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

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
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
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Editor's welcome



At a glance TOWNS & VILLAGES

THE SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS IS MADE UP OF MANY TOWNS AND VILLAGES, EACH WITH ITS OWN UNIQUE CHARACTER, CHARMS AND ATTRACTIONS. HERE'S YOUR 'CHEAT SHEET' TO GET ACQUAINTED – FOR MORE DETAILS, PLUS MAPS AND OTHER ESSENTIAL INFORMATION, VISIT DESTINATION SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS AT SOUTHERN-HIGHLANDS.COM.AU

BOWRAL

Looked over by Mount Gibraltar, Bowral is the largest town in the Highlands. Full of historic public and private buildings, stunning country gardens and grand estates, this beautiful township is known for its antiques and homewares stores, as well as markets, galleries, bookshops and unique boutiques. Bowral's drinking and dining scene is heating up, with new openings like The Mill Cafe, Grand Bistro and Bistro Officina complementing stalwarts like Biota, Onesta Cucina and a raft of loyal local favourite cafes and pubs. Visitors and locals are drawn to landmarks such as the Bradman Museum & International Cricket Hall of Fame, and the many festivals, including this month's inaugural Pie Time Festival, spring's Tulip Time and the Bong Bong Picnic Races.

BERRIMA

This picturesque 1830s village has history (think the heritage Berrima Gaol, the iconic Berrima Court House, and National Trust-listed Harper's Mansion); nature (the Wingecarribee River runs through it); fantastic food (Eschalot, Josh's Cafe and Feast at Berrima, see our review on page 53), as well as excellent cafes and patisseries, and Australia's oldest continuously licensed inn, the Surveyor General. The Schoolyard Markets are held on the fourth Sunday of every month (Feb-Nov).

MOSS VALE

Centred around the impressive Victorianera railway station, Moss Vale is known for its gardens, walks and down to earth country charm. The annual Agricultural Show, one of the biggest in NSW, is a wonderful old-style country fair. The main drag, Argyle Street, is undergoing a revival, with amazing homewares stores to tempt every taste. Fantastic cafes like The Vale, Highland Merchant, and II Pranzo offer delicious eating options. Not far away is cosy Southern Highlands Wines and Mount Ashby Estate cellar door and restaurant. The town's indoor aquatic centre is open year-round.

MITTAGONG

Historic Mittagong has plenty to offer, from parks (try Lake Alexandra) to walks (such as the Box Vale Mine walking track with its incredible views of the Nattai Gorge), wineries including Marist Wines and Howards Lane Vineyard, Artemis Wines and Tractorless Vinevard Cellar Door @ McVitty Grove, and Tertini Wines (see our review on page 58). There's also the treasure trove that is the Mittagong Antiques Centre. A highlight for art-lovers is contemporary craft and design gallery Sturt. It's well worth a stroll along Main and Victoria Streets to see charming country homes, impressive gardens and to drop in on the cafes and speciality and vintage shops.

ROBERTSON

The small, character-filled town of Robertson combines a rolling pastoral setting (did you know the movie Babe was filmed here?) with fabulous fresh produce such as potatoes, truffles and pears; a famed cheese shop selling local dairy delights; and The Robertson Hotel (see our review on page 26) and the cosy Robertson Inn. The iconic Robertson Pie Shop, with its huge range of savoury and sweet pies is open every day of the year except Christmas and has long been an essential pit stop for locals, and those passing through.

BUNDANOON

Packed with old-world charm,
Bundanoon is a vibrant town with cafes,
tea rooms, restaurants, guesthouses,
antique dealers and renowned health
and wellness retreats, Quest for Life and
Solar Springs. Market days, held on the
first and third Sunday of each month
(except Jan), feature fresh produce,
handicrafts and plants. Bushwalking
in nearby Morton National Park is
popular, as is bike riding (bikes can
be hired in town). The annual Scottish
Highland gathering, Brigadoon, is held
every April featuring all things tartan.

CANYONLEIGH

Made up of vast rural properties,
Canyonleigh lies at an altitude of
700 metres and is fast gaining a
reputation as a wine-producing
area, known for shiraz, pinot noir,
pinot gris, chardonnay and cabernet
sauvignon. Situated on the drier
western edge of the Highlands,
it's nicknamed the 'outback' of
the region and is a great place for
kangaroo spotting and for a visit to
the Birrong Suri Alpaca Stud to see
baby alpacas (bookings essential).

FITZROY FALLS

The tiny village of Fitzroy Falls is surrounded by farmland and wilderness, and takes its name from an 81-metre waterfall in adjoining Morton National Park. The nearby Belmore Falls are equally spectacular. Head for the Fitzroy Falls picnic area for great views of the falls and for bird-watching opportunities – and the sounds of lyrebirds if you're lucky. The deck at the Falls Cafe is a lovely spot for refreshments.

JOADJA

Joadja, a region of farms and beautiful bushland on the periphery of the Southern Highlands was once more an area than a destination. But the success of Joadja Estate winery, and more recently Joadja Distillery, built among the ruins of the historic late 1800s township that thrived there, is changing that. Owners of the distillery run heritage tours of the historic site, once home to 1200 Scottish immigrant miners and their families.

EXETER

The historic Exeter Village Hall and adjoining park and oval are the heart of picturesque Exeter, a village of leafy streets, neat hedges and grand rows of trees. Another local icon, the Exeter General Store, performs its role as bookshop, post office, gourmet food store and cafe admirably. If browsing is on the cards, you'll find The Village Pump Antiques and The Summerhouse Store nearby. The Exeter Markets are held on the first Saturday of each month in the village hall.

BURRAWANG

Quaint and pretty, Burrawang boasts old-world charm, country hospitality and historic character buildings. The newly renovated Burrawang Village Hotel, with its huge grassed area overlooking beautiful rolling hills, is a popular spot; as is the **Burrawang General** Store Cafe with its fine dining all day long, and restored self-contained accommodation available next door. The 1883 School of Arts building plays host to the town's annual ball and other events. Burrawang is also becoming known as

a hub of creative talent.

SUTTON FOREST

It might be small, but historic Sutton
Forest packs a punch. Along with
heritage houses, churches and
cemeteries, another attraction is The
Everything Store, which is true to its
name and a popular pit stop. The
area's wines and cellar doors are
making a name for themselves, and
Montrose Berry Farm (you can pick
your own berries when in season)
and the stunning garden
at Red Cow Farm are
well worth a visit.

HILL TOP

This northern village has a rich history as a former railway town and now gateway to Australia's largest rail museum, Trainworks at Thirlmere. Don't miss the exhilarating Cave Creek walking track.

MADE BY OTHERS

There is always a forerunner and, in terms of contemporary art and design, Made by Others has been to Moss Vale what Alessi is to kitchen accessories. Opened in 2010 by Ursula Armstrong and Anna Byng, the store's location was chosen by the couple because 'Moss Vale had untapped potential and charm'. They were the first to bring Finnish super brand Marimekko and home-grown star Dinosaur Designs to the Highlands, and just back from their annual scouting/buying trip to the US and Europe, Anna and Ursula have an irresistible array of paintings, prints, textiles, jewellery, lighting and object design from national and international designers. They also make a mean coffee, perfect to go with a savoury or sweet bite – made by locals, of course. And if you want to hear what's going on around the Highlands, this is one place to come; these trendsetting creatives keep their ears to the ground. 'We feel so excited that the local Highlands community and further afield is increasingly embracing Moss Vale as a regional hub for independent stores with a unique character,' says Anna. 'We're pretty proud, too, that Made by Others has been part of this movement.'

the BARBER ROOM

Gone are the days when beardies were considered weirdies (and here we are thinking of Roald Dahl's revolting bewhiskered Mr Twit). Today the hirsute man is everywhere, and no more so than in the Highlands where rugged, outdoorsy, metrosexual, lumbersexual (yes it's a thing – look it up!) and bushy types abound. Timely, then, that Sensoria in Bowral has opened The Barber Room, where hairy ones can go to take care of all matters pertaining to shaving, grooming, trimming, barbering and straight blade shaves (otherwise known as 'a cut-throat'). Some services, such as

the 'special-occasion spruce-up' have a complimentary glass of whisky or cognac, while others – like the 'tutorial' – educate on beard-shaping and maintenance. Owner Jules Van De Sande, who also made the wigs for Chevalier College's recent production of the Mikado, opened Sensoria's intimate man-cave after seeing first-hand 'the movement in cutting-edge fashion of groomed facial hair' in Europe. 'Most men can wear a beard,' she says. 'It can enhance face shape and disguise weaknesses. A beard also creates an individual identity and statement.' So no more excuses for crumbs in beards, gents.

Bowral has been without an independent cycle shop for the past few years, although over in Moss Vale, Stuart and Marika at Cycliste have ably taken up the slack. Now, however Bowral once again has a cycling shop of its own with the recent opening of The Fixed Wheel. Not a moment too soon, either as we gear up for the Bowral Classic – a one-day road-cycling Gran



Fondo Cyclo-Sportif. Events include the 160-km Maxi Classic, the 120-km Bowral Challenge, and a 45-km social multi-stop event. Held in October, last year's inaugural race attracted 3000 cyclists and raised more than \$100,000 for charity. Still time to get in some pedal practice!

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Time for tea

Caroline hit on the idea of screenprinting her witty and droll messages onto 100 per cent linen in 2010, and now has 30 or so versions of tea-towels, and a bit of a cult following. 'It can be never-ending drudgery at the kitchen sink as we all know,' says Caroline, who often sells her wares at local markets as well as online. 'Everyone can do with a bit of dry wit and good design while they dry up, although these tea-towels can also be found on walls all over the world.'



BDCU CHILDREN'S FOUNDATION HELPS OUR YOUTHS' HEADSPACE

It is an alarming fact. According to Mission Australia's Youth Survey (2012-2016), one in four Australians aged 16-24 experienced a mental disorder in the previous 12 months. Even more worrying, there was a significant increase in the rates of probable serious

mental health in surveyed young people aged 15-19. Now, in a unique Highlands partnership, the BDCU Children's Foundation, funded by BDCU Alliance Bank and local residents, and Bowral and District Hospital are enlisting the help of batyr - an organisation that gives a voice 'to the elephant in the room' - to provide a series of mental health forums to educate our kids on help available. Batyr, named after the famed 'speaking' elephant of the former Soviet Union believed to use human speech, teaches early intervention and preventative education in the area of youth mental health, and helps children start a conversation on what can be a frightening topic. It will run a program of events for students at Moss Vale High, Oxley College,

Bowral High, Chevalier College and Frensham during August 21-25, and host a Parents and Community Forum with expert speakers. This week-long initiative will overlap with Civic2Surf, a fundraising 340 km relay run from Canberra to Bondi via the Southern Highlands, started by Australian National University students in 2011 to support batyr's efforts. Much-loved Moss Vale resident, and former Oxley College student, Harriet Nixon participated in the event in 2015, and was so inspired she took on the role of president in 2016. Harriet, 21, tragically lost her life in December. Civic2Surf organiser Joshua Dundas, a close friend of Harriet and her family said, 'Because of Harriet and her dedication to this initiative, and its objective to help young people talk about mental health, Civic2Surf can now call the Southern Highlands a home away from home.' Unlike many rural areas, the Highlands has a full-time specialist Child and Adolescent Mental Health Clinician, based at Bowral and District Hospital, thanks to BDCU fundraising's efforts.

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

There are few things more heartening than a pie, and many places in the Highlands make a mean beef, chicken, curry and potato variety. The Robertson Pie Shop alone bakes more than 25 types. Now, to delight tastebuds, comes the inaugural Pie Time — a big and meaty get-your-smackers-around-this type of festival created by Destination Southern Highlands and made up of loads of pie-themed events. Highlights include the Pie Trail, where you get your mitts on a map and sample pies made by more than 30 local cafes, pie shops, bakeries, farm shops and patisseries, and Dine with a Pie Night, in

which hotels, cafes and restaurants serve up a signature pie for the month. And of course there's our favourite, The Southern Highlands Best Pie Competition, where local bakers, pie-makers, chefs and home cooks try to outbake each other for the top gong in pie perfection. Winners qualify to compete in the 2017 Great Aussie Pie Competition in Sydney in September. Pie celebrations culminate at a two-day Pie Time Festival in Bowral's Corbett Gardens, with market stalls, food, wine, entertainment and, of course, pies aplenty.



WHEN HOTEL ROBERTSON OPENED IN 1924 ON SIX HECTARES OF LAND LOOKING OUT OVER THE JAMBEROO ESCARPMENT, THE PRESS DEEMED IT 'ONE OF THE MOST LUXURIOUS IN THE COMMONWEALTH'.

It was the time of the Charleston, women in flapper dresses, champagne cocktails, art deco design and decadence. Days when the well-heeled Sydney crowd escaped to the Highlands to partake of the fresh air and let their hair down. The hotel's golf course swept all the way to where the Robertson Pie Shop stands today. Golfers were issued with a whistle when venturing out to play, so a rescue team could locate them when the famous Robbo mists rolled in.

Known for many decades as Ranelagh House and now operating as The Robertson House, this Gatsby-esque establishment still has the power to impress. Hotelier Con Kotis fell for the hotel's charm the moment he visited in 2011. Owner of apartment accommodation in Sydney, Con's first thought was 'It's crying out for attention'. He and wife Lisa are committed to an ongoing multimillion-dollar renovation of the fully functional hotel, which will see 40 rooms become 60 guestrooms and suites.

'I guess I fell in love with the hotel's bones and its history but I could see it needed a lot of work,' says Con. 'It is still a work in progress but I feel every day we are getting closer to restoring it to its former glory.'

Escape Southern Highlands arrives at dusk at the grand front entrance. We are greeted gracefully by staff, and a roaring open fire that warms the vast hallway. A huge central staircase takes us to our rooms. My colleague is shown to the Grand Manor Suite, which is the bridal suite. Overlooking the main front lawn, where marriage ceremonies often occur, it has two bedrooms, a large bathroom and a sitting room plus a birdseye view of arriving guests. The hotel often attracts wedding parties, with many families taking over the entire premises for several days.

My room down the hall has a king-size bed with a goose feather duvet, in-period furniture decked with cosy throws and hydronic heating. The room is fetching in its simplicity. The ensuite bathroom has original fittings, with



tiles covering floor and walls and plumbing on the outside

complemented by a huge rain shower head. Organic toiletries and fine cotton towels are most welcome. The one thing missing is a hairdryer.

We enjoy a pre-dinner drink in the bar area, handsome with art deco design. The dining room has been refurbed and is dressed with ceiling to floor drapery and white linen, perhaps harking back to the days when people ate more formally. Chef Michael White serves dinner on Friday and Saturday nights, and is holding Christmas in July dinners, with bookings also open to non-hotel guests (see On Your Plate page 44 for more details). Continuing in the decadent vein, we choose the a la carte menu – homemade duck liver pate followed by the beef fillet that is served with mash, asparagus, broccolini and red wine sauce. I finish with the cheese and fruit platter. The food is rich and delicious, with an emphasis on local producers and suppliers. At \$60 a head it strikes me as extremely good value.

In the morning, a lavish continental and hot breakfast is served in the grand ballroom. This room can hold 100 dancing guests with a DJ or band. Or the Australian World Orchestra, who played here in 2015.

'Because of the high ceilings, I am told the acoustics here are fabulous,' says Con. 'We are delighted the World Orchestra are booked again to return in November.'



FRENCH CHIC IN THE HIGHLANDS

ESCAPE FOR A WELL-EARNED WINTER BREAK IN THIS CHARMING PROPERTY WITH ALL THE JOIE DE VIVRE OF A GETAWAY IN THE MAGNIFICENT FRENCH COUNTRYSIDE.

T's right on dusk when I pull up outside the St Eloi Guesthouse and a wintery chill is in the air. With its rich terracotta-coloured walls and weathered timber shutters, the property exudes French farmhouse charm beyond the rustic front gates. A blue and white street sign, IMPASSE ST-ÉLOI, a lovely translation of 'no through road', directs me to the visitors' parking spot. This is one dead-end I am happy to discover.

St Eloi is just a few minutes' drive from the centre of Bowral, yet the moment I crunch over gravel through the parterre-styled courtyard, I feel transported to another world.

Stepping into the main living area, the first impression is one of homely comfort. Thoughtfully restored and furnished by locals Pete and Shelly Burrows, who also own Mittagong homewares and vintage furniture store, pete's shed & mrs, the guesthouse delights with its recycled furniture and vintage collectables.

The main living area is warmed to just the right temperature by hydronic heating and colourful rugs are scattered over the timber floors. There are two generous sofas and a long communal table, providing plenty of room for guests to relax without feeling crowded. Just off the dining area, a small but well-appointed Provencal-styled kitchen is close enough to feel part of the action when preparing meals. An outdoor table offers a pleasant al fresco dining option, perhaps more suited to balmier months, unless you're well rugged up.

The elegant master bedroom features a queen-size bed dressed in hues of pastel green with plump white pillows. Layers of muslin curtains, swept aside and caught with an iron hook, frame golden evening light. Walk through the master bedroom to a large private en suite – no bumping elbows in tight corners here – with a double sink over an antique wooden dresser, a shower big enough for two, and a hidden loo. Luxurious toiletries in delicate glass bottles add to the considered mix of contemporary design with an oldworld finish.

Just as the mind begins to form a question (where's the bath?), a hand-written note looped over a door handle or tied to a basket, provides the answer (there's a second full bathroom). Charming bric-a-brac, miniature bouquets of dried flowers and bundled pages from old books tied with ribbon, suggest years of dedicated collecting.

With three additional bedrooms, two offering queen-size beds, the third with two single beds, there is ample sleeping space and privacy for up to eight guests. Elegant wroughtiron clothes racks are an authentic and practical inclusion.

The floor-to-ceiling shelving in the main living area is stocked with crockery, glassware, cutlery, and a decent selection of books. Choose a novel or a board game, play some French inspired tunes on the CD player, and settle in. Dimmed lighting and tea light candles add to the ambience.

If further relaxation is called for, take up the owners' suggestion to run a warm bath in the beautifully renovated main bathroom, and drop in a scented grenade (another charming translation) from the box of Côte Noir crystals.

A basic but delicious breakfast basket is provided, with a fresh half-baguette, small tubs of creamy butter and fruity jam, plus a dozen or so eggs collected from the St Eloi chooks. A selection of complimentary herbal and breakfast teas, coffee, and a carton of long-life milk in the fridge means even the less organised traveller, like me, is well catered for.

The St Eloi experience is so well put together, it's sure to please even the most discerning guests - you really could be bunkered down in the south of France. It took an early morning burst from the local kookaburras, my wake-up call, to remind me this little slice of heaven is much closer to home. Add St Eloi Guesthouse to your list of home-stay gems, perfect for a winter break in the Southern Highlands. **D**


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




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

The trick about going along to a workshop and learning something new is not to be hard on yourself. Place the bar too high by expecting to walk away with a gallery-worthy piece, and you might be setting yourself up for disappointment.

Go along with the express purpose of enjoying yourself and learning what you can, and you'll have a fabulous morning.

That is my approach, anyway, as I prepare for my first ever workshop experience; a three-hour affair with weaver Brooke Munro, 'Basket-making using hidden core coiling technique'. Brooke is one-half of creative duo Mr & Mrs Munro. Husband Colin is the second, and together they create beautiful raw pieces of furniture, sculptural basketry, and objects from wood and pieces uncovered on their Wildes Meadow property.

The session is at the fabulous Dirty Janes in Bowral, which has an ongoing schedule of such workshops. I arrive happy and relaxed with no presumptions of uncovering any hidden artistic talent, but determined to take what I can from the morning. Dirty Janes is home to the largest vintage markets in the Southern Highlands, with more than 75 dealers. It sells all manner of treasures from furniture to collectables to jewellery, and if you are keen on shopping or pottering about, this is a wonderful place to come. Wonderful but a bit dangerous. Especially as it incorporates Maureen and Chris Gardners' new Green Lane precinct, and Suzie Anderson Home. Dirty Janes is to shopping fiends what chocolate peanuts are to chocolate peanut lovers. Irresistibly moreish.

Workshops are held upstairs in the Magpie Room and are intimate, warmed by the morning sun, and furnished with morning tea by the fabulous Tea Salon downstairs. Brooke was taught by the late Virginia Kaiser, one of Australia's best known basket-makers, and she soon has the nine participants, some local like me, others from further-away Kiama and the Blue Mountains, weaving with a traditional 'long and short' stitch. Wrap, wrap, wrap, stitch.


Basket-weaving has experienced a renaissance of late in the move to sustainable products and people's desire to get back to Nature. Brooke is a skilled and patient tutor with a warm and engaging manner that inspires confidence. Three hours magically disappear into the ether as the hand-dyed raffia she supplies begins to metamorphose into the beginnings of a basket. Well, for most participants, that is. Looking up from my weaving efforts, I feel alarm as my creation resembles neither the woman's on my left nor the one on my right. That is until a very welcome comment comes from the front of the class.

'I like what you are doing with that, Alex. It looks very organic. It'd look great as a wall-hanging.'

Talent, kindness and diplomacy. Now that's my kind of artistic teacher.











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Q: Which came first John: the butcher stores or the raising your own cattle on the farm?

A: My dad Joe Mauger bought the first farm near Robertson in the 1940s, which he paid for with produce grown on a 10 acre cabbage patch in 12 months. Over the next 30 years he bought and sold local farms to increase his commercial cattle business.

Q: How long has there been a Maugers at Burrawang, and what was the impetus behind opening in Moss Vale?

A: Dad opened Maugers at Burrawang in 1972 when cattle prices slumped. I started there in 1976 as a 16-year-old and became manager in 1978 when Dad had a heart attack and could no longer work in the shop but he continued to work on the farm over another 25 years. We opened the shop in Moss Vale in 2014 to take over from the only remaining butcher in Moss Vale, which was closing down, and to ensure locals could continue to buy our locally grown grass fed meat.

Q: Does all Maugers meat come from stock you raise?

A: We buy quality cattle and lambs from local sales and grow and fatten them on grass at our two family farms. We also sell free range pork and chicken. I control the farm process myself. I drench for worms and lice, handle stock using passive techniques, and rotate stock from paddock to paddock weekly. I select the finished animals and deliver them personally to abattoirs. I'm not a one breed person. I believe many breeds can have good meat. I do favour Angus, Hereford and Murray Grey. Once back from the abattoirs, our procedures are different from most. I can't tell you all our secrets but suffice to say 'ageing' the meat is one significant part.

Q: Tell me a bit about your paddock to plate philosophy. Feel free to drop in any chefs or restaurants you supply to...

A: We are third generation butchers as our son Mat now controls the butcher shops. We have more than 40 years experience of farming, processing and butchery. My wife Vicki and I also ran a catering business for 30 years. We have much regard for the 'low and slow' process of cooking. I've never been much of a name dropper but we supply to seven hotels in the area and restaurants in all our towns and villages, as well as Nowra and Wollongong.

Q: With Mat now running the shops are there occasions that old bull/ young bull scenario arises?

A: No. Mat came to the shop after completing a refrigeration/air con apprenticeship and we worked together for five years until Vicki and I thought he was ready. I was physically worn out and mentally strained so the time was definitely right. Since Mat came on board we've doubled our output. We are a fair size small business, employing 14 people from the local area, so we try to share the load and help each other out when needed.

Q: What is the most underrated cut of beef you sell?

A: Blade. It can be cooked in any way. It was once popular, not so much now though.

Q: Do you get fed up with people mispronouncing your name?

A: We pronounce Mauger as Major. We come from Jersey, part of the British Isles and during the war our name sounded very German, hence the change.

Q: And finally please finish this sentence... 'butchers have a reputation of having a bit of twinkle in their eye because...

A: They know quality when they see it.





Come in from the cold

CELEBRITY CHEF AND LOCAL GEOFF JANSZ LOVES NOTHING BETTER THAN PREPARING A **HEARTY WINTER MEAL** FOR HIS FAMILY, **MADE WITH LOVE AND LOCAL PRODUCE** UNIQUE TO THE SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS.

The Southern Highlands has its unique microclimate... small, elevated, reliable rainfall, wonderful soil and clearly defined seasons. Here, farms and vineyards have an opportunity to take advantage of the 'terroir' by selecting the livestock, grapes and fresh produce that thrive. In an age where every recipe, and winemaking technique, can be found and copied, our regional fingerprint (our individual character and style) I think will be experienced as much through our primary produce as how it's prepared.

Despite having plenty of good eateries, Southern Highlanders love to entertain at home and the season for this is winter. It's when we get to live the cliché, 'Come in from the cold, the fire's lit, there's slow-braised beef and aged red wine ahead of us.' City friends can't resist and invariably swing past a real estate agent on their way home.

Ask any cow where best to graze, and the well-informed will mention the Highlands. Lush, green and uncrowded, the local pastures are to die for. And they do. Mercifully, skilfully and thankfully in accordance with the wishes and direction of experienced butchers. Yup, that's right. We still have butchers here.

Good, down-to-earth, experienced country butchers. (Quite unlike the best city butchers who are incredibly highend, selling meat that is so specialised, it wages war with caviar and truffle for pride of place on the table, as well as the credit card.) Our guys cut from carcass and charge for well-grown, well-handled prime beef. So next time you're up for an adventure, come down our way and stock up on wine, antiques and a locally grown beef brisket. I'll even tell you how to cook it.





SLOW-BRAISED SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS BEEF BRISKET

SERVES 6-8

Olive oil
3kg whole trimmed brisket
6 cups roughly diced carrots,
celery and onions
1 whole leek, washed and
roughly diced
1 head of garlic, cut in half
crossways
2 very ripe tomatoes,
cut in half
4 bay leaves
1 bunch of thyme
1 tbsp whole peppercorns

1 cinnamon quill (optional)
2 pieces of mace (optional)
2 pieces of orange peel (optional)
250ml port
½ bottle of red wine (I like to use shiraz)
4 cups chicken stock or 2 cups chicken stock and 2 cups water
1 onion, sliced
1 cup mushrooms of choice, sliced if necessary (I like Li-Sun Exotic Mushrooms from Mittagong)
Creamy mashed potato, to serve

Method

- Preheat the oven to 165°C.
- Rub the brisket all over liberally with salt, pepper and oil. Heat your largest, heaviest and deepest baking pan over very high heat, add the brisket and sear both sides. Remove the meat and set aside.
- Reduce the heat to medium-high. Add the carrot, celery and onion mixture to the baking pan with a splash of oil and cook, stirring, for 15 minutes or until the vegetables are collapsed and slightly browned.
- Add the leek, garlic, tomatoes, bay leaves, thyme and peppercorns, and cinnamon, mace and orange peel, if using. Cook, stirring, for a further 5 minutes.
- Add the port and bring to the boil, then boil heavily for 2 minutes. Add the red wine and bring to the boil, then boil heavily for 3 minutes. Finally, add the stock or stock and water combination and bring to the simmer.
- \bullet Return the meat to the baking pan. Cover the pan contents with baking paper, then cover the baking pan tightly with foil. Cook in the preheated oven for 3 $^{1/2}$ hours.
- Remove the baking pan from the oven and set aside to rest, covered, for 10 minutes.
- Meanwhile, sauté the sliced onion and mushrooms in a little oil until just soft. Set aside. Prepare the mashed potato (I like to add a little mustard for flavour).
- Remove the beef from the pan and set aside, keeping it warm. Strain
 the remaining liquid, skim off the fat and reduce to a sauce over
 medium-high heat. Add the sautéed onion and mushrooms to the sauce.
- Slice the brisket (reheating it if needed) and serve with the mash and sauce. You could also add slices of the beef to the simmering sauce to reheat it. Enjoy!

The clusters are an initiative of the forwardthinking Moss Vale and Rural Chamber of Commerce, which represents more than 150 small farmers and artisan producers. CANYONLEIGH CULTIVATED

eather in the Highlands, especially in winter, can be as band Crowded House so famously immortalised 'like four seasons in one day'. So can the landscape. The rolling English-like countryside of Exeter and Sutton Forest quickly gives way to flatter, drier land as you drive out to outlying areas such as Canyonleigh. According to the excellent Berrima and District Historical Society, the area was established in the 1880s by Jane Murray, whose property - 'Canyan Leigh' - was near the junction of Paddy's River and the Wollondilly. She opened a post office and made land available for a school. Jane later moved to a property established by one of her eight sons, located on a well-used stock route. Other early farming families also included the Carters. Edward Carter is acknowledged as discovering the shale oil deposits at nearby Joadja. As well as grazing and farming, Canyonleigh was also historically home to a number of coal mines and timber

mills. Local farmer and acclaimed international wood chopper George Quigg grew up on a timber farm in the area. Canyonleigh is today also home to a growing band of food producers and winemakers, many of whom joined forces earlier this year to form the Canyonleigh Cluster. If you haven't visited Canyonleigh before, make a day trip of it and explore.

Food and Produce

Canyonleigh General Store is at the centre of the widely spaced-out rural neighbourhood. It encompasses the post office, a bottle shop and a Wi-Fi cafe which, by all accounts, serves great woodfire pizza and regularly holds community curry nights, karaoke nights and the Canyonleigh Night Markets, as well as fundraising events like its recent Biggest Morning Tea. It also stocks a range of locally grown produce alongside those everyday bits and pieces like bread, milk and newspapers. Local

business Bare Greens was started by Sylvie Chaumont and Frank Maly in 2015, and uses aquaponics towers to grow herbs and leafy greens upwards and outwards - and with not a plastic bag in sight. Now that's fresh food. Also, don't miss two acclaimed Canyonleigh vineyards nearby. Far Ago Hill, the Southern Highlands home of Sydney interior designer Katrina Hill, produces acclaimed Pinot Gris, made by James Halliday-ranked winemaker Nick O'Leary. Meanwhile, Rosa Antonio Valley Wine and Olive Oil brings a little taste of Italy to the Highlands. Giovanni Pugliese, whose family has been making wines in Southern Italy for generations, continues the tradition, with each vintage limited to 100 cases. Spend a few hours at the tasting room and buy some of the fresh olive oil from the grove while there. If you feel like doing a bit of farming work while visiting, get in touch with the Southern Highlands Community Farm. Run by the Shanti Mission, the community farm is on 57 acres and has 5000 established fruit and nut trees. Or, if you simply feel like kicking back and relaxing at a lovely local base for a day or two, The Woolshed, set on 230 acres, sleeps up to 12 guests with sweeping views and heaps of animals, including the native variety, for the kids to see. A great place to chill out, see some of the local sights and properly catch up with friends.

Escape eats at... Feast at Berrima

ESCAPE SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS ENJOYS **AN EVENING OF FINE DINING AT FEAST AT BERRIMA**, AND QUICKLY APPRECIATES WHY LOCALS AND
REGULARS ARE SO HAPPY TO WELCOME BACK **CHEF ANNIE HOLLOWAY AND HER PARTNER, FRONT OF HOUSE, PHILIP MARTIN**.

Building a reputation in the restaurant game is a slow burn. It takes talent and hard work and creativity to entice locals and visitors to come, and years to build up a loyal client list. Which was exactly what Annie Holloway and Philip Martin achieved with their previous restaurant FEAST @ McVitty. Opened in 2010 at local vineyard McVitty Grove near Mittagong, by the time 2015 rolled around the couple had established a burgeoning reputation. Good Food visited in 2013 and said 'quality ingredients shine' and Annie's food 'completes the sense of relaxed and friendly elegance'. And then, as can happen in business, the bottom fell out of their venture when the lease went elsewhere.

Coming out of the kitchen at the couple's new business, FEAST at BERRIMA, formerly the Australian Alpaca Centre (the pen that housed the once-resident alpacas now the herb garden), Annie admits losing Feast @ McVitty was heartbreaking.

'I cried for three weeks because we worked so hard to build up that place. But then you pick yourself up, don't you, and start again.'

FEAST at BERRIMA opened in December and came about, says Philip, through the support of local businesswoman Judith Street, mother of mining magnate Andrew 'Twiggy'

Forrest. Mrs Street and her late husband, pastoralist Philip Street of the distinguished legal family, were among the first to import alpacas to Australia.

'Our new landlords, the Forrest family, offered us this section of their Australian Alpaca Centre building when they heard we were looking for a new home,' says Philip, also an architect and the owner of local vineyard Pulpit Rock Estate.

'It definitely feels good to be back in the game,' says Annie. 'Berrima is such a pedestrian-orientated village where everyone walks around with their dogs, and so many of our friends have been popping in to say hello and welcome back.'

FEAST at BERRIMA is an intimate but well-lit space with an impressive wine list featuring many local wines. Customers can expect the same elegant dining Annie built her reputation on. Cooking with an Asian influence and an emphasis on local produce, her goal, she says, is 'always to cook the food I know my clients love and want'.

'Our customers are discerning people who appreciate a dish with all the condiments on one plate – a delicious finished product, if you like, all in one,' she says.

Looking at the dinner menu, there are many things that appeal to this hungry customer. I choose the seared scallops with shiitake, cauliflower, rocket and herbed sourdough crumbs, followed by the slow-cooked duck in orange and port with beans, creamed potatoes and fresh figs. My dining companion, who is Scottish and has a penchant for game, goes for the chargrilled boned quail with green papaya salad, and lime and pepper berry dressing, followed by the crisp pork belly with roasted pear, spinach, and caramel cashew and chilli glaze. My meal is a delight, with the duck falling off the bone effortlessly. The quail is moist and rich, and the pork likewise rich as well as sticky and with a decided kick. We finish by sharing a Valrhona chocolate ganache tart with praline and coffee anglaise ice cream.

Dining at FEAST at BERRIMA is akin to wrapping yourself in a cashmere blanket. The quality of the food and the beautifully understated service speaks for itself. Just as Annie and Philip set out to achieve again in the new setting.

FEAST at BERRIMA is open for a la carte and light lunches Wednesday to Sunday, and for dinner Friday and Saturday. Annie also has plans to launch a cooking school soon.

Winter is a magical time of the year in Bowral - roaring fires, fine food, and friendship.


And right at the entrance to the main street is the Imperial Hotel and Bistro, a favourite for locals and a warm stop-off point for visitors.

With an award-winning bistro in the front, an authentic wood-fired pizzeria and gelateria in the back, 4 open fires and a sunny courtyard, The Imperial Hotel is THE place to meet for lunch or dinner, or simply to catch-up with friends over a drink.

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PLAYING IT COOL

ESCAPE SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS VISITS A LOCAL SUCCESS STORY HAPPY TO LET ITS AWARDING WINNING WINES SPEAK FOR THEMSELVES.

If winning awards is anything to go by, the team at Tertini Wines set the bar high from the first release. Their 2006 Riesling picked up a gold medal and, 10 years later, the same wine earned an enviable 97 points on wine guru James Halliday's 100-point quality scale, this time as an aged Riesling.

ince those first vines were planted back in 2000, the Mittagong based vineyard has produced a long list of award winning wines, notably Pinot Noir and Chardonnay, in addition to their popular Riesling.

The drive along Kells Creek Road to this Highlands success story meanders through the picture-perfect landscape for which the area is famous. But don't expect undue fanfare from this vineyard. The subtle sign-posting under a towering eucalypt reflects Tertini's humble approach to self-promotion. Whilst they're proud of their five-star Halliday rating (awarded to winemakers with two or more 95+ ranked wines), they prefer to focus on producing premium wines, supporting the local community and taking care of their cellar-door customers.

Winemaker Jonathan Holgate is the reluctant star behind Tertini's success, a fairy tale that almost wasn't. Holgate initially studied engineering at university before a stint of work experience in the Hunter Valley convinced him to switch courses to wine science. Today, he is passionate about the benefits of producing wine in a region he considers to be one of Australia's true cool-climate areas.

'With a stretched-out growing season, it helps produce fruit with better character and higher natural acidity, an added benefit for one of the factors for ageing wine,' Holgate explains.

Tertini's commitment to producing premium wine means careful control of the crop load. Vines are hand-pruned and fruit is hand-picked under the keen eye of in-house viticulturist Mark Skenfield. It's all about being kind to the vines, too much fruit creates stress that can affect the quality.

Beyond the advantages of a cool climate, Tertini Wines, like other vineyards located in the region, benefits from a steady flow of tourists from Sydney, something Holgate believes other wine regions 'would die for'. The cellar door set-up is a relaxed affair and takes place around a handful of barrel tables, both indoors and out. On a sunny winter's day, choose the outdoor option under the pergola.

According to wine-tasting staff, the word about Tertini Wines is out, and most visitors arrive with at least some knowledge of what to expect. A selection of red and white

varieties is offered for sampling, along with small plates of cheese and biscuits.

It may be like asking parents to nominate a favourite child, but Holgate doesn't hesitate when asked which wine he most enjoys.

The emphasis seems to be on enjoyment

rather than hard selling, although free



shipping nationwide for case orders is a

'It's always fun working with the Pinot Noir,' he says. 'That variety is generally considered the holy grail of wine with most winemakers.'

Perhaps having fun is Holgate's secret sauce, as the Pinot Noir has consistently excelled, winning medals in Australia and internationally for the 2009 Reserve Pinot Noir, the 2014 and 2015 Pinot Noir, and the 2015 Private Cellar Collection Pinot Noir.

The day I visit, the 2017 Pinot Noir was being poured into barrels where it will spend around a year before bottling, ready for a 2019 release. And because in a regular work day Holgate is involved in the winemaking process from start to finish, he's a little twitchy in his seat as the pouring takes place. After explaning a little of how he makes his magic, he quickly disappears through the cellar door. No doubt to check the barrels of his next award-winner.



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

THE DRIVE

TOURIST DRIVE 17 begins in Mittagong. Home of the Southern Highlands Welcome Centre, so be sure to stop in on your left off the Hume Highway, and chat to the well-versed experts who will give you the lowdown on where to go and what to see in the Highlands. Pick up some handy maps and brochures, and some local produce to take home, before starting your adventure.

Just done the road on the left, past the Mittagong Charcoal Chicken where you can get great takeaway, is Winifred West Park with a playground and loos.

Browse the fabulous antique shops and vintage treasures like Twisting Vintage, and the many local cafés and restaurants. Mittagong RSL has good-value food and a great indoor play area for kids. If the kids need a run around, detour right off the old Hume Highway at Queen Street and head for Lake Alexandra Reserve. There is a great playground here, plus a track around the lake that's perfect for scootering or riding or running on. Feed the ducks, spot the resident turtles and other wildlife, and picnic in the grounds, or even cook your own lunch on the barbecues provided.

Follow the Tourist Drive along the Old Hume Highway out of Mittagong, cross over the freeway, turn right into Wombeyan Caves Road and find the Box Vale Walking Track. The 4.4km easy-grade track follows a historic railway line and cuttings through the natural sandstone. The walk takes about three hours. Visit nearby vineyards and cellar doors at Artemis, Tertini Wines and Centennial Vineyards.

Continue on towards Berrima, stopping beforehand at Bendooley Estate with its book barn and restaurant, cellar door and rare book department, where

you will find more than 200,000 preloved and rare books. Back on the road it is only a short journey to the historic village of Berrima, considered one of the best remaining examples of a small Australian town built in the 1830s. Many of the original buildings have been sensitively restored and now trade as craft shops, galleries and restaurants. One of the original coaching inns, the Surveyor General, is still operating and Berrima Court House (open daily) is classified by the National Trust, as is the beautifully restored Harper's Mansion.

Leave Berrima by crossing the Wingecarribee River and turn left at Francis Xavier Church. You will pass through rural countryside on your way to Moss Vale. If you want to see some real country life, stop in at the Southern Regional Livestock Exchange (the saleyards), on a Wednesday or Saturday. Continue into Moss Vale. Founded on ground originally granted by Governor Macquarie to Charles Throsby in 1819, Mossie is a thriving community of country and town people, increasingly attracting an eclectic range of artists, foodies and tree-changers.




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had joined the army so we went our separate ways again.

'Years ago I went to a church wedding, and as I sat there watching these two people get married, I realised that although the ceremony was about a lot of things, it was not really about the couple at the front of the church.

As a child, I always loved an audience. It was probably a middle child thing, but I was always the family comedian, in school plays and loved telling a story. So becoming a celebrant turned out to be the perfect role.

I have married hundreds of couples but when I started out several years ago, I had no idea the Southern Highlands was such a huge wedding destination. Hilarious, right?

But I'm someone who tends to have an idea and then makes it happen. Luckily for me, I just happen to live in this beautiful place where loads of people want to get married, so what was a bit of fun has turned into a full-time job.

I think being genuinely interested in people is at the heart of being a good celebrant. It's important you understand what makes each couple tick, and that you listen well. You need to make a connection so everyone feels comfortable, because as anyone who has ever married will tell you, weddings are strange occasions. To stand up in front of a large crowd and profess your love for another is daunting.

My role is to ensure the couple feel relaxed, supported and like they can be themselves. The guests can then engage and enjoy the moment too!

I am totally spoilt going to work each weekend. The Highlands has so many beautiful and unique venues - there are too many to name individually but there is definitely something for everyone here. Hopewood House is classic and sophisticated. Mali Brae Farm has great country views and top catering. Sylvan Glen is relaxed, and has the golf course. Milton Park's tulip lawn is lovely and The Briars' lake and willows are divine.

No two ceremonies are ever the same, but some stand out as completely unique. One couple threw an '80s dressup birthday party for the bride, which turned into a surprise wedding for the guests. I was in the band pretending to play the tambourine, the groom was dressed as a punk and the bride as Madonna - it was hysterical.

I recently conducted the marriage of Simon the Red Wiggle and his wife, Lauren. And last year I married a couple aged 87 and 82. That was a delightful and humbling experience.

As for the business side of things, it costs \$521 to get married at the Registry of Births, Deaths and Marriages. A newly trained celebrant may charge around \$600, and I've met others whose fee is \$1000. I'm somewhere around

I'm proud to say I've worked hard to grow in my job and I bring a lot of experience. I also rely on my intuition. I've been told that one of the things couples like about me, is that I reflect back to them the authenticity of the moment they are in. Importantly, it's their day, not mine.

This is not just a job, it's a real honour. I'm so lucky to have made friends with many couples I've married. Some call back for me to do their babies' naming ceremonies vears later.

I think the most important thing I've found through my own marriage of 17 years, and my work, is that real love isn't just about roses (even though roses are always nice!). It's about rolling up your sleeves and digging in the dirt to grow something beautiful together. It is messy, but wonderful.'

Some couples are hesitant to book in cooler months but this 5 per cent saving can go a long way. Traditionally lots of suppliers go on holiday during winter so couples need to book well in advance to avoid disappointment.

Cover all weather possibilities Look for sunny winter spots and wet weather options. The gardens at Bendooley are sheltered from the wind by deciduous trees that allow winter sun in to warm guests. The undercover pavilion by the lake is ideal for wet weather or on a cold, wintry day because the sides will go up and the heaters are kept blazing.

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ell into its winter season this year, the Sydney Hunt Club rides out on a dozen private properties spread over the Southern Highlands and Southern Tablelands, with more than 20 club members and their families. Riders range in age from 70 to 10, and the club's foxhound pack of 14-and-a-half couples (or 29 dogs in modern speak) is kennelled by Huntsman Donnchadh Brown near Yass.

Hunting to hounds was outlawed in Scotland, England and Wales last decade, however remains popular in France, the USA, Canada and New Zealand. In NSW and Victoria, where the fox is deemed a noxious pest, it is legal to hunt with hounds if riders and hounds are registered members of approved hunting groups, and meets are held on private land with the permission of the landowner.

Angus Stephen, Highlands local and president of the Sydney Hunt Club, says hunting to hounds is more than simply catching or running to ground Charlie or Todd (as the fox is referred to in fox-hunting terms). Rather, it allows riders to give their horses free rein and ride cross country. Something, he adds, that is becoming a rarity.

'For the vast majority of people who hunt, catching the fox is the least important aspect of the whole day,' says Stephen. 'What hunting to hounds is really about is the exhilaration, and the excitement of letting working horses have their head in an uncontrolled environment, and for riders to ride and jump what is in front of them.'


With hunting heritage going back to 16th-century Britain, strict protocol and tradition is still observed. The Huntsman, Whippers-in (who help set boundaries for the hounds to work in) and the Field Master wear colours – scarlet or red coats – to denote office. The Huntsman, who blows the hunting horn to signal to the pack, follows the hounds and rides out in front. The rest of the mounted field follow according to seniority. Stephen, who at over 195cm (6'5") tall, rides an off-the-track thoroughbred 'that used to be owned by the blokes from The Footy Show'.

'Yes, traditionally hunting to hounds is about trying to catch a fox but quite often, in my experience, the fox gets away. But more than that, today it's a way to ride horses like we used to. Sadly, we are increasingly seeing that capacity diminish, even when living in the country.'





IT IS ALSO HOME TO WONDERFUL SHOPPING, EATING, ACCOMMODATION AND LIFESTYLE OPTIONS. SO MUCH TO CRAM INTO JUST ONE DAY.





THE GOOD WIRN

9am: Arrive at the Bundanoon Railway Station in the centre of the bustling village.

Opened in 1868, here is where trains arrive regularly from Mittagong, Bowral and Moss Vale – and trains are a great way to see the countryside. A meeting and trading place for the Wadi-Wadi and Gundungurra peoples, the area was known to the first inhabitants as a 'place of deep gullies' and European settlers interpreted this word as 'Bundanoon'. Head straight to the Jumping Rock Cafe to savour a delicious pie, especially during Pie Time in June which is Destination Southern Highlands new winter festival initiative, or pop into Ye Olde Bicycle Shoppe for coffee and cake. Bundanoon was the first town in the world to ban plastic water bottles from shop shelves, so bring your reusable variety and fill at the numerous free fountains around.



10am: Pick up something to take home from The Good Yarn.

For 45 years, volunteers have given local arts and crafters an outlet, selling everything from children's smocked pinafores to woolly jumpers. This gem also stocks homemade jams and relishes, local eggs and honey, with the majority of takings going back into community charities and global grassroots initiative Bikes for Humanity. Just down the road, Nest & Burrow is another locally owned treasure trove of gifts, homewares, Italian leather goods and knitwear. Perfect for buying that keepsake, or three, to take home.

11.30am: Time for a morning amble.

Bundanoon is surrounded by the vast Morton National Park, which offers a range of bushwalks, and lookouts and sites to visit. Erith Park Coal Mine is a favourite with kids, while walkers with more stamina will enjoy the two-hour round walk to Tooth Lookout/Fairy Bowers Falls. For a family outing to remember, visit Glow Worm Glen at night. Starting at the top of William Street, the walk down to the glen and back takes about an hour, with the worms shining brightest between December and February. Don't forget to bring your torch, though. It's dark down there.





12.30pm: Lunchtime.

Local Bundy boy Byren is the chef and owner of DeliLicious along with wife Liezel. According to regulars, the menu offers amazingly tasty food made with fresh, seasonal and local ingredients.

2.30pm: Time to nurture body and soul.

Visit Quest for Life, a world-renowned centre started by the extraordinary Petrea King, to explore skills and strategies for creating peace and resilience in your life. An extensive program of residential and tailormade workshops is held within nine acres of beautiful grounds. Meanwhile, nearby Solar Springs Health Retreat offers pampering for tired bodies.



4.00pm:

In the early 20th century, Bundanoon was home to more than 60 questhouses catering for Sydney holiday rail travellers. Stay overnight and enjoy fine dining at the recently renovated Bundanoon Guest House, where chef Eon Waugh, previously of Josh's Café in Berrima and the

Studio Restaurant in Exeter, is carving a shining reputation. For self-contained accommodation, The Pill Factory, built by early settler W.A. Nicholas to manufacture his Golden Cross medicines, sleeps up to 36.




9.00am:

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


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


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
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
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


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
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


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
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IN MY BACKYARD

DESIGNER AND CURATOR SARAH KING SHOWS AND SELLS HER INIMITABLE FURNITURE AND HOMEWARE PIECES GLOBALLY, AND TAKES THE WORK OF OTHER AUSTRALIAN ARTISTS TO THE WORLD'S BIGGEST DESIGN FESTIVAL, THE MILAN FURNITURE FAIR. BUT IT IS A **CONVERTED STUDIO IN HER BACKYARD** MAKING HER CREATIVE JUICES FLOW OF LATE.

'I have been in Moss Vale for six years. Before that I moved with my family to Hobart from Sydney to do the big Tasmanian social experiment, and opened a design store there making and selling work from my own practise, Blakebrough+King and other local and international designers. But after returning from Hobart, it seemed too hard to go back to life in Sydney so we chose to live in Moss Vale.

When we moved to East Street, the area behind the house was a paddock with no trees. I planted about 120 trees, and we built this workshop in the backyard with blood, sweat and tears. It was a really industrial place full of machinery, where we designed and created. Blakebrough+King shows from a gallery called Criteria in Melbourne, and another 19 Greek Street in London.

When Gussie my youngest daughter turned 16 she wanted a big party with space for a DJ, so we cleared everything out of the studio, and I loved it. I'd been thinking all along what a great domestic space it would be. I still had a lot of stuff from the Hobart days so I opened a tiny private shop there, selling homewares and furniture. I opened for friends, and friends of friends. It was little but pretty effective which got me to thinking I should do something more with it. That's how it became what I term a weekender. It's a beautiful space for two to four people, with a downstairs studio area and an upstairs mezzanine.



True to my design style, it's furnished very minimally but functionally, and nothing is superfluous. It's all just beautiful stuff you need, and would love to take home. Which is lucky because most of it you can. Everything from the chairs, to the rugs, to the writing desk to the four-poster bed was either designed by Blakebrough+King, or by friends and colleagues who are also artists and designers. Even the bedsheets were made by my mum who has a linen business, Plane Tree Farm. The whole front of the building slides opens to the garden, and the freestanding bath is positioned in the living area downstairs with the bed, which is pretty luxurious. People seem to really like that. They also love the list of recommendations for local cafes and restaurants, and places to visit I have pulled together. My next door neighbours are small footprint farmers, and they provide me with an optional continental breakfast of yoghurt and granola if guests want it. We opened in February, have been full every weekend, and are booked up a month in advance. I love the guests I've been getting, and you seem to get the people you imagine would like it. It's a bit like match-matching. You get the right people for your place."

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
