. There are so many opportunities to share and be challenged by new ideas. You can choose any piece of art in the world to hang on your wall. What would it be? Jackson Pollock's "Blue Poles". I often use poured glazes on my vase forms and I have some appreciation of his technical skill. Although, I would need to build a modernist house with five metre ceilings to fit it in. And finally, what does the Art Trail bring to the Highlands? Many arts-oriented people from outside come to share a little of the lifestyle of this area. It's a chance to share an authentic experience of making.

### Diana Kirkpatrick, Milliner, Robertson

What's your style? I don't follow any style. Rather I love to use found objects that then give me ideas. Who inspires you? My grandmother Freda Boughton. She was a milliner and lecturer at TAFE teaching millinery in the 1950 & 60s. Also a close family friend, Nonie McFarlane who excelled and was a master of making corn dollies using wheat. When did you decide to make it your life's work? Only now am I making it my life's work. But I would have loved to have done it in the 1990's when I first studied millinery after inheriting my Grandmother's hat blocks, portfolio and lecture notes. What do you strive to achieve? To create beautiful hats everyone wants to wear. What is art to you? Art to me is telling a story. When people create something it is usually from the heart. Whether you like it or not it is telling you something. Who inspires you artistically? My grandmother and her words "your hands should never be idle". Art keeps the mind active. Do you agree The Southern Highlands has an artistic enclave that is alive and well? Definitely. Robertson and our surrounding areas are full of talented people.


of the event, but even more important is the ability to showcase art in a very casual, uncommercial way for

### **Tulip Time**

'A tulip for every resident of Amsterdam' was the motto of Holland's famous Tulip Festival back in April, and would be a rather lovely maxim for our famous Tulip Time too. One of the oldest floral festivals in Australia, the Highlands Tulip Time started thanks to the efforts of the late Ada Corbett who first pushed the local council for some empty land in Bowral to be turned into a public park in 1910. This year's Tulip Time Festival will see the blooming of more than 75,000 tulips and 15,000 annuals in Bowral's Corbett Gardens. The biggest floral display in NSW, and nudging at the heels of Canberra's Floriade, the 2018 festival is in support of charity partners Wingecarribee Adult Day Care Centre and Dementia Australia, with much loved local Noeline Brown the ambassador. Organisers expect the sweet smelling event will attract more than 65,000 visitors to the Highlands over the two week festival, and more than 35,000 to Corbett Gardens alone. The festival, which began in 1951, will also include 40,000 tulips planted at Destination

Southern Highlands Welcome Centre in Mittagong and Leighton Gardens in Moss Vale. In its 58th year, the festival will include a street parade and other family events (no dogs please). ### Milton Park Country House Hotel Annual Spring Open Gardens

She's one of the Highlands' grand old dames, and Milton Park opens her cool climate gardens to the public during Tulip Time to fundraise for the Bowral & District Hospital Auxiliary Club. Built in 1911 by Anthony Hordern, 'one of the dashing Hordern boys' (as the Sydney press christened him and brothers Sam of Retford Park and Lebbeus of Hopewood House), Milton Park's gardens were designed and developed largely by Anthony's second wife, Mary Bullmore (great aunt of casino magnate James Packer)

with a nod to the English School of Landscape, which swept away strict geometric construct. The gardens are home to octogenarian elms and weeping beeches, 400 rose bushes, 2000 metres of hedges and a bluebell wood. There are also traditional elements such as a sunken garden, Japanese style ponds and wisteria. Devonshire teas are available in the Conservatory Restaurant for \$16.50 per person, and there's lunch in the Orangerie, and self-guided and guided garden tours with Milton Park's head gardener Peter Buerckner. 



BOWRAL VINTAGE AND ANTIQUE EMPORIUM DIRTY JANES WILL HOLD AN **EXHIBITION OF COUTURE DRESSES** BY SOME OF THE WORLD'S MOST FAMOUS DESIGNERS. **CHARLOTTE SMITH, OWNER OF THE EPONYMOUSLY NAMED FASHION COLLECTION, EXPLAINS HOW SHE CAME TO INHERIT ONE OF THE LARGEST VINTAGE WARDROBES IN THE WORLD, AND <b>HOW AN OUTFIT CAN DEFINE A WOMAN.** 

harlotte Smith had little interest in other people's clothing before her godmother Doris Darnell bequeathed her vast collection of 3000 vintage haute couture and demi couture dresses 15 years ago.

'I didn't know anything about fashion history but I did love fashion and had an incredible wardrobe of my own,' recalls Charlotte (pictured right). 'Initially, though, it was the stories behind the dresses which showcase 300 years of fashion that peaked my interest.'

The important collection includes hats, hat pins, shoes and jewellery as well as demi couture and couture party dresses, cocktail dresses and furs from the 1800s up to the 21st century. There are garments from the Georgian and Victorian periods as well as from pioneers of modern fashion such as Christian Dior, Coco Chanel, Hubert de Givenchy and Oscar de la Renta. And Lucile, Lady Duff-Gordon, a 1900s British couturier who survived the sinking of the Titanic. The collection was accumulated over 70 years by Doris Darnell, an American.

'She was Quaker and the whole collection began when she began dressing up from a box in the attic of her Pennsylvania family home,' explains Charlotte.





'It was the 1930s and as she started wearing some of these outfits out socially, people began to comment. Back then, if you were wearing other peoples' clothing it generally meant you couldn't afford your own. But Doris was always a maverick and she enjoyed wearing them, and telling the story about the woman whose dress, hat or handbag it was. Her reputation grew and as she accumulated more, people gave her more.'

The 10 day exhibition at Dirty Janes Bowral is called One Enchanted Evening and will showcase 20 of Charlotte's couture dresses by iconic designers including Dior, Oscar de la Renta

and Leonard of Paris. The exhibition's title is a nod to Charlotte's third book, and illustrator Grant Cowan will be with her at the opening night charity champagne supper, with some original illustrations for sale.

'Just like the pioneer designers of the late 1800s and early 1900s who didn't use photographs or have catwalk plates, Grant has picked up on all the original features of couture by illustrating each dress in incredible detail. I think people will enjoy seeing the real thing and Grant's illustration.'

Over the past 15 years Charlotte has added extensively to her collection, which now numbers 9000 pieces. She keeps the priceless social history capsule in a climate controlled storage facility in Sydney.

'I have always loved the idea that what you wear can transform and empower you, and can change an evening, a moment or a lifetime.'







#### THE MELODIOUS TONES OF ANDREW FORD

ARE LOVED BY ABC RADIO NATIONAL LISTENERS AUSTRALIA WIDE WHO KNOW HIM AS THE LONGTIME HOST OF THE MUSIC SHOW ON SATURDAY MORNINGS. THE ROBERTSON LOCAL, WHO IS ALSO A WRITER AND AN ACCLAIMED COMPOSER, HAS HAD HIS WORKS COMMISSIONED AND PERFORMED BY SOME OF THE MOST ESTEEMED SINGERS, ORCHESTRAS, ENSEMBLES AND QUARTETS AROUND THE GLOBE. RECENTLY HE SHARED HIS THOUGHTS WITH ESCAPE ON PIANO PRACTICE, INSPIRATION AND HIS NEXT BIG PIECE.

What do you like about living here? Anything not to like? I like the weather, especially in winter, But I wish the trains were faster, **How did** a boy from Liverpool end up in Robertson via Wollongong? Actually it wasn't just via Wollongong, it was via South-East London and Lancaster and Bradford and Wollongong and Sydney. We moved here in 2000. You grew up in the UK during the time of The Beatles and other Sixties' pop groups. Did you ever imagine music would become your career? I expected to be a primary school teacher (which, by the way, I consider the most important job in the world). I stumbled into music. I still think 'career' is an odd word for what I do. What was it about formal composition that attracted you? I was seduced by the orchestra. It's a world of sound. I like writing orchestral music more than anything else. If 80 plus people are going to play together, they can't just make it up. Someone needs to plan the thing. That's the composer's job. Are people surprised to learn you never really learnt to play the piano? I tinker at the piano, but I imagine music in my head and then work it out on paper (I still use a pencil and paper). It's hard to explain. You'd have to watch me at work, and even then you'd probably just think I was a bit odd. Composing, writing, broadcasting. Do you love all three parts of your life equally? Composing is the hardest and so the most fulfilling. But I do enjoy both the other things. How do you become a composer? You have to work very hard and write and write. Then you need luck. Of course you can't teach that! But you must have both thin skin (for the creative bit) and thick skin (for the disappointments). And it's not about self promotion and great websites. You might talk your way into a first performance, but if your music's no good, there won't be any more. How many pieces have you written. Do you have a favourite? More than a hundred, I expect. Favourites? My next piece is going to be brilliant! You've interviewed hundreds of musicians. Who are you still to meet? Keith Jarrett, though he can be very grumpy. Joni Mitchell, ditto. Kate Bush. The highpoint of your career? Did I mention my next piece? When you are working on a piece, does it take on a life of its own? If it's going well, yes. It's a wonderful feeling being bossed around by a piece of music. Do your compositions have a common thread running through them? suppose I'm their common thread. Who or what inspires your music? It's quite hard to say. I mentioned that music is my job, so that's a kind of inspiration. A lot of people feel that music is about other things, like birth, death, falling in love, landscapes. But really it's about itself. What's the best piece of advice you have ever received? Do your piano practice. Pity I didn't take it. What or who are the loves of your life? My wife and eight-year-old daughter. I don't really like leaving them, so it's good that I work at home as much as I do. What's your favourite place to go in the Highlands and why? The Robertson graveyard. It has a beautiful view and a very special atmosphere. Where do you always take friends who come to visit the Highlands? See above. I always take visitors there. The Sea and the Mirror has its world premiere in Canberra on September 22. Do you ever premiere works in the Highlands? The biggest piece I've composed for a local premiere was A Singing Quilt in 2008. That was for seven local choirs (formed up into one big choir) in Bundanoon Soldiers' Memorial Hall. You and your friend and neighbour artist Ben Quilty are collaborating together on a project. What is it? It's fluid. But I'll keep you posted! And, finally, please finish this sentence: Old composers never die, they just ... repeat themselves.

# **ON YER BIKE!**

FEELING A LITTLE DUSTY AFTER WINTER? NEED TO GET THE BLOOD PUMPING AND THE HEART RACING? WELL YOU'VE COME TO THE RIGHT PLACE. **THE BOWRAL CLASSIC, ONE OF NSW'S LEADING GRAN FONDO CYCLING EVENTS,** TAKES PLACE NEXT MONTH WITH COURSES FOR PROS AND NOVICES ALIKE. SO GET YOUR TRUSTY PUSHY OUT OF THE GARAGE AND GET LYCRA READY.

ou've heard of the popular walk and wine type of Southern Highlands tourism? Walk to the cellar door and try the wine. Well, the Bowral Classic Cycling event is offering something similar when it returns for the third year. Only for those who prefer to ride, not walk.

The 35km Social Classic event is for those with lots of time on their hands, and not a great deal of fuel in their pegs. Competitors will be given tokens to use at local cafes along the way on the day, which all sounds very civilised. So if coffee and a bit of leisurely biking is your thing, book into this event and let the more serious sorts get on with the competitive stuff out front.

Starting from Eridge Park Velodrome on Sunday October 21, this year's Bowral Classic includes the new 175km Maxi Classic for serious road racers who relish the challenge of a 2097m ascent. Beginning uphill on Oxley Hill, the race will pass through some spectacular Highlands scenery. If 175km is pushing it, sign up instead for the 120km Challenge Classic, with an ascent of 1492m, that will loop

riders through Berrima, Moss Vale and Bundanoon. Or the 90km Rouleurs Classic, which is like the 120km version only missing out Bundanoon.

Budding Brad McGees aged 12-16 are eligible to sign up for the Maxi, Challenge or Rouleurs events if they have a Cycling Australia Race Licence. Children over the age of 10 are accepted to ride in the Social Classic, although all kids under the age of 16 need to be accompanied by an adult (and presumably a tyre pump).

Lame jokes aside, this is a big deal for the Highlands.
Last year's Bowral Classic attracted 3000 riders and raised more than \$250,000 for charity as nominated by each rider. And it's a pretty cool way to get the lay of the land too, as cyclists transverse the Highlands riding through Bowral, Berrima, Moss Vale, Mittagong, Exeter, Bundanoon, Fitzroy Falls, Robertson and Kangaloon. This year's event is expected to be even bigger with 4000 overnight visitors expected to inject an estimated \$1.5 million into our economy over the weekend. Better get pedalling.

The Southern Highlands punches above its weight when it comes to producing world class cyclists. Moss Vale's Caleb Ewan, now 23, is one of the hottest young Australian riders on the European tour at the moment, despite the recent decision by Australian team Mitchelton-Scott not to give him his debut in the Tour de France.

At home, three times gold medal Olympic cycle champion Brad McGee continues to support the local scene alongside wife Sharni and race organiser Zac Hulm, by hosting the Twin Falls Cottages Rare Cancers Australia Mountain Bike Challenge on their private seven kilometre Fitzroy Fall track in May. If you want to take a turn or two around the track, best book to stay at the McGee's Twin Falls Bush Cottages, which back onto the glorious Morton National Park at Fitzroy Falls.

Also, biking accolades must go to the Southern Highlands Cycling Club, which continues to inspire and provide opportunity for our seasoned and improving mountain bike riders. One of the only clubs in NSW to operate across road, mountain and track disciplines, visit them at Welby if you want to get yourself or your kids more serious about riding. Or check out their website for a full winter program of events as well as weekday and weekend social rides.

Ask a Millennial what they most worry about and the majority will tell you the 'about the environment'. And quite right too. So here's your chance to spend time outside with your kids, be community minded and help the environment. Win, win, win. The Wingecarribee Rivercare Group - Burradoo is holding its inaugural working bee this month to improve the river environment and they're looking for volunteers. The Wingecarribee River flows through the heart of the Highlands, starting its journey in the east near Robertson and finishing where it joins the Wollondilly River on the western boundary of the Shire in Bullio. Along its 80km journey, it passes through extensive rural landscapes in the east, and more rugged landscapes to the west. The river itself is a Crown Waterway, meaning it is owned and managed by the NSW Department of Primary Industries (see link below). Rivercare is all about improving habitats, biodiversity and functioning of our waterways. Which brings me to the platypus and council's Platypus Conservation Project (read about its fellow local marsupial, the koala, on page 138). Cleaning up our waterways will help encourage more platypuses to move into the Highlands, but if you're on the hunt to see one, here are some of the best places to look: Wingecarribee River, Berrima; Black Bob's Creek, Exeter; Burrawang Creek, Burrawang; Cecil Hoskins Reserve, Moss Vale; Paddy's River, Canyonleigh; Stonequarry Creek, Werai; Long Swamp Creek, Sutton Forest. Rivercare Working Bee, Burradoo end of the Bong Bong Bike Track, Friday September 21, 9.30am (then every third Friday after). Children need to be accompanied by an adult. To report any platypus sightings, contact citizen.science@ wsc.nsw.gov.au







oe Stammers vividly remembers the first time he saw a koala jump. It was during the release of two injured animals last year. One had been hit by a vehicle on the Hume Highway; the other was thought to have fallen from his tree.


'The koalas were released with a WIRES carer into the Box Vale Walking Track area which was further than where they were found but safer,' says Stammers, an environmental projects officer with Wingecarribee Shire Council.

'This particular koala who had been hit by a car was in a very bad way. He'd had metal plates in his head and had been rehabilitated over 12 months. We released him out of the metal box and he shimmied straight up the nearest tree and started doing a bear call, which is like a pig's grunt and bellow. Then he moved to the top of the tree and jumped to another, which I guesstimate was three to four metres away. It was just fabulous and surprising to see, because people often have the impression koalas are docile stupid creatures. They aren't.'

Stammers is something of an authority on koalas. Since initiating and beginning work on the Southern Highlands Koala Conservation Project (SHKCP) in 2014, he and his team have collected and correlated baseline data that estimates there is a population of more than 3000 koalas living across the Wingecarribee.

'The shire is about 2700 square kilometres in size, with 60% of that area being remnant bushland. Our research shows we have the biggest koala population in southern NSW and 10% of the estimated population in the whole of NSW. We have calculated that overall there is likely to be just one koala for every 50 hectares of bushland. If you want to maximise your chances of finding a koala, look east of the Hume Highway as it is significantly easier to find a koala in the fertile basalt-soil eucalypt forests in the east, than in the dry, sandstone country in the west.'

The SHKCP came about after a pilot study following the Balmoral and Bargo bushfires of 2013.



Grab your binoculars and camera and look up! 'Koalas tend to be more active at night, so if you have access to good quality head-torches then spotlighting is probably the best method, however it is not uncommon to see koalas during the day,' says Joe.

State government, uncovered an extensive koala network running throughout the Highlands. Joe says that thanks to the study we now know over the course

of a year koalas are most active during breeding season which runs from August through to February,, that the males work hard to protect their home range, and that they certainly are not stupid creatures.

'They have evolved in a very unique way, with an innate ability to choose the right tree. If it's cold, they'll choose trees on a ridge top to keep warm, even if it's not a eucalypt but is in a better spot,' says Stammers. 'We've seen them in banksias warming themselves.'

He believes the research, which is ongoing, is beneficial not just for the resident koala population but for the Southern Highlands community.

'Conservation tourism is a huge growth area,' he says, 'but I can't see it's been very developed here at all yet. Port Macquarie, which has a koala hospital, does a great job treating sick and injured koalas and gets more than 200,000 visitors a year.

'Many people would love to see koalas in their own habitat in the Highlands, and maybe get involved in conservation activities like helping with the ongoing monitoring program, and doing something meaningful.'

And a final word of warning if you do come across one of these wild natives.

'Do NOT attempt to pat a koala,' says Joe. They may look cuddly but koalas have sharp claws and can be aggressive if threatened. Stay a safe distance away to take photos.'

'We started getting a lot of anecdotal evidence from people calling Council and saying, "I've got a koala in my backyard," says Joe.

'I grew up in Appin and koalas have had a long presence there, but people I spoke to locally kept saying, "No, we don't see koalas about here."

Joe's theory is that the fire, which destroyed homes and burnt out many hectares, pushed surviving koalas further south.

'Koalas are very territorial, so those moving south to escape the fire would have had a knock on effect, in turn pushing others south and bringing them into closer contact with humans.'

Koalas are classified as a threatened species. This is significant when it comes to local government planning because they have their own piece of legislation. State Environmental Planning Policy 44 protects koalas as well as their preferred habitat, which includes 65 species of eucalypt throughout the Southern Highlands.

With local knowledge sketchy at best, Joe's team set out to ascertain the koala population here. Working with students and researchers from the University of Sydney, wildlife ecologists and volunteers from Conservation Volunteers Australia, they fitted collars to 20 koalas. They also spent 12 months surveying more than 700 sites all over the Highlands in an widespread monitoring program that involved spotlighting koalas at night.






