


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
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

nybody else feel like it was only a nanosecond ago we were celebrating Christmas and enjoying summer, and now they're both approaching fast again?



OUR TOWNS AND VILLAGES

THE SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS IS MADE UP OF MANY TOWNS AND VILLAGES, EACH WITH ITS OWN UNIQUE CHARACTER, CHARM AND ATTRACTIONS. HERE'S A CHEAT SHEET SO YOU CAN GET ACQUAINTED WITH JUST SOME OF THEM. TO DISCOVER MORE, AND FOR MORE DETAIL, MAPS AND OTHER ESSENTIAL INFORMATION, VISIT DESTINATION SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS (SOUTHERN-HIGHLANDS.COM.AU).

BUNDANOON

Packed with old world charm, Bundanoon is a vibrant town with cafes, tearooms, antique dealers. Market days are held on the first and third Sundays, and bushwalking and mountain biking enthusiasts are drawn to the nearby Morton National Park. If you are overnighting or holidaying, stay and eat at the newly refurbished Bundanoon Guest House, or at tasty DeliLicious down the road. For body and soul, book a retreat at Quest for Life

EXETER

The Exeter Village Hall and adjoining park and oval lie at the heart of picturesque Exeter, a village of leafy streets and grand rows of trees. Exeter General Store performs its role as bookshop, post office, gourmet cafe and food store admirably. If browsing is on the cards, you'll find The Village Pump Antiques is worth a look and across the road, Bowerbird Lane at Halcyon Cottage is great for homewares and gifts. The Exeter village markets are held on the first Saturday of each month in the grounds of the village oval.

BURRAWANG

Quaint and historical, Burrawang is one of the Highland's most picture postcard villages. The newly renovated Burrawang Village Hotel (recently named Best Country Dining Venue - Country Southern in the Australian Hotels Association NSW awards 2018) with its huge grassy lawns overlooking rolling hills, is a popular accommodation and dining spot. As is the award winning Burrawang General Store Cafe across the road, with its great food served all day long and restored self contained accommodation. The 1883 School of Arts building in the main Hoddle Street plays host to the village's annual ball and don't miss the village's Easter markets, which are a highlight of the Highlands market calendar and attract more than 10,000 visitors.

HILL TOP


This northern village has a rich history as a former railway town and is now gateway to Australia's largest rail museum, Trainworks at Thirlmere. Don't miss terrific local lavender producer and cafe Belle Fleur Cottage, and the Cave Creek walking track too.

SUTTON FOREST

It might be small but Sutton Forest has stuff going on. Sutton Forest General Store, under new management, sells locally grown fruit & veg, pizza bases and homemade curries, The Everything Store, which lives up to its name, and the stunning Red Cow Farm gardens with its recently opened seasonal garden shop, definitely worth a visit or two.

REPRIMA

This pretty 1830s village has history (the heritage Old Berrima Gaol, iconic Berrima Courthouse and National Trust listed Harper's Mansion); nature (the Wingecarribee River runs through it); fantastic food (Eschalot, Josh's Cafe, Berrima General Store & Cafe and Feast at Berrima, plus excellent patisseries, cafes, local makers and artisans) as well as Australia's oldest continuously licensed inn, the Surveyor General. The Berrima Schoolyard Market is held on the fourth Sunday of every month from February to November in the grounds of the local primary school.



BOWRAL

Watched over by Mount Gibraltar. Bowral is the largest town in the Highlands. Full of historic public and private buildings, stunning country gardens and grand estates, this thriving country township is known for its vintage, interiors, antiques and homewares stores and precincts such as Dirty Janes and Green Lane, as well as markets, galleries, bookshops, nurseries and boutiques. Its dining scene has become all the richer recently with the opening of Dos Hombres, Grand Bistro and Bistro Officina, which complement winning stalwarts such as Biota Dining, Onesta Cucina, Cafe Rosso, Eccetera Trattoria Pizzeria, The Royal, Gumnut Patisserie and a raft of other local favourite restaurants, cafes and pubs. Visitors and locals are drawn to famous landmarks such as the Bradman Museum and International Cricket Hall of Fame, as well as the many festivals and events that include Tulip Time, the Bowral Classic and Bong Bong Picnic Races. And of course there is a plethora of award winning vineyards nearby, such as Centennial Vineyards, to visit as well.

CANYONLEIGH

Made up of large rural properties,
Canyonleigh lies at an altitude of 700
metres and is fast gaining a reputation as a wine producing area of the
Highlands. Situated on the drier
western edge of the region, it is a
great place to spot native wildlife

MOSS VALE

Centred around the Victorian era railway station in Argyle Street, Moss Vale is known for being a down to earth country town. The annual agricultural show is one of the biggest in the area, and recently the main street has undergone a revival with the opening of many independent artisan and homewares shops. Fantastic cafes and eateries such as Bernie's Diner, The Vale, Highlands Merchant and II Pranzo offer delicious eating choices, with newcomers Southern Highlands Brewing Kitchen & Taphouse, Birch and the Wine Mosaic Lounge bringing some well received glamour to old favourites such as Seafood Affair, and Briars Country Lodge and Historic Inn just up the road although the bar and restaurant is closed presently and expected to reopen early 2019 following a fire. All functions and events still on.

ROBERTSON

The small, character filled town of Robertson combines a rolling pastoral setting (did you know most of the movie Babe was filmed there?) with fabulous locally grown produce such as potatoes, truffles, pears, paddock raised eggs and award winning Pecora Dairy ewe's milk cheese. The newly changed-hands Robertson Inn is a great place for a family meal, and the stylishly revamped Robertson Hotel is a luxurious launch pad for a night, weekend or week in the Highlands. The iconic Robertson Pie Shop has a huge range of sweet and savoury pies and is open all year round, and Crop Swap every Saturday morning at the Bowling Club is a great place to mingle with the local Robbo green finger gardeners.

JOADJA

An area of farms and bushland on the periphery of the Southern Highlands, Joadja is steeped in history, once home to more than 1000 Scottish immigrants who mined shale oil in the late 1800s. The success of Joadja Estate winery, and more recently Joadja Distillery, has firmly put Joadja on the map

MITTAGONG

Historic Mittagong, the site of one of the first iron ore discoveries in Australia, has plenty to offer. From parks (try Lake Alexandra) to walks (the nearby Box Vale track with its incredible views of Nattai Gorge) to wineries (including Artemis Vineyard and Winery and Tertini Wines). There's also the treasure trove that is the Mittagong Antiques Centre, and fabulous craft and design centre Sturt with its shop, cafe and wood school as well as gem Twisting Vintage for preloved designer and couture clothing and the award winning café, The Shaggy Cow. Stop off at **Destination Southern Highlands** Welcome Centre on the way into Mittagong and get informed about what's on locally and stock up on locally made produce.

FITZROY FALLS

The tiny village of Fitzroy Falls, surrounded by farmland and wilderness, takes its name from the 81 metre waterfall in adjoining Morton National Park. The nearby Belmore Falls are equally spectacular. Head to the Fitzroy Falls picnic area for great views of the falls and for bird watching opportunities – you'll experience the sounds of lyrebirds if you're lucky. The deck at the Falls Cafe is a nice spot for refreshments as is the nearby Fitzroy Falls General Store.

MOVERS & SHAKERS

DREAM COME TRUE

AS IS OFTEN THE CASE WITH PEOPLE OR PROJECTS TERMED 'OVERNIGHT SUCCESSES', THE PATH TO THE SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS REGIONAL GALLERY HAS BEEN A LONG ONE; 25 YEARS, IN FACT.

The hankered for gallery was pushed over the line recently by the formidable force of local artists John Olsen and Ben Quilty along with the National Trust. The gallery will be

created in the heritage Old Dairy Building at Retford Park, following the buy in of the National Trust, gifted the property by the late James Fairfax, plus a commitment to recurrent funding by our local Wingecarribee Shire Council, philanthropists and a grant from NSW Government's regional cultural fund hopefully to be announced any day (fingers crossed). Local artist and teacher Sara Farmer has been on the Friends of the Southern Highlands Regional Gallery Committee since the idea was first mooted in 1994, and is thrilled the end is hopefully in sight: 'The gallery will be a not for profit cultural initiative with a variety of exhibition spaces and arts programs funded via government and private sector philanthropy. It will have the potential to house touring exhibitions, in house developed exhibitions, education programs and an artist in residence program. Local arts educators are very excited at the affordable arts opportunities ahead for our school students.' John Olsen, who has lived and painted in the Highlands for 20 years, said art in any community is vital because 'it is the difference between being blind and seeing the extraordinary'. 'The Southern Highlands Regional Art Gallery at Retford Park,' he says, 'is going to be a moveable, dynamic feast with exhibitions and educational programs for our school children that will greatly enrich this wonderful community.' Ben Quilty, himself father to two school aged children, said the gallery will provide affordable arts opportunities for all Highlands school pupils: 'Some people ask why we need a regional gallery when we are so close to Sydney. Well, it might be close if you are coming down here for a nice weekend to hang out, but if you have ever stood waving your kids

off to Sydney or Canberra at the crack of dawn on a bus excursion to see some art, you will know it's not that close. It's a long way in heavy traffic and on very busy roads. That argument also completely discounts the importance of a vibrant, diverse, healthy community really properly engaging with the visual arts. This regional gallery will add so much to our community.' Quilty, an Art Gallery NSW trustee, said he is hopeful work will begin on the regional gallery in the new

year and the Travelling Archibald will be one of the first exhibitions staged. Sara Farmer said Friends of the SHRG are already collaborating with the forward thinking National Trust on a Made in Australia event in May: 'The Supporters would like to invite any interested locals to become members, and help with fundraising, community consultation and information events we are planning for early 2019. This is of course contingent on the State Government go ahead, so we all have everything crossed.' The Highlands is home to many acclaimed makers, artisans and artists, including Tim Storrier, Max Miller, Danie Mellor, Zoe Young, Clara Adolphs, Vanessa Stockard and 2017 Sculpture by the Sea winner David Ball. HOT STUFF


We love a good collaboration, so great news that talented blacksmith and artist Steve Hogwood of 1910 has teamed up with Amanda Fry of outdoor experience company WildFest. Their joint venture, Think Wild, is operating out of the Old Stables at Peppers Manor House and will be a weekend working space for local artists (read all about another local venture, Southern Highlands Artisan Collective at Roberston, on page 100). Catch Steve, a blacksmith of 40 years, make his magic with live demonstrations as he fires up the forge in the 1880s stable. HOW MUCH IS THAT DOGGIE?

A dog is not just for Christmas. We all know the ad but it's a valuable reminder as Christmas rolls around again and the RSPCA tells us more cats and dogs are dumped over the summer months by owners off on holidays than at any other time. Which is why Escape



Southern Highlands wants to give a special shout out to the dedicated team of staff and volunteers at the Wingecarribee Animal Shelter. Opened in 2000, the shelter is managed by our local council and run by a small group of staff led by Vanessa Montgomery. She is ably assisted by more than 20 volunteer members of Friends of the Wingecarribee Animal Shelter (FOWAS). Self confessed dog and cat lovers, FOWAS members come in daily to spend time with the animals and have helped support the shelter for the past 13 years raising funds for surgery, medical treatment, dietary needs, retraining, transport and rescue costs for the animals. On average, the shelter holds 10 to 15 dogs and seven cats plus three litters of kittens at any one time. With a minimal euthanasia policy in place, they manage to rehome nearly 400 animals a year. The FOWAS gang will be holding their annual Christmas Raffle at Woolworths Bowral forecourt on December 21 and 22, with goodies for all the family (including the fur kids), and will hold their second A Dog's Day out with the National Trust at Retford Park in Bowral on April 28. If you can give a cat or a dog a loving life with your family, get along this summer or anytime and meet the residents at Wingecarribee Animal Shelter. 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HAPPY HUNTING GROUND

If you are a bit of a 'unique finds' aficionado, you will probably know of Hunter & Gatherer Collections. Owned by Ben Gowing and Daniel Percival, the unique hunting ground for art works, interiors products and furnishings was a shopping hotspot in inner city Sydney for many years. But as our luck would have it, Ben and Daniel decided they wanted a change of pace and moved to the Highlands two years ago, opening their new store in Moss Vale in September (look out for the distinctive black walls and striped awning on the terrace building next door to Jim Hindmarsh &Co). 'At heart, we are all hunters and gatherers,' says Ben. 'We hunt out things that bring us comfort, security and joy, which we gather close to us in our homes.' Hunter and Gatherer Collections began in 2012, selling paintings and photography by local and overseas artists. Over time, Ben and Daniel who today share their Highlands home with Weimaraner Frida and cat Eddie, expanded their interests to include a broad range of eclectic home décor, furniture and furnishings, such as bold Turkish cushions, glazed pots from China, pots, light fittings and lamps. Ben, a former horticulturalist at Taronga Zoo, has added a range of topiaries, flowering plants and outdoor pieces in the store's rear garden. He and Daniel, who is a heritage officer, are big on stocking unique pieces by clever locals, including handmade jewellery by an experienced Bundanoon jeweller who uses gems sourced from private collections around the world and a range of handcrafted lamps from Michael & Susie Yabsley's Wombat Hollow. PINUS RADIATA

Ron Geddes knows a thing or two about Christmas trees. Not only does he bear more than a passing resemblance to the Man in the Red Suit, he also has 40 acres on his Wingello farm where he grows pinus radiata, and a special machine from the US to trim them into the traditional Christmas shape. 'We plant them as 10 centimetre seedlings and fertilise them,' he says, 'and then God waters them for us.' Some of Grampy's Christmas Trees, as his business is known, go to Sydney, and others to local hotels like Links House in Bowral, but most go to local sitting rooms to delights kids. 

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SWEET DREAMS ARE MADE OF THIS

Luxurious surroundings, a sumptuous spa experience, and a cheeky cocktail or two make for a memorable overnight Highlands escape.

t's a Thursday evening and the carpark is full as we pull into the grounds of the Gibraltar Hotel in Bowral. After a long day shooting, photographer Elise Hassey and I are ready for a mini break. We head inside, greeted by a seeming oasis of calm. It's East meets West in here, with Eastern styled decor, Buddhist inspired sculpture, and long cool halls with high ceilings and polished floors.

Ree and Rahil at reception greet us like old friends and waste no time in taking us to our rooms. I am in 210, and after a day of rushing about, the feeling of space and serenity is fabulous. There is a giant king size bed, a great armchair, bathroom with double walk in shower and jet powered bath in the same vestibule, a mini bar and, for a night, thankfully only me. No dirty clothes on the floor, no Lego scattered underfoot, no one to pull the doona off during the night. This is bliss. I make a cup of tea (without being interrupted once), switch on the enormous TV (no-one playing on the Xbox) and open the

balcony door. If I was happy before, I am delighted now. On the balcony, overlooking Gibraltar's 18 hole Country Club golf course, I enjoy my tea as twilight falls and the sun sets over Mount Gibraltar in the distance.

I've stayed in quite a few Highlands accommodation options. Many are historic beauties with ancient bones that gurgle and rattle during the night, but Gibraltar Hotel in contrast is a new build. This is a room for an exec with a capsule wardrobe and lots of frequent flyer points. It's a five star location five minutes from Bowral but is also incredibly rural.

My room is well designed with a modern black and grey colour scheme. There are lush toiletries in the large bathroom. Near the fully stocked mini bar, the complimentary bottle of Cherry Tree Hill Shiraz from the local vineyard is a nice touch but I have a date with a Day Spa.

Therapist lanna is waiting for me, and directs me to a bathroom where a fluffy robe and slippers await. After some



peppermint tea, it's an hour of unadulterated bliss. As I sink my tired toes into the footbath, I remind myself to return to the Gibraltar Day Spa as a non guest. This desire is reinforced during the back, leg and neck massage with botanic oils. I try to stay awake to savour every moment but lanna's hands are deft, and before I know it she is waking me from a deep massaged sleep.

Like many top accommodation venues in the Highlands, the Day Spa is a big sell for wedding parties, and lanna and her fellow therapists have been kept busy all day massaging and preening a wedding party with a range of body treatments, alternative treatments, organic facials and spa rituals.

I hightail it back to my room. I have a zing in my step and it's time for a cocktail in Gibraltar's Harveys Bar. The bar is named after local and pianist Geoff Harvey, famous for his role as band leader on Ray Martin's *Midday* TV show. But tonight as Elise and I take a seat, someone else is playing and he's got the bar jumping.

This is one of the late night hotspots in the Highlands. Often kept open for wedding guests or events, it is licensed until 3am. Tomorrow's wedding party is already here. The bride and her maids are surrounded by enormous white boxes tied with enticing pink ribbons. We hypothesise about what's in the boxes as we wait for our cocktails. Shoes? Corsets? Lingerie?

As we order our shared platter for dinner, the groom is singing karaoke with the pianist. Weddings are big business

in the Highlands and the Gibraltar has three in the next three days, with presumably most finishing up here with joyous renditions of Khe Sanh and other Cold Chisel classics.

Our shared platter is a good option if you don't want to eat more formally next door in licensed restaurant San

Fior, and I'm delighted to see that local maker, Mrs Bucket's pate is part of the spread. Tired but relaxed we leave the groom's party to it. Tucking myself into bed, I hope they find the Berroca Performance Drink in their mini bar. I think they will need it. My king sized bed has the most comfortable pillows I have ever slept on away from home in the Highlands, and I fall asleep to the croaking lullaby of the frogs outside.

I wake as clear as a whistle and fill up on an extensive hot and cold breakfast buffet., and watch as the now not so sprightly groom and his mates also come for breakfast. With wedding ceremonies often held on the lawns outside, you can do the whole kit and kaboodle here, from putting up your guests (76 rooms in total) then celebrating into the wee hours.

The Gibraltar Hotel offers five star service, great facilities and an easy elegance. As I say goodbye to my room, I glance at the welcome folder, which says, 'Welcome to the best kept secret in the Southern Highlands'. Time to talk it up guys. This is five star accommodation that holds its own in any town.



Do you come from an arty, design savvy family? There's a lot of artistic talent on my mother's side, and I grew up in a home full of creative flair. My mum taught me colour and basic design principals without



even realising she was doing it. Any childhood memories that helped you become a creative adult? One of my aunts lived with us while she studied architecture, and I spent hours pouring through her books and magazines, using her drafting board to design my dream home. The passion started there. How do you describe your style? I don't align myself with one specific style but given most of my work is now based in the Highlands, there is an overriding rural/rustic and often traditional setting to my projects. My design principal is to blend contemporary with classic. I love the juxtaposition of old and new but for me it's all about helping clients create a home that is uniquely theirs, and meets their functional needs. Do you help your clients find their style? Often by the time a prospective client contacts me they have spent months, even years trolling the internet to find the style direction they are after. My job is to edit through their ideas, and reference images to find our way to an aesthetic that suits. How has living in the Highlands helped your business? I moved here from Sydney and at first was terrified at going out on my own, but soon realised the unique opportunities on offer. Firstly the historic homes, estates and contemporary builds and the incredible network of creatives, which I've called on time and time again to commission unique pieces for my projects. Today I have a community of local trades, artists and makers I rely on 100% to do right by me and my clients. What's your golden rule when it comes to styling your own home? I am very eclectic and I love the mix of old and new. As far as a quick fix golden rule, always have fresh cut flowers or some greenery indoors. Not so many years ago the idea of contemporary interior designers working in Moss Vale seemed improbable. What's changed? People in the cities are catching on to how good we have it down here. So many of my clients are tree changers from Sydney. This new wave of city slickers bring with them a thirst for a more contemporary aesthetic than what has traditionally been on offer in the Highlands. They are also often younger families inspired by current trends and design developments. Their needs have helped support some of the new businesses (including mine) locally. And finally where do you sit on the handmade versus mass produced argument? I try to incorporate commissions for handmade pieces in all my projects. I do this to support my local peers whose work I admire and uphold, and I love the design process of working with these makers and my clients to create something completely bespoke and specific to a space. BED AND BREAKFAST AND BLISS

THE LOCH AT BERRIMA IS WELL WORTH A STAY FOR ITS UNIQUE APPROACH, COMFY ACCOMMODATION AND FRESH FOOD FROM SOURCES SUCH AS A CLUTCH OF HENS ALL CALLED HELEN. WORDS JANE O'CONNELL

hen chef Brigid Kennedy first looked around the bare paddock of what would become The Loch, dozens of thought bubbles emerged. But it was the unique idea of creating a bed and breakfast venue for horses and their owners that momentarily caught her fancy.

'As it turns out, people don't really want luxury accommodation with their horses. If they can afford luxury, they normally have a very flash truck and stay with their horse rather than their horse stay with them.'

But the ideas kept coming, and in partnership with husband Kevin Nott, her Berrima project emerged as four charming self contained suites, spectacular chef's gardens and one of the most popular long lunch venues in the Southern Highlands.

Each of the bedroom suites is named after a Scottish town beginning with 'A', reflecting Kevin's lineage and the Scottish friend

who introduced them to the property in 2011. So they are Aberdeen, Arran, Ayr and Argyle (my room for the night.)

Antique furniture and furnishings, including a stately French tapestry in the Argyle suite, are courtesy of family collections. Three of the four suites have queen sized beds, and the fourth (Ayr) can be configured as either a king or two single beds. Bathrooms complement the style of each room; the Argyle's ensuite has a freestanding bath, spacious shower recess and views over the paddock where horses and cattle graze. Savon de Marseille soap is a lovely touch of luxury.

At the other end of the building, separated from the guest rooms by a mezzanine bridge, is the chef appointed kitchen that has been set up for guests to cook to their heart's content. A long timber dining table transitions to the lounge area where a selection of seating options are centred around a large fireplace. If the mood calls for solitude, there are nooks to curl up quietly and read, or for those feeling more social, space to set up a board game or strike up conversation with other guests.

One floor down, the stables have been beautifully converted and filled with antique furniture and bric-a-brac for guests to browse and buy, along with a market stall with baskets of fruit and vegetables picked from the surrounding fields.

Guests are encouraged to explore the many different chef's gardens, planted by Brigid to rotate through the seasons and take advantage of the cool climate that first drew her to the Highlands. She points out different beans and berries, herbs, salad leaves and tiny edible flowers. Down the back, the orchard grows quince, four or five different varieties of apples, peaches, plums, apricots and pears. We wander past the citrus trees and a small olive grove, and say a quick hello to the chooks (they're all named Helen).

Accommodation includes a delicious home cooked breakfast (for our stay it was eggs on a bed of kale and potato hash cake, sweetmeat kibbeh and truffle shavings). The fridge is stocked with jugs of juice and milk, and on the island bench is laid out a hearty buffet for quests to help themselves with bowls of gluten free granola,

poached pears and creamy butter to spread on warm, crusty bread.

Breakfast is a decadent sample of the gourmet approach at the centre of The Loch's offerings. Every Sunday, Brigid opens the doors to her Tasting Room and cooks for up to 60 diners. Produce is harvested from her gardens a day or so earlier and beverages showcase the wares of local wine, beer, cider and sparkling water producers. When the weather is warm, lunch is served on the property's back verandah with leafy sultana vines overhead, just a stone's throw from the source for the freshest of paddock to plate dining.



The Loch is an ideal weekend getaway for couples, small groups or multiple generations of family, and children are welcome. Each season delivers a different farm adventure, enhanced by Brigid's creative touch and thoughtfully designed to offer guests an authentic and memorable Highlands experience.


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
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
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s Carol approaches her 1st anniversary of owning the renowned Mrs Oldbucks Pantry in Berrima, she often reflects on the changes that have occurred in that brief time. Where Mrs Oldbucks really shines now is not just with the impressive range of specialty tea and jams, chutneys and pickles but a range of local produce that includes honey, locally roasted coffee, black garlic and the renowned Oldbucks furniture

polish... the list goes on. This past year has seen Mrs Oldbucks Pantry become an important destination for those who appreciate the fine culinary extras from the Highlands and abroad that now adorn the shelves.

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
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GONE FLY FISHING

LEARN HOW TO TIE A FLY AND THAT FAMOUS CASTING TECHNIQUE, AND EXPERIENCE THE CHALLENGE AND JOY OF THIS INCREASINGLY POPULAR LOCAL PASTIME. WORDS ALEX SPEED

e's been told he looks a lot like the Honey Badger lately, but Aussie Fly Fisher instructor and guide Angus Reynolds just grins when I mention the resemblance and says he's not bothered by it.

For while his doppelganger and former Wallaby Nick Cummins continues to receive a social media caning after his disastrous appearance on *The Bachelor Australia*, Angus is living his dream guiding and fly fishing across the Highlands. Given his troubles, maybe the Honey Badger would be advised to take some time out with Angus and a fly rod down in our neck of the woods...


'Everyone's welcome,' laughs Angus. 'Fly fishing originates from the UK, where it used to be an elite sport as many people couldn't afford the time to fish because they were always working. But today it's different. The earlier you or your kids get hooked, the better I reckon for later in life.'

Angus is a local born and bred who has been fishing all his life. Growing up in

Burradoo and Moss Vale, he got hooked on fly fishing at age 13. His dad, Roy, is also a keen fisherman.

'Dad always had a fly rod about, so I'd pick it up and have a go, and me and my mates would take our hand lines and ride our pushbikes out to Penrose looking for secret tracks leading to streams and creeks to fish. It wasn't until late high school, though, that I started to get a big interest in fly fishing, and at university I started tying flies.'

An industrial design course led to a stint with a yacht design company, which in turn saw Angus start work on a private 60 metre purpose built fly fishing boat in the Seychelles. After two years he came home from catching giant trevally and tuna, and began guiding locally for Josh Hutchins. Acclaimed in



the world of fly fishing and founder of Aussie Fly Fisher, Josh started taking Angus out to help with up to four paying clients for a full day of fishing.

'I had heard of Josh and knew he was really good, and that he had completely pioneered the way fishing guiding is done in Australia, so it was great to start working with him,' recalls Angus. 'When he came into work one day and said, "I've got another baby on the way, how would you feel about doing some guiding here?" I leapt at the chance.'

Fly fishing, explains Angus, is a sport of skill, patience and persistence, where 'thinking like a fish definitely helps get the fish into your net'. The mechanisms used to help with the job are a fly rod, fly reel, fly line and hand tied fishing flies. As Angus expertly ties and puts a black nymph (perfect for trout and tied to imitate a newly hatching fly larvae) onto the end of his line, the tippet, he tells me the role of the hand tied flies is to 'match the hatch' (the fly to what the local insect larvae resting on the water, which in turn is what the local fish are eating).

'The fly line is a pretty marvellously engineered bit of technology, even though it looks simply like a rubber cord,' says Angus. 'On the reel it starts thin and then tapers in various ways to a very fine and delicate tip where the flies and hook are positioned. That is so you can discreetly cast these little bits of feather tied to a hook that look like a bug onto the water without the fish seeing the person fishing, the line or the hook.'

Casting his line out in that famous back and forwards motion, Angus makes it all appear supremely easy. It's not. That's ok, he reassures me as my next cast goes askew. Becoming proficient at fly fishing takes years, he tells me, but the sport is growing exponentially in Australia thanks to the efforts of stalwarts such as Hutchins and fishing legend Rex 'Yibbetty Yibbetter' Hunt.

'A lot of the lure of fly fishing is the short but very intense relationship you build with the fish as you try to catch it by trying to work out what it's thinking and where it's heading,' says Angus.

In terms of other NSW fly fishing locations like the Snowy Mountains and the Blue Mountains, Angus believes the Southern Highlands is underrated. Here we have trout, bass and his favourite, carp ('they are bigger than trout, smarter than trout and they fight harder than trout').

'Flying fishing here is unique because it offers a very different landscape to those other places in NSW and Australia. We have special microclimates like rainforests, unique creeks and rivers. And although the average is two to three pound fish, there are also big fish here, and all will give you a great day of sporting fishing. It's all about knowing where they are at any one time, really.'

A day with Angus and Aussie Fly Fisher includes guiding and tuition, lunch, snacks and beverages, a fly rod, reel and line, waders and boots if required. And, of course, the flies.

All fish caught are released with the 'catch and release' mentality Rex Hunt made famous. And finally, says Angus, don't expect him to tell you his secret fishing spots beforehand (although he does let slip the Wingecarribee River and Pejar Dam near Goulburn are favourites).

'We get a lot of repeat clients so I think people really like the experience of having someone there to tie their flies who has done the research, and who knows where to go and where the fish are at that time of year.

'You might go out on your own for a day's fishing and think it's a free day out. But you still have the costs of transport and the flies you lose, getting lost, the cost of lunch and not having the local knowledge of where to go. With me you are pretty much guaranteed to find a fish. I can't promise you'll definitely hook it, but that's an altogether different story.'

We love us a local collaboration, and Tracy and Vicki Nickl at Gumnut Patisserie and Jacob and Deb Newman just across the road at Eden Brewery in Mittagong are once again making some wonderful Christmas/summer music together. Get your laughing gear around Eden's Yule Christmas Ale, made with Gumnut's delicious fruit mince pies – no lies! Or fancy a meat pie for your summer table? Try Gumnut's Eden Beef Pie made with, you guessed it, Eden Brewery's beer. Or just get into both places and buy a gingerbread house or yule log from Gumnut and one of Eden's mixed family packs with three different beers from their own fabulous core range. If the name isn't enough to get your attention (Hyacinth Bucket, Lady of the House), the cooking of Biddy and Jean-Pierre Maupin of Lady Bucket's Kitchen should be. Best pate south of the Great Dividing Range in our book, and their fruit cakes with no added sugar, butter, oil, eggs or dairy that also come gluten free aren't half bad either. Working out of their Moss Vale kitchen, this French-Australian couple are the real deal, chef de cuisines. 'We produce about 17 jams, relishes and chutneys plus chicken and duck pates and pork rillette,' says Biddy. 'We also make a fruit cake that basically comes with no hidden extras in three sizes, and nearly all the fruit we use is organic.' Jean-Pierre was born near Giverny in France (where Claude Monet lived) and after meeting in 1968 the couple lived in Paris before returning to Australia in 1975. They now sell their delicious fare at the Exeter, Berrima and Mittagong markets, and supply the Gibraltar Hotel with pate (see our review on page 26). The couple are set to celebrate their 50th anniversary soon. So what's the secret of happy cooking and cohabiting? 'Well, we do work as a team, but JP tells anyone who will listen that he is the kitchenhand,' laughs Biddy. 'In point of fact he makes the fruit cakes and prepares the livers for me to make the pates. He also helps cut the fruit and helps with the washing up.' biddymaupin@yahoo.com.au ▶



Year's leg of lamb? Get in touch then with local fourth generation cattle and sheep farmers James and Belinda Galbraith.

'We don't use antibiotics, hormones or growth enhancers on our animals,' says Belinda. 'They just eat grass, which is what they're meant to do as ruminants, so they tend to be healthier than grain fed animals. That comes through in the taste.' Meat is hung for 10 days before being butchered at Oxley Butchery in Bowral and can be locally delivered or picked up from their farm, Medway. 'We find most people do prefer to visit the farm to pick up their meat. They like to see where their meat is coming from, meet the farmer and see the animals happily grazing.' So when it comes to summer cooking, what do the Galbraiths recommend? 'Our favourite cut would have to be beef fillet,' says Belinda. 'Seared in a pan and finished off in the oven and basted with butter. Simply succulent! Or a lamb shoulder smothered in garlic and seeded mustard, roasted low and slow for at least five hours until the meat falls off the bone.' medwayfarm.com.au

A summer without a cheese platter is no summer at all. So next time you're thinking cheese, think local and seek out Yarrawa, Australia's first noncooked raw milk cheese. Made by clever Robertson cheese makers Cressida and Michael McNamara of Pecora Dairy, and named after Robertson's unique cool climate rainforest Yarrawa, this is a pure ewe's milk cheese. 'Yarrawa is a zippy Spanish style semi hard cheese with herbaceous, citrus and floral notes,' says Cressida. 'It has exceptionally clean flavours and a lingering finish.' Yum. 
Maugers Meats, Burrawang & Moss Vale

Word of mouth is a powerful marketing tool. It also works well to promote buying local, which is why Maugers' hams are so popular. 'We are the exclusive Highlands supplier of Borrowdale Free Range Pork, a larger pig, full of flavour,' says butcher Mat Mauger. 'We soak our hams after pickling to make sure they are full of flavour, and we use the traditional smoking technique with real wood chips in our custom built smoker over a long period of about 14 to 20 hours per ham. It's the same process we have used for 40 years and it's true you can really taste the difference.' Although Maugers hams are in high demand over Christmas and summer, Mat says supplying locally makes the team strive to produce the highest quality all year round. 'Being small and local we want to make a living, but more importantly reputation is everything, and the people we serve are as much friends as they are customers. To us, supporting local businesses means a stronger community where we work for each other, not just a profit line.' maugers.com.au

Redleaf Farm, Fitzroy Falls

Katrina and Sam Sparke aren't ones to blow their own trumpet when it comes to the quality of their fare, so a gold medal in the National delicious. Produce Awards for their free range suckling pigs did it for them. Katrina says it is off to market now for their little piggies: 'We have a couple of our suckling pig litters available for on the spit and we have a few packages available where we provide the pig, then Sam comes and sets it up at your place, gets it going and leaves the customer to be hero when it's cooked. We also have smaller piglets that can be done whole in the oven for special festive events, and free range lambs which won a gold medal in the delicious. awards last year that are also great on one of our spits for a party, family function or celebratory barbecue. We have some of our own salami ready too, which is delicious and perfect for summer cheese boards and antipasto platters.' redleaf-farm.com





WELCOME TO THE BARN

James Viles doesn't keep still for very long. Now the acclaimed chef and founder of two hatted Biota Dining in Bowral is pushing the boundaries again with 'Biota's wild little sibling' in a shearing shed in East Kangaloon. James chatted to ESH.

ESH: The idea for Barn by Biota has been brewing for some time? JV: Yes, definitely. The idea started more than a year and a half ago, and working on finding the ideal location took time. I am so excited because I have had a while to think about every detail and now it's a reality. ESH: What was the impetus? JV: We wanted to create a place where everything was hyper local, and where the seasons and local produce dictate what we serve and when we open. It's a restaurant with a much looser structure and a lot more freedom. My friendship with Louise and John Keats, the people who own the land where Barn by Biota is located, was also a big factor. They are locals and longtime supporters of Biota, both are really passionate about

produce, and Barn is a joint venture with them. I also had the ideal head chef in Ryan Kovac. ESH: How will it differ from Biota? JV: The food and atmosphere at Barn will be really different. Because we are open for such a limited number of days, we have a lot more freedom and flexibility with the menu. It's all communal dining, and guests will be given a set time to arrive and have a full experience, including a walk around the property, fishing for vabbies, then all sitting down together at a big table for a feast. They can stay on site too. ESH: It seems very important for you to feel really connected to the land that grows the food you cook. JV: It's vital to me to be really hands on and have that connection with Mother Nature, and it continues to grow in importance for me the more I travel this amazing country. We already

grow our own stock for use at both Biota and Barn; we have a meat program with John Keats where we are fattening pure bred Angus. The first beef from that program will be served in January when Barn opens, and will be served at Biota, too. We are also purchasing all the male lambs from Pecora Dairy, and using them at different stages, from spring lamb to hogget and mutton. ESH: You have always been a great supporter of local producers, like the Good Garlic Guy, Pecora, Redleaf

and Quarter Acre Farm. Are you working with any new local producers to help with this new venture? JV: Yes, we will still be working with all our favourites at Barn, plus some new ones like Taluca Park. We're also expanding our use of some producers, for example Redleaf are now supplying our eggs too. A lot of locals have always given us small quantities of their own produce from their own backyards or tiny farms. Boxes of fruit like figs and apples or 20kg of the most amazing tomatoes. And now we can really take advantage of such produce at Barn by building our menu around it. ESH: How will Barn by Biota fit into the SH dining scene? JV: I think Barn is something new for the area. It's not a concept that exists, but it adds to the richness of what is here already.

The Night Before Christmas Pudding

1/2 cup blanched almonds

1/2 cup pitted dates, chopped

2 cups plain flour

2 cups milk

1 tsp mixed spice

2 tbl butter

1/2 tsp ground nutmeg

1 tsp vanilla

1/2 tsp ginger

2 tsp bicarbonate of soda

1 cup firmly packed brown sugar

Icing sugar to dust

375 pkt mixed dried fruit

Preheat oven to 180C.

Spread the almonds over a baking tray and toast in oven for 8 to 10 minutes. Remove from oven and roughly chop and set aside. Sift the flower, mixed spice, nutmeg and ginger into a large bowl. Add the almonds, sugar, mixed dried fruits and dates and stir to combine. Place the milk and butter in a saucepan and bring to the boil over medium heat. Remove from the heat, add the vanilla essence and bicarbonate of soda and stir well. Add to the fruit mixture and stir well. The pudding mixture will be quite wet. Place a square 60cm piece of calico on a work surface and spoon the pudding mixture into the centre. Gather the cloth up around the mixture and tie tightly with white kitchen string to seal, leave a space of about 3cm above the mixture for expansion during cooking. Add enough water to a large saucepan to reach a quarter of the way up the side, and bring to the boil. Add the pudding, the water should reach halfway up the side of the pudding. Cover with a lid and boil over medium heat for three hours adding more boiling water if needed. Transfer the pudding to a plate and set aside for 10 minutes. Carefully peel away the calico, turn onto a plate and decorate as desired Served dusted with icing sugar and accompanied with sauce below. The square calico cloth in which the pudding is cooked is not lined with flour in the traditional way. As a result the pudding will last only a few days in the fridge after cooking.

Brandyscotch Sauce

1/2 cup of milk 1/4 cup golden syrup
1/2 cup cream 1 tsp cornflour

Vanilla bean 1/2 cup whipped cream

2 egg yolks Wild brumby butterscotch schnapps

Scald milk and cream with vanilla bean in saucepan. Beat egg yolks and golden syrup together. Add corn flour. Add this mixture to the milk and cream. Cook over low to medium heat, stirring constantly until thickened. Strain and chill. Just before folding in the whipped cream stir a dash of brandy then a dash of butterscotch schnapps in until it's scrumptious. Double for extended family.

ico Coccia grew up immersed in food. He recalls being a tiny boy and watching his mother and grandmother cook. The sea and the natural produce grown in the rich countryside of Southern Italy were his family's larder.

'Ever since I was a baby my grandmother would start to cook from the morning,' says Nico. 'My mother is from Naples but my father comes from Puglia, the heel of Italy's boot, and Puglia is surrounded by three different seas, the Adriatic, the Ionian and the Mediterranean. Plus in Puglia you have one of the big lakes, Lago di Varano, where my grandfather would farm for mussels and eels and my grandmother would cook the fish.

'My father owns 250 olive trees, some of which are more than 400 years old, which he harvests to make his own olive oil.'

Nico is owner of twice hatted restaurant Bistro Officina in Bowral with partner Alex, mother of their three children. The pair met at fine dining stalwart Otto in Sydney, where Alex was front of house, and went on to open their Highlands restaurant in 2016.

Next door to the boutique Berida Hotel, their urbane restaurant fast earnt a reputation as one of *the* places to eat in the Southern Highlands. Nico is a bear of a man, with tattoo sleeved arms and dark eyes, and the restaurant is a masculine space. Think welcoming man cave with wood fired ovens burning, stags heads on the walls, leather armchairs, dark wood, and moody works by artist Thomas Bucich, including a large charcoal portrait of Nico. Even the front of house here has a name to match the virility of design and decor. Ulysses. How utterly fabulous.

It's a Monday evening, traditionally a quiet night in the restaurant game, and we've chosen the 6pm slot to eat. The empty tables don't bother us at all, though. Far from it. We've eaten here when this place is jumping, especially come midweek lunch times and weekends when the locals take up residence in the bar area.

Bistro Officina takes its name from the 20th century when dictator Benito Mussolini was in power in Italy from 1922 to 1943.

'In a time of deep corruption, censorship, control and lack of freedom,' the restaurant's website explains, 'many underground garages opened up at the back of houses, where Italian grandmothers would cook their delicious homemade pasta to sell to the poor people riddled by war.'

These little garages were called Officina, and although the raison d'etre is very different today, the meal we enjoy certainly has its roots in proud Italian cooking and nourishing fare.

Sourdough bread with hay smoked butter, both house specialities, are brought to the table along with the starters, taramasalata with seaweed crackers and kingfish sashimi with fermented lettuce, citrus cream foam and beach bananas, a sea vegetable also known as karkalla or pig face. This native succulent with its briny taste adds some crunch to the melt in the mouth kingfish. A glass or two of local winery St Maur's chardonnay is a lovely accompaniment.

The kitchen is open to the bistro through a large serving hatch, and we watch and chat as Nico plates up as the tables fill up. Three traditional Italian wood fire ovens burn behind him. Nico cooks all his dishes on fire, with wood smoke and flames, another throwback to his family heritage. After working previously in Spain, Italy, England, New Zealand and finally Australia, he says getting back to basics is what helped him rediscover his love for food with this restaurant.

'I worked for 17 years in fine dining all around the world but I had start (sic) to be tired,' he says. 'I was tired to go in the morning to work. I felt like a robot and I was almost losing my love for the food.

'The food is the first thing and I thought about my grandmother. She still has the wood stove and she always cooks with wood. If you think of the few things you need to cook on it, fire, water and produce, that's it. So when we opened here we made a big decision to make food from the wood stove and the produce, that's all. Whatever the farms bring me.'



He is a big supporter of local producers such as Redleaf Farm and Pecora Dairy. Tonight we feast on his gnocchi with four cheese fromage fondue. Rich and delicious, it is a perfect example of what he and Alex set out to do here. It's a thoroughly modern take on an Italian classic... you can almost imagine his Nona in Puglia spooning this out for the pickers come olive oil harvest in October.

But the main event of the meal for us has to be the West Australian marron served with burnt orange butter and lemon zest on a bed of avruga. A brilliant red with a concertina carapace, this luminous freshwater crayfish is almost too beautiful to eat. But we do, of course, and the sweetness of the meat is offset by the piquancy of the burnt orange. It is a master dish.

Dessert is Nico's take on tirasumi, leaving us feeling fully replete after this fabulous meal. It's something you will want to take home and remember. And now you can, thanks to Nico and Alex's first book, *Farm to Flame*. Published by Quicksand Foods, and available at Bistro Officina and The Bookshop Bowral, this sumptuous 230 page hardback with photography by Ashley Mackevicius features 70 of Nico's big, ballsy, fire fuelled recipes. It is the culmination of another long held dream, and pays homage to Nico's heritage and the local Highlands producers he depends on to create his unique dishes.

'It has always been my dream to do the cookbook because firstly I am far away from my home country and, secondly, if you write something down it will last for ever. Restaurants can come and go but with a cookbook it is written into history.'

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


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

Valero and Elisa are waiting at the entrance of a cavernous shed when I pull off the dirt road bringing a cloud of dust. Inside is a collection of copper pot stills and fermenters, and an alcove crammed with old oak barrels. In a past life the barrels stored Spanish sherry and the sticky residue is the magic ingredient for ageing whisky, a technique the Scots have used for generations. According to Valero, all the taste and complexity comes from the barrel: 'It turns into liquid gold.'

The most sought after barrels are ex Oloroso and ex Pedro Ximénez from the Andalusia region of southern Spain, where both Valero and Elisa were born. (They moved to Australia with their respective families as young children, but didn't meet for another 17 years.) Elisa later discovered she had Spanish relatives who made the barrels, and the couple agreed there were too many signs to ignore. They sold their backpacker hostel in Sydney and Joadja became their full time business.

Visitors may be lucky enough to see a kangaroo poke its head through the shed door when Valero is mashing the barley with an oversized paddle, as some are so drawn to the smell they'll even venture inside. During the distilling process, Valero tinkers constantly, controlling energy levels to optimise flavours.


The spirit is aged in barrels for a minimum of two years before it can officially be called whisky. Joadja's first batch, released in 2018, sold out within hours, fuelled by word of mouth and a few popular whisky blogs.


When sampling single malt whisky, Valero has the following tips: 'Taste it first, neat, at room temperature. Nose it, think about it, get to know the whisky. Then you can add a bit of water to open up other flavours. After that, do whatever you want.'

Later they launched Joadja Dry Gin, with its shorter production process, as a stop gap product in between batches of whisky and now it is a big seller. The aroma of juniper berries and botanicals, including cardamom, angelica root and anise, is delicate and delicious. The Joadja Distillery also produces Anise liqueur, Outlaw malted grain spirit and Crossbones Freebooter cane spirit, all available to buy online or at the distillery.

More than one hundred years have passed since the mine closed and the community dispersed, but the spirit of those first Scottish settlers has had a 21st century boost and lives on through the Jimenez family.

Joadja Distillery is open Saturday and Sunday over summer from 10am-4pm subject to weather. Valero advises visitors to call ahead or check online.







Bec and Amy's wedding on March 17 felt extra special to them, their family and friends after a long campaign for marriage equality. They were elated when on November 14 last year the Australian public voted to legalise same sex marriage and on December 7 when Australia's federal parliament legislated to allow two people, regardless of their sex, to marry.

'Our wedding was a few short months after the marriage equality vote and it ended up being one of the first legal same sex marriages in Australia,' recalls Bec.

'We wanted our ceremony to reflect how hard we had fought for equality and to recognise how grateful we were for all of our family and friends who had been by our side every step of the way through the campaign.

'Our celebrant, Nina, helped us to recognise and acknowledge the LGBTIQ community who had paved the way and fought for our right to marry long before the vote was announced. We included a quote from Penny Wong in our ceremony, talking about the importance of equality and its contribution to the Australian community.'

Amy takes up the story. 'Ours was the first same sex wedding that many of our guests had been to, and that made it a pretty special event. It brought to light why we had all fought so hard for marriage equality. It was an emotional ceremony, and so personal and special to us. I think it's fair to say there wasn't a dry eye in the house.'

The couple held their ceremony on a friend's property and then moved to the nearby Upper Kangaroo River Community Hall for the reception. Situated next to the historic footbridge that spans the Kangaroo River, the hall is a cultural foundation of the local community.

'We fell in love with the Upper Kangaroo River Hall. It was exactly our style. We felt so privileged to be able to celebrate our marriage in a venue with such history and importance to the Kangaroo Valley community,' says Bec.

The couple added lots of DIY elements to personalise the day. 'We are lucky to have lots of crafty friends who helped us out,' laughs Bec. 'One of Amy's very talented sisters did all of our flowers for us, and another handmade our beautiful arbour. Two of our friends made jams and relishes from produce grown in their own garden for our wedding favours. My nanna altered my wedding dress and made my sash by hand. And we spent months collecting vintage amber glasses and decorations for the tables from op shops all over the ACT and NSW, and combined them on the tables with olive branches from my mum's garden and eucalypts from my nanna's garden. We felt incredibly lucky to have so many talented friends and family members willing to help us out, and it made the day feel so much more personal and special.



As the temperature climbed to an unseasonably hot 35 degrees, Bec and Amy walked down the aisle separately, each accompanied by their mum and dad, and surrounded by love. Eighty guests, including an uncle who flew in from Los Angeles the night before and two friends from Cambodia, witnessed them saying their vows to one another.

'It was important to us to write our own vows, and they were perfectly easy to write, but neither of us had anticipated how terrifying it would be reading them out in front of our family and friends,' says Bec. 'In the end, though, it was one of my favourite parts of our day, and I would recommend writing your own vows to anyone. It makes the ceremony so much more meaningful.'

The couple went for a relaxed vibe for the reception, with a taco van, just a few speeches and dancing until late under the stars. They eschewed traditional wedding traditions such as a first dance after they became a source of anxiety during the arrangements.

'So why do them?' says Amy. 'That was one of the best decisions we made. 'Also, my mum read a beautiful Bible passage that had been read at her own wedding. It was important to us that this little piece of our upbringing and her history was incorporated into the day.'

Bec and Amy said they would relive their wedding day a thousand times over if they could. 'Seeing the people most important to us all in the one place, all so happy and carefree after what had been such an intense period during the marriage equality vote was incredible,' says Bec. 'It really felt like everything we had fought for had finally worked out, and it was our first opportunity to get together with everyone who had campaigned during the vote to really thank them and celebrate with them. There was such a feeling of love in the air the whole day.'

STURT SCHOOL FOR WOOD



Catriona has been in numerous selected group exhibitions and four solo exhibitions, including one at Sturt Gallery earlier this year.

'I was so honoured to be asked to exhibit my sculptural basketry at Sturt,' said Catriona, whose works has gained an international following. 'It's such a well established and highly regarded gallery and design centre.'

'I love teaching at Sturt, as the five day courses really allow for an immersion. My workshops aren't just learning a technique, they're about a rediscovery of our creativity.'

Established in 2000, Sturt Summer school is unique within Australia, offering as it does the complete package of courses across a wide range of art forms, internationally acclaimed tutors, meals and accommodation, and an idyllic location with great facilities. Add a community of fellow creatives and catered social events, and there is no need to leave the campus. Students come from around Australia and beyond, with many returning more than once.

'Some students book the same classes with the same teachers each year,' says Head of Sturt, Mark Viner. 'We book the best teachers we can find from all over the world. Teachers that can take their students on a journey of discovery.'

Among the approximately 230 students who attend, teacher and technical textile historian Angharad Rixon has observed how many families and groups of friends take time out together, and how this compels a certain curiosity and exchange.

Twenty-three different courses in a myriad of mediums are on offer this summer, including plein air, still life, watercolour or self portrait painting; wood turning, print making, various drawing classes; photography, historic textile techniques and Neo-Greco Roman mosaics.



Learn how to fold and fabricate metal for jewellery and object making; weave striped or patterned cloth; explore ceramic glaze applications, the techniques of plant based dyeing and stitching, the art of calligraphy and more. There is even a course in designing and constructing interactive sculpture with 'ingenious automata' maker David Archer. Like most of his fellow tutors, David's career as an artist spans decades and his work is well known nationally and internationally.

Classes run from 9am to 4.30pm and are followed by tutor presentations or social events each evening. Students can live and eat on site, with boarding accommodation provided at Frensham, the secondary girls school adjacent to Sturt, founded by visionary educator Winifred West (1881–1971) in 1913. West also founded Sturt in 1941 making it the oldest continually operating craft centre in Australia. 'It might become a colony of artists and craftsmen, potters and printers...' she wrote to a friend after Sturt opened with one room and eight students.



For those aged 16 years and over, small class sizes of about 10 students encourage an easy camaraderie and allow teachers to provide plenty of individual attention. Course fees vary (between \$745 and \$835) and materials are provided for a modest additional fee. There are also daily workshops for children during the week (\$95 a day with morning tea and lunch included, or \$440 for the week) and children can also be accommodated if accompanied by an adult.

'Exploration and play' is what the week is about, says Catriona Pollard, 'and reconnecting the hand and the heart.' sturt.nsw.edu.au or 4860 2083 ■

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

Calmbirth. The very idea may sound like an oxymoron, but since it was started in Mittagong by one of Australia's first male midwives, 26,000 couples have taken part in this program to learn how to remain calm during birth. Karen McClay, local midwife, daughter of founding father Peter Jackson and now driving force behind Calmbirth talks birth, babies and the gift of life.

What is Calmbirth? It's a program that provides expecting couples with the knowledge and tools to move past any fears or anxieties to birth their babies confidently and positively. When you understand the physiology of childbirth you realise just how important it is for the birthing woman to remain calm and trust in her body. When she does, birth becomes much more manageable and positive. How long have you been delivering babies and how many? I've been a midwife for nearly 10 years and it would be more than 400 babies I've assisted into the world. Did you grow up in the Highlands? I finished high school here, then my husband and I lived in various places in Australia and Papua New Guinea. We came home six years ago to be close to our parents. Your dad Peter was the founder of Calmbirth. What was his idea? Dad trained as a midwife in 1974, when birth was still considered a mechanical process. He went on to work in mental health and returned to midwifery in 1989 with a new understanding that giving birth is as much an emotional journey as a physical one for women, and the system was not supporting them emotionally. He saw birth was feared, and that women and their partners were walking away traumatised instead of empowered. In 2004 he set out to change that. As a mother and a midwife, what have your birthing experiences been like? I became a midwife after having had my own children. All my birth experiences were empowering in their own way. Do I wish I'd known what I do now? Absolutely! Which is why I am so passionate about educating couples to prepare for birth. Are we too pampered? Hasn't the female body been giving birth for thousands of years? Yes, although in a lot of countries pregnancy and motherhood are celebrated and cherished, something our culture doesn't seem to do very well. I think our culture tends to like to stay in our comfort zone, rather than what I call our courage zone. Childbirth is all about moving into our courage zone; it is challenging and at times uncomfortable and intense. When a woman has the tools, knowledge and belief to move into her courage zone, with an educated partner and support team holding space for her, she is able to discover a strength that lays a good foundation for her to transition into motherhood. Do you think there is still a code of silence and lack of information about childbirth, given many women report they are truly shocked by their first experience? Absolutely. Our culture doesn't value the importance of preparing for birth and parenting, so many couples don't put the necessary preparation in. One of my favourite authors and midwives, Ina May Gaskin, says, 'Humans are the only mammal with the intelligence to convince ourselves that we can't give birth.' We also have the intelligence to empower ourselves to trust in birth. What do you hope you equip couples with when they attend your workshops? To embrace this time and to have confidence knowing they have the tools and knowledge to rise to the challenges of labour, birth and beyond. Is it true to say Australia is increasingly becoming a nation where women choose a caesarean over a natural birth? Are we too posh or too entitled to push? I don't believe that we are too posh too push, but rather decisions around this are based on fear, ill informed decision making and misinformation. I do feel that the majority of women would still prefer a vaginal birth. Many partners say they felt like a spare wheel during childbirth. What does Calmbirth encourage partners to do while their child is being born? The role that partners can play in labour and birth is huge! Women need to feel calm and safe for birth to unfold as it should, and who better to hold that space for her than her partner? But without the proper education and toolbox, partners can feel out of their depth and even traumatised by the experience. When a partner has the confidence to support the mother in birth, not only does she manage labour and birth better but the bonds between the parents and their newborn are enhanced. And finally, does seeing a baby born feel like the ultimate gift? It is amazing! I learn something new from every mother and every birth. calmbirth.com.au

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
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STEP OUT & SPLASH IN

'Tis the season to get back to nature. So grab your backpack, your cossie, your family and your sense of adventure, and explore some of the best and most beautiful outdoor spots in the Highlands this summer.

Berrima River Walk, Berrima

Take this delightful walk along the Wingecarribee River and read about the German internees who lived there during World War I. Reports of water quality may have deterred some swimmers (although it never seems to worry the younguns launching off the hanging ropes there) so check with local authorities or launch a kayak instead. Or head over to Moss Vale and set off downstream from the weir at Cecil Hoskins Nature Reserve. *Tip: Take binoculars to spot birds and wildlife such as water dragons and platypuses*, but hopefully not joe blakes (snakes).

Goodman's Ford, Wollondilly

Getting to this fabulous spot on the way to the Wombeyan Caves takes a little tenacity but it's worth it. You can camp at the nearby private campsite or visit for just the day. The brackish water of the Wollondilly River is deep and slow moving, perfect for summer days. This is what childhood memories are made of. Tip: Don't forget paddle boards, floaties, canoes and life jackets, and marshmallows for the campfire. In fact, don't forget anything because it's a fair hike back.

Nellies Glen, Budderoo National Park, Robertson

Belmore Falls

If you can catch this place after good rain and there's no one else around, it's charming. Put your swimming towel on one of the surrounding rocks and swim up to the waterfall.

Tip: Nearby Blue Pool is good for littlies.

Gunrock Creek Falls, Meryla State Forest, Moss Vale

You'll have to seek out this beauty on Meryla Road, one kilometre up a fire trail, because this swimming hole, complete with waterfall and escarpment, is a favourite haunt of locals for good reason. *Tip: The rough terrain in this State Forest makes it a favourite for 4WD enthusiasts*.



Forty Foot Falls, Mittagong

water here is icy. Make it a quick swim.

This seven kilometre walk from Lake Alexandra requires grit and good fitness as there are many steep steps and flights of stairs. But just when you think you'll never come out of the lush forest, you'll navigate rocks downhill to reach the waterfall. Lots of options for wild swimming in deep pools. Tip: Ensure you and your companions are up for a challenge and take plenty of water and snacks. It's a long way back, and you'll probably end up carrying small kids.

Bangadilly National Park, Joadja

A little visited treasure on our doorstep. Bangadilly National Park has the four Ws: wilderness, wildlife, walks and the Wingecarribee. Tip: Look up. Koalas live here.

Highlands on four wheels, think four very special

wheels cos you won't have a more memorable al fresco experience than being zipped about the place by Vinh Tran, owner of Military Vehicle Tours. Vinh, who also owns Ms Pho Canteen (a Vietnamese kitchen restaurant at The Mill in Bowral), came to Australia following the devastating war in his home country of Vietnam. He began importing and then restoring relics of the war, including the American Jeep he kindly lent us for this issue's cover, to raise awareness and support a charity in Vietnam that helps war affected orphaned children. He makes his jeeps available for tours here and in Sydney. A unique and fun mode of transport for anyone who wants to see the Highlands in unique style or wants to leave a lasting impression arriving or departing from a do.
