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
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

Editor's welcome



OUR TOWNS AND VILLAGES

THE SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS IS MADE UP OF MANY TOWNS AND VILLAGES, EACH WITH ITS OWN UNIQUE CHARACTER, CHARM AND ATTRACTIONS. HERE'S A CHEAT SHEET SO YOU CAN GET ACQUAINTED WITH JUST SOME OF THEM. TO DISCOVER MORE, AND FOR MORE DETAIL, MAPS AND OTHER ESSENTIAL INFORMATION, VISIT DESTINATION SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS (SOUTHERN-HIGHLANDS.COM.AU).

MITTAGONG

Historic Mittagong, the site of one of the first iron ore discoveries in Australia, has plenty to offer. From parks (try Lake Alexandra) to walks (the nearby Box Vale track with its incredible views of Nattai Gorge) to wineries (including Artemis Vineyard and Winery and Tertini Wines). There's also the treasure trove that is the Mittagong Antiques Centre, and fabulous craft and design centre Sturt with its shop, cafe and wood school as well as gem Twisting Vintage for preloved designer and couture clothing and the award winning cafe, The Shaggy Cow. Stop off at Destination Southern Highlands Welcome Centre on the way into Mittagong and get informed about what's on locally and stock up on locally made produce. Don't forget to call in at boutique brewery Eden Brewery for some beer tastings.

MOSS VALE

Centred around the Victorian era railway station in Argyle Street, Moss Vale is known for being a down to earth country town. The annual agricultural show is one of the biggest in the area, and recently the main street has undergone a revival with the opening of many independent artisan and homewares shops. Fantastic cafes and eateries such as Bernie's Diner, The Vale, Highlands Merchant and II Pranzo offer delicious eating choices, with newcomers Southern Highlands Brewing Kitchen & Taphouse, Birch and the Wine Mosaic Lounge bringing some well received glamour to old favourites such as Seafood Affair, and Briars Country Lodge and Historic Inn just up the road although the bar and restaurant is closed presently and expected to reopen early 2019 following a fire. All functions and events still on.

BOWRAL

Watched over by Mount Gibraltar, Bowral is the largest town in the Highlands. Full of historic public and private buildings, stunning country gardens and grand estates, this thriving country township is known for its vintage, interiors, antiques and homewares stores and precincts such as Dirty Janes and Green Lane, as well as markets, galleries, bookshops, nurseries and boutiques. Its dining scene has become all the richer recently with the opening of Dos Hombres, Grand Bistro and Bistro Sociale which complement winning stalwarts such as Biota Dining, Onesta Cucina, Cafe Rosso, Eccetera Trattoria Pizzeria, The Royal, Gumnut Patisserie and a raft of other local favourite restaurants. cafes and pubs. Visitors and locals are drawn to Bowral's shop and galleries and landmarks such as the Bradman Museum and International Cricket Hall of Fame, as well as the many festivals and events that include Tulip Time, the Bowral Classic, the Food and Wine Festival and Bong Bong Picnic Races. And of course there is a plethora of award winning vineyards nearby, such as Centennial Vineyards to visit for some tasting and buying.

BERRIMA

This pretty 1830s village has history (the heritage Old Berrima Gaol, iconic Berrima Courthouse and National Trust listed Harper's Mansion); nature (the Wingecarribee River runs through it): fantastic food (Eschalot, Josh's Cafe, Berrima General Store & Cafe and Feast at Berrima, plus excellent patisseries, cafes, local makers and artisans) as well as The Berrima Bakehouse Motel (a great place to stay) as well as Australia's oldest continuously licensed inn, the Surveyor General which also serves great pub grub. The Berrima Schoolyard Market is held on the fourth Sunday of every month from February to November in the grounds of the local primary school with its fabulous Stephanie Alexander kitchen garden.

BURRAWANG

is one of the Highland's most picture postcard villages. The newly renovated Burrawang Village Hotel (recently named Best Country Dining Venue - Country Southern in the Australian Hotels Association NSW awards 2018) with its huge grassy lawns overlooking rolling hills, is a popular accommodation and dining spot. As is the award winning Burrawang General Store Cafe across the road, with its great food served all day long and restored self contained accommodation. The 1883 School of Arts building in the main Hoddle Street plays host to the village's annual ball. Don't miss the village's Easter markets, which are a highlight of the Highlands market calendar, attract a crowd of thousands and are a great day out.

Quaint and historical, Burrawang

BUNDANOON

Packed with old world charm,
Bundanoon is a vibrant town with
cafes, tearooms, antique dealers.
Market days are held on the first
and third Sundays, and bushwalking
and mountain biking enthusiasts are
drawn to the nearby Morton National
Park. If you are overnighting or
holidaying, stay and eat at the newly
refurbished Bundanoon Guest House,
or at tasty DeliLicious down the road.
For body and soul, book a retreat at
Quest for Life. Don't miss Brigadoon,
the great Scottish celebration in April

ROBERTSON

The small, character filled town of Robertson combines a rolling pastoral setting with fabulous locally grown produce such as potatoes, truffles, pears, paddock raised eggs and award winning Pecora Dairy ewe's milk cheese. The newly changed-hands Robertson Inn is a great place for a family meal, and the stylishly revamped Robertson Hotel is a luxurious launch pad for a night, weekend or week in the Highlands. The iconic Robertson Pie Shop has a huge range of sweet and savoury pies and is open all year round, and Crop Swap every Saturday morning at the Bowling Club is a great place to mingle with the local Robbo green finger gardeners.

JOADJA

An area of farms and bushland on the periphery of the Southern Highlands, Joadja is steeped in history, once home to more than 1000 Scottish immigrants who mined shale oil in the late 1800s. The success of Joadja Estate winery, and more recently Joadja Distillery, has firmly put Joadja on the map. Don't' miss one of Val's fascinating old township and distillery tours.

EXETER

The Exeter Village Hall and adjoining park and oval lie at the heart of picturesque Exeter, a village of leafy streets and grand rows of trees.

Exeter General Store performs its role as bookshop, post office, gourmet cafe and food store admirably. If browsing is on the cards, you'll find The Village Pump Antiques is worth a look and across the road, Bowerbird Lane at Halcyon Cottage is great for homewares and gifts.

The Exeter village markets are held on the first Saturday of each month in the grounds of the village oval.

SUTTON FOREST

It might be small but Sutton
Forest has stuff going on. Sutton
Forest General Store, under new
management, sells locally grown fruit
& veg, pizza bases and homemade
curries, The Everything Store, which
lives up to its name, and the stunning
Red Cow Farm gardens with its
recently opened seasonal garden
shop, definitely worth a visit or two.

FITZROY FALLS

The tiny village of Fitzroy Falls, surrounded by farmland and wilderness, takes its name from the 81 metre waterfall in adjoining Morton National Park. The nearby Belmore Falls are equally spectacular. Head to the Fitzroy Falls picnic area for great views of the falls and for bird watching opportunities – you'll experience the sounds of lyrebirds if you're lucky. The deck at the Falls Cafe is a nice spot for refreshments as is the nearby Fitzroy Falls General Store.

HILL TOP

This northern village has a rich history as a former railway town and is now gateway to Australia's largest rail museum, Trainworks at Thirlmere. Don't miss terrific local lavender producer and cafe Belle Fleur Cottage, and the Cave Creek walking track too.

CANYONLEIGH

Made up of large rural properties,
Canyonleigh lies at an altitude of 700
metres and is fast gaining a reputation as a wine producing area of the
Highlands. Situated on the drier
western edge of the region, it is a
great place to spot native wildlife.

MAKING MAGIC

YOU CAN BE PRETTY SURE IF A HOUSE YOU HAVE BUILT WINS A COVETED HIA AUSTRALIAN HOUSE OF THE YEAR, YOU HAVE GOOD TASTE WHEN IT COMES TO DESIGN.

Enter newcomers, multidisciplinary couple Zvoni Hodak and partner Phil Young, whose house near Canberra was HIA House of the Year in 2003. The clever creatives who moved to the Highlands in 2011 recently opened their first studio space, Hodak & Young, in Bowral, where Zvoni makes her striking silver and resin modernist jewellery pieces and Phil creates unique lighting, bowls, boards and other beautiful wood vessels with resin and timber he sources locally from farmers and arborists. When not turning out their own unique products for sale, Hodak & Young are busy sharing their knowledge in their workshops. 'Very few people get the opportunity to experience making things for themselves,' says Zvoni, who made jewellery in her 20s for fashion labels such as Saba before working in a business consultancy for two decades. She trained to become a silversmith several years ago. 'Apart from making our own pieces, one of the driving concepts of our studio is to give workshop participants an insight into what is involved in making a piece of jewellery, to get hands on and use the tools to

turn a blank piece of silver into something that they are proud to wear.' Phil, who was also formerly in the corporate world, made the life change after he was diagnosed with a serious illness in 2013, which took him years to recover from. 'He always loved working with wood and when he was ill he said he was never going to work another day doing something that didn't make him happy,' says Zvoni. 'And he hasn't. He is completely self taught through experimentation and developing techniques that work for him. For both of us becoming makers was the best move we ever made.'

Hodak and Young teach two full day introduction to silversmithing courses and an intensive five week course designed to teach skill sets and technique. They hope the studio will become a collaborative space for silversmiths where beginners and professionals alike can meet, share ideas, work side by side and simply enjoy the experience of creating. Wild things

GREAT NEWS FOR OUR RESIDENT KOALA POPULATION, says local authority Joe Stammers, that former 3680 hectare Tugalong Station is to be established as a national park. Joe, an environmental projects offer with Wingecarribee Shire Council (who featured in our 2018 ESH spring issue), says the new park bordering the Wollondilly and Wingecarribee Rivers will become a vital link connecting the southern Blue Mountains wilderness with Morton National Park.

'Tugalong Station contains amazing habitat for koalas and other endangered wildlife, and is part of the regionally significant Great Western Wildlife Corridor,' says Joe. 'All credit for this announcement goes to the wonderful staff working at National Parks and the Office of Environment and Heritage.'

Responsible for the Southern Highlands Koala Conservation Project, Joe and his team spent two years collecting data in the Highlands to find we have a healthy population of more than 3000 of the native marsupials living here. And these koalas are among the main reasons for increasing conservation tourism in our region. 'We have many reports of sightings of koalas locally and it's a pretty special and memorable thing to spot a koala in its own Highlands habitat.'


In fine voice

When Ross 'Webby' Webb, retail operations manager with BDCU Alliance, isn't working, he's singing solo or with band Rusted Track (which includes his equally talented singer wife Sharon, owner of Hair Station in Moss Vale). And now he is getting a worldwide following. Webby's debut



single You & Me went to Number 1 on the UK/Europe country music HotDisc chart in November last year and was voted in the Top Ten of all 2018 releases. His second single, Hello Someday, was released in January on Australian and US radio. Currently in the Top 20 on the OzCountry Downunder chart, the single is due for release in Europe and the UK this month. Inspired by the likes of US country music singers Alan Jackson and Chris Stapleton and our own Keith Urban, Webby says his aim is to keep writing and to get more of a toehold in the Australian country music scene. 'I have just always loved singing and the way country music sounds I think,' he says. Not bad at all for a man from Moss Vale. Watch this space Nashville. Here's a shout out to some of our gifted artists and makers doing their thing on the global, national and local stage.

Starting with sculptural weaver and Robbo local Harriet Goodall, who travelled to Samoa to hold a weaving workshop

recently with the Susu & Meli Project (a group sponsored by the International Council of Women to help survivors of domestic and sexual assault weave products, providing autonomous income to female victims). Harriet will teach Basketry: Circling Back at Sturt Winter School in Mittagong from July 8 to 12. harrietgoodall.com; sturt.nsw.edu.au

Meanwhile, Bowral High student Cameron Johnstone's HSC work Structure of pain, summation of peace is on show in the Art Gallery of NSW's ARTEXPRESS. Now in its 35th year, this exhibition showcases outstanding works of art created by NSW visual art students for the HSC. Cameron's work was one of 56 selected from that of 8770 students. Four other students, Alice Battcock and Stella Wilde from Frensham, Kelsey Walker from Bowral High and Jessica Deakin from Oxley College will also have their work exhibited in regional galleries around NSW. artgallery.nsw.gov.au

Dave Ball, winner of Sculpture by the Sea at Bondi last year, is currently showing his work at Sculpture by the Sea, Cottesloe. RIDING HIGH

Another local dynamo, Zac Hulm, continues his quest to help put the Southern Highlands at the forefront of cycling. Zac is president of the Southern Highlands Cycle Club and organiser of the Rare Cancers Australia #ride4rare Mountain Bike Challenge at Twin Falls Cottages, the home of three times gold medallist cyclist Brad McGee on May 19. A timed charity fundraising ride, teams of four or two or solo riders will ride the 8 km loop track for three or five hours with the aim to complete the most circuits. Many school teams, including the MBT from Chevalier College and Tudor House, are set to compete. Zac is also manager of the Rare Cancers #ride4rareteam for the Bowral Classic in October, which will again include riders from Tudor House and Chevalier. Last October the event attracted more than 3000 riders to the Highlands. Also organiser of the inaugural P2P Cycle and Kosi Challenge from Parliament House to Mount Kosciusko, Zac, himself a survivor of a rare childhood cancer, says cycling in the Highlands is on a par to anywhere in Australia. 'It is certainly seen as one of the best cycling destinations in the country and I'm pretty sure champions Brad and Caleb Ewan would agree with that'. southernhighlandscc.com.au For more information go to rarecancersaustralia.com.au, and check out Zac's favourite off road and on cycle Highlands routes on page 68.





We don't often relate skiing to the Highlands (although it can feel quite arctic here during winter). So full kudos and credit to farmer, award winning rural producer and Oxley College mum of four Katrina Sparke for co-ordinating with NSW Biathlon to bring dryland training sessions to the Highlands. She did this following interest from many junior cross country skiers from Oxley, Tudor House and Gib Gate schools. The first Southern Highlands Biathlon Development Camp was led recently by Olympic coach Cameron Morton and daughter Darcie, Australian Women's Sprint Champion who recently returned from representing Australia in the Biathlon and Cross Country World Junior Championships.

The camp was held at Bong Bong Racecourse in Bowral and Katrina's family's Redleaf Farm at Fitzroy Falls. And Katrina hopes there will be many more, given the level of interest she has received. 'Training with the Olympic coach and his daughter, who is such a wonderful role model for the girls and boys taking part, is a terrific opportunity and gives kids who haven't done skiing the opportunity to learn a sport they otherwise would not have access to. Cross country is one of the most cardiovascular sports, while accurate target shooting requires a mindfulness over both body and brain that can really help kids in so many ways.'

The Biathlon is a winter Olympic sport that involves cross country skiing and target rifle shooting, but dry training takes place on roller skis with lasers for shooting. The recent camp will be followed by regular training sessions in the Southern Highlands. TAKE A BAKEHOUSE BREAK

A NIGHT IN THE SMARTLY UPDATED BERRIMA BAKEHOUSE MOTEL SOLVED A DECADE LONG MYSTERY VERY PLEASANTLY.



any times over the years I've driven past the Berrima Bakehouse Motel and wondered. Often ferrying carloads of muddy children and dogs home to Moss Vale, still wet from swims in Berrima's lovely part of the Wingecarribee River, I've speculated what the smart two storey brick building neatly tucked away next to the Old Hume Highway might be like.

The motel, which sits opposite fellow village stalwarts the Surveyor General Inn and the Magpie Cafe, always looks so calm and tidy and cared for. Unlike the interior of my car on these trips home, it gives off a kind of serenity and an appealing sense of comfort in its own skin.

I get this feeling again recently. After years of driving by, I am here to check in for a night's stay, and I've been looking forward to it for days. I've always had a thing for a hotel room you can drive right up to. It's the nostalgia of long hot car trips through central NSW made during my childhood, and the heaven of arriving at a faraway establishment with air conditioning. And a swimming pool. And, happy days, Berrima Bakehouse Motel has both.

A child of the 1970s like me, it was originally built adjacent to the village's original bakehouse, which itself dated back to the 1800s. Owned by Country Inn Motels, which also owns and operates the Bundanoon Country Inn, there is nothing 1970s about the Berrima Bakehouse Motel today. In fact, first impressions suggest it is modern and, like a freshly baked loaf, comforting.



The Bakehouse underwent a major refurbishment 18 months ago and the result is pleasantly upmarket with a Scandinavian design influence. Rooms are spotless and spacious, uncluttered and pleasing. Mine is on the second storey with a view to the swimming pool and the slow moving Wingecarribee beyond, with towering European trees planted by early settlers dotting the garden. A colour theme of white and navy bedding is fresh and contemporary, as is the on trend birch ply slatted bedhead, and a neat table and chair configuration with comfy armchair, perfect for a laptop and some relaxed reading.



Motel room staples such as an ironing board, iron and coat hangers are cleverly incorporated as design features on the far wall, and there is a huge paddle head in the shower. The bathroom also features complimentary toiletries such as make remover, perfect for wedding guests returning from late night celebrations. There is a breakfast bar with the usual tea bags and mini packets of bickies, but there's also an espresso machine with pods and latte glasses, and fresh milk and complimentary bottles of water in the fridge. All thoughtful and welcome touches.

Armed with a decent coffee, I happily browse the hotel room's information pack. Berrima was built on inns and passing trade, I learn. In the 1830s, Surveyor General Thomas Mitchell sought out a site where the Wingecarribee River could be spanned by a bridge for settlers pushing out from Sydney to Goulburn, Yass and beyond. His new road became known as the Hume Highway and linked Sydney with the southern settlements, and later on Melbourne. A day's journey by horseback or coach was usually about 16km and, as a result of travellers needing to stop overnight and feed and rest their horses, coaching inns began to spring up along the road.

Many of Berrima's oldest buildings were built by convict labour so a courthouse was needed, and as Berrima became a major stopover between Campbelltown and Goulburn, larger inns providing better facilities and accommodation were built. By 1834 there were three inns operating in Berrima and this increased to six by the early 1840s, among them the Surveyor General, believed to be the longest continually licensed inn in Australia.

The railway came to Bowral and Moss Vale in 1867 but bypassed Berrima, leading to the gradual demise of the coaching inns as people increasingly chose to travel by rail. Today Berrima is one of Australia's most historic villages, and in the 1960s the National Heritage Council declared the entire village an historic precinct.

If you love history and architecture like I do, the Berrima Bakehouse is a perfectly located staging post for exploration. In the evening I cross the now quiet Hume Highway for the colonial Georgian Surveyor General. Fellow motel guests and locals mingle in the busy sandstone pub with its convict laid stones all around. I eat from the Bushranger Bistro and enjoy a grilled burger and a glass of local pinot noir in the beer garden. Later, sleep comes easily as my room's welcome air conditioning cools dreams of convicts reportedly chained in the Surveyor General's cellar and bushrangers who frequented these parts.

Berrima Bakehouse manager Peter Fussell says he loves the varied guests who frequent the motel, which received a Trip Advisor Certificate of Excellence in 2018.

'Our favourite group last year was the Mustang Enthusiast Club from Newcastle. They really brought the motel's car park alive,' says Peter. 'And recently we had a lovely guest from Greece who had traced her genealogy back to the Berrima cemetery, where you will also find the gravesites of German merchant navy personnel held in Berrima Gaol during World War I.

'This guest stayed with us for a few nights to visit the gravesite of her great grandmother and picked some roses from our beautiful garden to take with her.'

I wake beautifully refreshed in the comfy queen size bed and enjoy watching morning television with no one else reaching for the remote. I breakfast just up the road at Diego Arata's Berrima General Store & Cafe as the other shops and cafes of this historic village quietly open nearby. There is much to do in Berrima, beginning with a snack at Stones Patisserie, a meal at Eschalot (see our story on page 52) and a visit to original Georgian building Harper's Mansion just up the hill. You could also catch 'A Butcher, A Baker, a Bunch of Makers' at the newly revamped Berrima District Museum or take a stroll along the Berrima River Walk along the nearby Wingecarribee and read all about the POW and German Internment camp there from 1915 to 1919.


And, who knows, if you take the river walk you may well see me and some muddy kids with dogs, no longer wondering. Because now I know the Berrima Bakehouse Motel is an affordable relaxed and stylish local gem that punches above its weigh and happily holds its own. Spread the word.



FRESH AIR & FARM FUN

t seems fitting that the welcoming party for Exeter Farm Stay is of the animal variety. Angelique the alpaca hovers by a small flock of sheep grazing in the shade of eucalypts. She lifts her head and stares in the direction of our approaching car, committed to her guardian role but clearly not bothered by our presence.

The day before we arrived, a storm had brought down an enormous gum tree, which in turn damaged a perimeter fence, so hosts Ray and Jill had toiled for hours chainsawing the fallen tree and attending to repairs. A necessary part of farm life. Every day is different and guests are encouraged to explore and be as involved as they'd like, although vehicles and machinery are understandably off limits.

With a background in event management, Jill is perfectly suited to running a popular bed and breakfast with a side attraction of farm animals, and clearly loves providing for her guests. The self contained property is part of the main homestead building but has a private entrance and separate parking.

After a quick change into more farm appropriate footwear, we head off on our first adventure. One of the farm stay's most popular activities is feeding the animals. We help load up the tray of an all terrain vehicle with lucerne, hay bales and a bucket of oats, and Jill takes us on a guided tour of the 140 acre property. Down near the dam, a tiny timber hut known as the Hidden Cabin is offered to guests who might like to sit quietly and ponder nature, boil the billy for a cuppa or enjoy a glass of wine. Jill provides the ingredients for the cuppa but it's BYO anything else.

The utility lumbers up and over the hills, dodging large wombat burrows, to the cow paddock. With Jill at the wheel, guests are on gate duty, opening and closing as we pass

through. The blue bucket containing oats for the sheep has been strategically positioned in the centre of the vehicle's tray, out of the reach of enthusiastic cows, but one still managed to reach its nose in far enough to knock over the bucket and scatter the sheep treats everywhere, delivering just the right amount of country excitement for city guests.

Back at the apartment, there's plenty of outdoor space to run around, kick a ball or explore the homestead gardens. Inside, there are two bedrooms (configured as Queen + King or Queen + Twin) and a beautifully appointed bathroom. The main living area has a lounge area in front of the slow combustion wood fire, a kitchenette with continental breakfast (including homemade marmalade) provided and a dining area overlooking the rolling hills of cleared cattle country.

A cosy courtyard is just the right spot for a sundowner or breakfast the next morning. Four resident chooks scratch quietly nearby, only two are layers to keep egg production manageable, and next to the chicken coop, a healthy selection of fruit, vegetables and herbs grows in abundance. We spotted strawberries and blueberries, tomatoes, lettuce, thyme, mint and rosemary, but each season brings a different offering.

In between her impressive hosting activities, Jill also finds time to run the local Exeter Village Market (first Saturday of every month), which she bought in 2018. Originally from Melbourne and more recently Sydney, the couple downsized in the city and upsized in the Highlands where they'd owned a weekender for many years. They are passionate promoters of the area and provide a local's guide to activities, restaurants and wineries. With very little improvement needed, the only plans in the wind are to put in a swimming pool for guests to enjoy in the warmer months.


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


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THE LOW DOWN ON JOHN WATERS

he 'lipstick effect' is a famous gauge of economic measure. First floated in the New York Times newspaper following 9/11, the theory goes that when markets are sluggish and people's purses are feeling the pinch, women stay away from major consumer purchases and instead buy themselves a lower cost comfort, such as a lipstick, to get their luxe shopping fix. Nearly two decades on, Cassie Angelini believes the same goes for her luxury candles.

'We all love a beautiful candle because number one it's an affordable luxury,' explained mum, maker and former accountant Cassie.

'We often can't afford to get to the hairdresser every month or to treat ourselves with that bottle of Chanel perfume we'd love but buying a candle costs less and gives the same result. The process of lighting a beautiful smelling candle is lovely and can somehow make your home more special, even when it is a mess. It's also a failsafe gift to buy for someone else because,

let's face it, everyone loves a beautiful smelling candle.'

True. Which is why ESH joined 11 other women at a two hour Bougies de Luxe workshop on an unseasonably hot Highlands day. The place is St Eloi Studio in Bowral, the home of Cassie's friends and fellow makers Pete and Shelley Burrows of Pete's Sheds. Pete often runs his furniture restoration and chalk painting classes from this charming French inspired studio, complete with rustic communal tables, large antique doors opening to a courtyard and candelabras overhead.

Cassie, who last year hand poured about 20,000 of her soy wax candles and also makes room sprays, diffusers, and bath oils, is open, friendly and informative. She is a workshop natural and gets the afternoon off with some background. An accountant by trade, Cassie has been making her luxury candles and bath oils for five years. Today she is ably aided by daughter Ava, 11, who one day plans to take over Mum's business and send herself to Harvard Law School.



Bougies de Luxe translates literally from the French as 'luxury candles' and Cassie began experimenting after her firstborn came along.

'I have always loved candles and the smell and atmosphere they bring to a home. But I didn't want a candle that smells great in the shop and entices you to buy it, thanks to its cold throw, and then doesn't smell like that when you get it home which is all about its warm throw. People want a candle they know and love and trust, which is in essence why I first started making my own.

'Before my son was born my favourite candles were by Jo Malone, which are beautiful but as a new parent, \$95 a candle was prohibitive. So I signed up to do a candle making workshop and thought, how hard can it be?'

We are about to find out. Making a candle sounds pretty straightforward... surely it's simply about putting fragrances in wax and letting it set. Yes? Err, no. Like any chemical equation, getting the formula right for any of Bougie de Luxe's 45 varieties, which include Magnolia & Jasmine, Green Apple and her clients' perennial favourite, French Pear is a science. But Cassie has the winning formula and Donna Hay is a customer. When she pictured Cassie's Pomegranate Luxe on the cover of her bestselling magazine, Cassie sold 5000 of those candles online in one week. But success has been slow burning.

'When I started off doing a candle workshop it all looked so easy, but when you get home you soon find out it is nothing but. I began doing all my trialling and testing on top of my stove at home and often it was like, sorry kids, dinner's postponed while I try this new recipe out. It was a big mess.

'For years I wrote everything down in a little exercise book, trialling temperatures and amounts of wax and fragrance. Candle making is an artform. You might walk away from this workshop and say, that is so easy, I'm going to be a great candle maker. Well I know from experience that when you get home, that's when the problems can start.'

Cassie uses soy wax and today she has it already melted in a small crockpot with a spout for easy pouring. One by one we have a go stirring the wax, which needs to be at a perfect 96 degrees for pouring. Then we add the quantity of the pure fragrance oils we have agreed upon for our candles today: perennial favourite, pomegranate and French pear. Cassie sources her oils from an Australian company Eroma which provide natural fragrance with no additives. The products are vital.

'Wax is a natural product and it's very temperamental,' says Cassie. 'You might go and add five fragrances and they work out great, and then you go and add vanilla, which is not a candle's best friend.

'Fragrance loading, which is basically the amount of fragrance you add to your wax, is pivotal. You need to use the exact amount. If you use more than the wax can take it is a waste of money and will give the candle a sweaty looking top.'

Wicking up is another element of candle making that sounds straightforward but is not. Once poured into the vessel, the wick must be perfectly straight and firm or it will not set properly and will stop the candle burning evenly right to the end, as Cassie ensures her commercial varieties do.

The workshop includes a delicious afternoon tea spread and Cassie shares her insider knowledge as we wait for our candles to set to take home. Although she hand pours hundreds of candles a day to meet online and local demand, the ritual of lighting one of her candles never fails to please her.

'The process of lighting a beautiful smelling candle at home is lovely. It is a way of unwinding, of spoiling yourself. It adds a bit of special to everyday life.'

If Cassie sounds like a true professional, she tells how she was given much needed help along the way by none other than Jo Malone, British doyen of luxury candles, who Cassie originally set out to emulate.


'The day I started making candles I decided, to hell with it, you never know, so I emailed Jo Malone. Purely by chance I had picked the right day because she had just sold to Estee Lauder, and she emailed me back with lots of tips for my candle making. It took me another two years of research before I actually put a candle on my website to sell because, as she told me, you have to be very sure of what you are selling before you do.'



THE GREAT DEGRADER

hen Dr Noel Arrold lets slip he has dined with leaders of
China's Communist Party, my initial suspicions are confirmed.
Noel is no ordinary farmer. In fact, if I were to be really puerile,
I'd say he's a really fun guy.

Terrible witticisms aside, Noel is a mushroom expert, a fungi fanatic. In fact the Australian microbiologist is a leading world authority on the spawning, growing and picking of gourmet and exotic fungi. I meet this sprightly 76-year-old at his place of work, namely a subterranean cave like tunnel, where I hear his tale of chowing down with the President of the People's Republic of China. And it soon becomes very clear that Noel is not your average senior citizen.

For the past 30 years Noel has grown exotic and gourmet mushrooms in a 650 metre long tunnel that runs under the hill from Bowral to Mittagong. Built in 1866 as part of the original single lane track from Sydney to Canberra, the tunnel, carved from limestone, became obsolete when a new double line track opened in 1919. During World War II it was used to hide munitions and, when hostilities ended, it lay dormant for years before its consistent humidity and temperature of 15-16°C were identified as perfect to replicate nature's requirements for mushroom growing. A friend sold the business to Noel in the 1970s. It's dim and slightly dank inside, which is ideal. Light is not important, as mushrooms do not photosynthesise.

'In the wild in Asia, where many exotic mushrooms originate, mushrooms grow in woods and within forest floor litter,' says Noel, whose tunnel is unique to Australia and famed within mushroom knowing circles. 'They like damp, cool conditions to grow and flourish, which is why the tunnel is perfect.'

Originally a Cooma boy, Noel studied science at Sydney University and had plans to become a teacher. He was persuaded otherwise when a professor casually mentioned grants were available for students following more research based work. He went on to write his PhD on diseases in mushrooms, and later studied at Penn State University's world renowned Faculty of Microbiology and Immunology, and The Glasshouse Crops Research Institute in Southampton, UK and the Max Planck Research Institute, Hamburg.

'I have always enjoyed my work as a scientist because it's all about systems,' says Noel. 'Cultivating systems, growing systems, picking systems that work. I am at heart a microbiologist after all, and fungi are very interesting organisms.'

Noel replicates the conditions of nature in his unique mushroom farm. The inoculation of the species of mushrooms he grows takes place in his Mittagong laboratory. Mushroom spawn is any substance that has been inoculated with mycelium, the vegetative growth of a fungus, and is the base for producing mushrooms.

Noel uses a tried and tested technique for growing mushrooms in the tunnel. Biodegradable spool shaped sacks filled with inoculated sawdust are spiked on every spare inch of space, like a giant wall of sewing bobbins, only these ones grow things. On the other side, logs fashioned from sawdust have the slower growing, prized shiitake. As well as the shiitake, Noel grows enoki, wood ear, shimeji, nameko and oyster varieties, as well as your more household types such as king brown, chestnut and button mushrooms.

After the mushroom spawn is transported to the tunnel, it will lay dormant in the inoculated logs Noel has fashioned from eucalypt sawdust before it begins fruiting. ▶



Entering the mushroom tunnel for the first time is like walking into some Harry Potter like catacomb filled with thousands of tiny growing organisms. With its earthy smell, stone floors and huge steel reinforced door, it's the sort of environment a vampire, or a teenager come to think of it, might choose to inhabit.

Noel walks several kilometres a day up and down the tunnel. Mushroom growing is labour intensive and picking takes place six mornings a week for two hours with the help of a small workforce of mostly Taiwanese backpackers. Together they pick 1.7 tonnes or 1700 kilograms of mushrooms a week, which all go to market. Noel was the first person to bring the Swiss Brown variety to Australia under his business, Li-Sun Exotic Mushrooms, named after daughter Lisa and son Shane, nicknamed Sunnah which means son in German. Noel was also the first grower in Australia to produce fresh shiitake, and must take some of the credit for Australians being the second largest consumer of the button mushroom behind the French. Indeed, where once Noel's mushrooms were cooked in the kitchens of Sydney's hatted restaurants such as Tetsuya's, Bennelong and Quay, today he says he is pushed to keep up with demand from your average Jo.

'Since the explosion of those cooking shows on TV, with Manu and Peter and those MasterChef boys, we can barely keep up with demand. Coles and Woolworths are our big customers, but we sell to Harris Farm too. You can buy ours in Bowral,' says Noel.

When he is not in the tunnel, Noel is in his Mittagong laboratory spawning mushrooms, experimenting with new methods, and looking at new uses for fungi in the medical and pharmaceutical industries. Most of the species Noel grows occur naturally in forests as wood degrading fungi.



'Mushrooms in the wild have a unique and vital role in our ecosystem,' says Noel. 'They grow on dead trees and dead wood and use the carbon as a food source. Because of carbon in trees, the lignin can't decompose without fungi. The organic matter in the fungi decomposes and degrades the organic matter, returning the carbon back into the earth. Mushrooms are the earth's great degrader.'

Mushrooms are also a rich source of protein and food to many of China's population of two billion says Noel, who has made several trips with fellow world experts to discuss mushroom production. On his last visit he found himself seated as guest of honour next to then vice President of the People's Republic of China, Xi Jinping.

'He is also an agricultural scientist,' says Noel. 'He speaks English very well and was very interested in the growing we are doing in Australia.'

Tours of Noel's mushroom tunnel are held on the Sunday of every long weekend. The next is Sunday April 21 and Sunday June 9, Queens Birthday weekend. For more upcoming dates for tours li-sunexoticmushrooms.com.au



Cassie Wallace and Matty Roberts weren't particularly daunted taking over Eschalot, an iconic Highlands fine dining restaurant. Maybe it had something to do with catering for hungry wedding guests for two years beforehand. The pair talked about the past, present and future with ESH.

ESH: How long did you guys run your catering firm Violets and Vinegar before buying Eschalot? CW: We began Violets and Vinegar in 2012 after catering our own wedding because we couldn't find a caterer to produce the style of food we were hoping for. We wanted an abundance of food where our guests felt like they were having a feast in our home with us, not an underwhelming beef/chicken alternate drop. After being told by our friends and family that it was the best food they had ever eaten at a wedding, we realised there was a market for our personalised style. ESH: When did you arrive in the Highlands? MR: We officially moved to the Highlands in 2014 to take on the roles of executive chef and events manager at a wedding venue. **ESH:** Why did you decide to move out of wedding catering? Or have you? CW: We both love weddings and events! We have the privilege of sharing in one of the happiest days in the lives of our clients. The positive energy is infectious and there is instant feedback from 100 plus people about what you have provided. We still have Violets and Vinegar catering and we are still creating wedding cakes throughout the Highlands. ESH: Were you looking for a restaurant to call your own? MW: It had been a long

term dream of ours to have our own restaurant and we had been actively looking for approximately 12 months, ready to make the move. We had become limited by not having our own venue and we were more than ready to produce our food, in our own style, on our own terms. ESH: Was it scary to take over one hatted Eschalot? CW: Taking over any established business is always a little daunting. Eschalot has had a loyal following for many years and there was always the chance that a change in ownership would see this change also. We knew that once followers gave us the opportunity to show them what we had to offer we would be fine. We have been overwhelmed by the positive response from both our regular locals as well as the occasional visitors to the restaurant from Sydney and Canberra. ESH: How have you made it your own? MR: We completely changed the decor of the restaurant, closing for three weeks to paint, polish and garden. While it is a much cleaner, contemporary look, it still has the charm that a building of this period has to offer. We also launched a new menu when we opened last spring, and we are continually evolving it. ESH: Have you kept any of what it was? MR: Yes. The cuisine is still fine dining, modern Australian with a French influence. ESH: Cassie. can you describe Matt's style of cooking? CW: Matty is obsessive over food and loves experimenting in the kitchen. He is also a perfectionist and is always looking

Being a creative helps tremendously when it comes to menu writing and plating. ESH: Did you dine at the old Eschalot? CW: Being the owners of Eschalot is a full circle experience for us. We dined here for the first time over eight years ago for a girlfriend's birthday. We absolutely loved the individual dining rooms and fireplaces as well as the personalised service that such a boutique establishment can offer. It was a long term dream of ours to find a little cottage to convert into a restaurant to produce a similar feel. When we discovered Eschalot was for sale, we knew it was the right move for us. ESH: You have a young daughter. I'm guessing it's pretty demanding being chef and front of house and parents. How do you juggle? CW: Ignoring unsolicited advice is the most important factor in keeping the balance for our family and business right. The wonderful thing is we are currently living on site, so Odessa is never far away. It gives us far more time with her than we would have if we had to pack down after service and head home at midnight. ESH: What's the long term vision for the restaurant and you both? MR: We are hoping to continue the success of Eschalot itself but also leave our mark on this gorgeous iconic building during our time here. We have heard so many stories of why 'the Breen's', which is what is was called in one form or another, has been so special to so many for over 30 years. It will be wonderful to put our own stamp on it.



his Easter I'm feeling a bit hot and cross. Everyone is turning up at our house with those accursed buns assuming we love them. Eating one every now and then would be fine. However half dozen and full dozen packs are regularly being plonked on our kitchen table. THERE IS AN OVERSUPPLY. Even in the song they're heavily discounted within a single line: 'One a penny, two a penny, hot cross buns'.

Naturally, I'm gracious enough to feign delight but invariably have to deal with the stockpile when our guests leave. (Never an issue, mind you, when it comes to Easter eggs.)

So, I have set to task during this Year of No Waste to make sure our chooks aren't the only ones dealing with the problem. Here's the result. A recipe that improves the flavour of the bun itself and can even be frozen before being baked long after pancake Tuesday to a puffy unexpected

dessert to surprise your guests. You could say, a kind of rising from the dead. ■



1/2 cup sultanas

1/4 cup rum

6 large eggs

1 cup caster sugar

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

1 litre fresh cream

2 pinches cinnamon

zest 1 lemon and 1 orange,

finely chopped

6 hot cross buns, broken into

2cm chunks

mascarpone, to serve

creme anglaise, to serve

1. Soak the sultanas in the rum for 1/2 hour.

- 2. In a bowl, place the eggs, caster sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla and the cream and whisk well. Add the cinnamon, zests, the rest of the vanilla and combine.
- 3. Spread a layer of the broken hot cross buns over the base of a large pudding bowl or individual ramakins. Pour over some of the cream mixture and allow a few minutes to soak in. Cover with another layer of the bread, then cream mixture and repeat until the bowl is full and the bread has soaked up the cream mixture. Do not pack the bread in too tightly. Fill to the top with the remaining cream mixture.
- 4. Bake in a 160°C oven until the pudding is golden and shiny.
- 5. Serve with creme anglaise and mascarpone dolloped on top.

MANY OF US DREAM OF LEAVING BEHIND THE 9 TO 5 WORK CYCLE. BUYING SOME LAND AND RECONNECTING WITH THE EARTH, BRILLIG FARM MARKET GARDENERS AND PARTNERS IN LIFE SAM COSTELLO AND ELISABETH CRAWFORD DID JUST THAT, THEY TELL ESH ABOUT THEIR GROWING LIVES.

Why the treechange? Sam: I worked in a university with a large team and was responsible for strategy and business systems. Elisabeth was part of student administration. We lived in the inner west under the Sydney flight path, and work and home was becoming busier and noisier. I started yearning for a clean, uncluttered, quiet life. When the kids finished school and were off, the time came to leave. How did you happen upon Brillig Farm? Elisabeth: Living in the Southern Highlands was a long held fantasy and we'd been looking for a while. We loved Exeter and started looking there specifically. The plan was to move here and develop some income streams, then transition out of the workforce. Growing things was definitely part of the plan, and we found a 20 acre block with great soil and dams, paddocks and trees. We wanted to have windows that looked out onto something green and far away. Was market gardening always the long held dream? Sam: Not at all! We did a

market gardening course a couple of years before making the move and decided it was too much hard work! Not long after moving here I took a redundancy and I was sitting in the Exeter General Store when I got an email offering a discount on an online urban farming course. Intensive farming in a small space seemed much more interesting than what I'd been planning. So I signed up and within two months we were selling produce at the Moss Vale farmers market. Why the name? Elisabeth: Brillig is from the poem Jabberwocky by Lewis Carroll. Basically it means whatever you want it to. We love the poem, and wanted a name that didn't come with other connotations. What do you grow? Sam: Thirteen

varieties of leafy greens, including microgreens, and many different varieties of radishes, beetroot, potatoes, turnips, tomatoes, carrots, pumpkins, herbs, edible flowers and garnishes. How did you find strong commercial footing in the Highlands so quickly? Elisabeth: We supply the restaurant trade and

we do a line of chemical free salad mix and microgreens to the consumer market through Exeter Village Markets and Berrima General Store Cafe. We had one customer tell us with tears in his eyes our beans tasted like when he was a child. Another said it was like eating at Tetsuya's. That's pretty special to us. Jill Dyson (On the Food Path and ESH food writer), Brigid Kennedy (The Loch & Southern Highlands Food Clusters) and Phil Lavers (Moonacres Farm) have been amazing in recommending and helping us get a good strong customer base. We wouldn't be where we are today without them. Some of your vegetables are exotic. How did that eventuate? Sam: Living in the city I'd never thought about





how limited the produce selection is in supermarkets. When we started farming I did a lot of research into what we would grow, and it didn't take me long to realise there is a cornucopia of food plants out there. So we started looking at plants that looked and tasted exciting and experimented. I love the idea of plants that were used historically as well as plants used by non western cultures. There is such a huge range of delicious edible plants out there used by millions of people over thousands of years and we're missing out. You are not organic but 'grow as if we were'. What does that mean? Sam: To get a tasty, nutritious, plant involves interactions from multiple systems: the soil, climate, insects, us. The choices we make as we grow impact positively or negatively on these systems, so we don't use anything that isn't approved as organic input. We keep tilling to a minimum. We brew up an amazing probiotic mixture of bacteria, yeast and fungus that boosts healthy soil biological activity. It sounds like a lot of hard work... Elisabeth: Our day really depends on the weather and time of year. In summer we work about 10 hours a day; we get up before dawn and work until it gets too hot then go back out until dusk. In winter it's kind of the opposite. We wait till the sun's up and the frost clears and then get to it. What are the discoveries you've made since moving here? Elisabeth: We completely lucked out on the soil here, it's very good. Sam has diligently transformed bare paddock into umpteen prolific growing beds and it's been a steep learning curve growing, building a business, nurturing a relationship and she's doing it superbly. I found the move pretty challenging, and it's taken me all this time to feel really present in this new lifestyle. It's brought a lot of joy to our lives. Sam: Elisabeth is brilliant at building solutions. She can build a bathroom out of a paperclip and a bit of 2 'x 4'. Here she's flourished and designed and built so many of our farm tools, it's incredible. Me, I always knew I could focus but here I really focus and persist. I've started to think of myself as a Welsh mountain pony: nothing flash but I just keep putting one foot in front of the other until it's done. Living in the city I was inside or, if outside, surrounded by structures and concrete. Here the sky is enormous and goes on and on, and changes all the time. The light shifts and changes tone. It's incredible. brilligfarm.com.au

EXOTIC PRODUCE FROM BRILLIG FARM

NIVITHI A vine from Sri Lanka and India with shiny red stems and thick glossy leaves. Grows like crazy in summer and a great addition to curries and stir fries. Use it instead of spinach in a spanakopita.

BLACK MINT A massive marigold that grows to 3 metres tall. We use this as a herb to flavour salads. It can also be made into a pesto with chilli, garlic and lime, and used as a marinade on white meat. The long, serrated leaves have an amazing citrus, minty, slightly pineapple flavour. Watching people's faces as they taste it is priceless.

MYOGA GINGER Native to Japan, China and Korea, this is a deciduous ginger. Unlike the traditional ginger it's the shoots and flowers that are eaten, not the rhizome. The tender crunchy shoots can be chopped and added raw to dishes. The shoots and flowers are often pickled in Japanese cuisine.

PURSLANE Native to Australia (and a bunch of other places). The variety we grow is upright and has long, fleshy, blunt leaves. We use them in our salad mix in summer.





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
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
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PINT TO **PADDOCK**

We love a good collaboration story at Escape SH, and every issue we try to highlight local makers, growers and producers doing exciting new things with fellow growers, chefs and makers.

> ■ake Fitzroy Falls farmers Katrina and Sam Sparke who own Redleaf Farm. Not the sort to sit back and let life take its turns, they are always on the front foot looking for ways to diversify, share knowledge, and improve the quality of their gold medal free range suckling pigs and lambs.

> As well as being busy with their animals, Katrina and Sam are simultaneously parenting four kids and accommodating visitors to the Highlands in two meticulously renovated train carriages on their property. Plus, now they are collaborating with brewers Jacob and Deb Newman at Eden Brewery in Mittagong, who are also partial to a bit of sharing.

'At Redleaf Farm we take Eden Brewery's waste product of spent grain and feed it to our suckling pigs,' Katrina tells ESH. 'It is highly nutritious, delicious and otherwise a problem to get rid of. The flavours and grains vary with each batch of beer, but at present we are feeding it to our piglets three days a week on average.'

Enter Cassie and Matt, new owners of Eschalot (see page 47), and loved Bowral restaurant Onesta Cucina.

'Both are big fans of our award winning piggies and know that what they eat does affect the taste of the meat,' says Katrina. 'It's lovely that these chefs choose to also pair the pork with the Eden beer, either in cooking or serving, completing a lovely circle of support and providing a unique food experience that is a win for all.'

Recently Eschalot has been serving the pickled piglets, along with Eden beer, in a dish made with macerated mandarins from another local grower. And Onesta Cucina is planning a 'drunk pork' dish using Eden beer, says Katrina, who also regularly supplies lamb and pork to Josh's Cafe at Berrima and BARN by biota.

'I am sure both will be amazingly delicious,' Katrina says, 'And as a local, a grower and a food lover, I think it's rare and special to be able to enjoy this level of transparency and provenance in our local produce. 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




eyond its natural beauty, the Southern Highlands is known for attracting artisans, farmers and producers with a passion to chase their dreams. Four years ago, retail liquor worker Matt Toomey declared to partner Siobhan Maloy his dream was to become a winemaker. Maloy, a school teacher loved the idea. She put together a shortlist of wineries to inspect and within weeks the couple found themselves wandering through the vines of Joadja Estate, just outside Berrima.

'This was the second winery we looked at,' says Matt, 'We saw it and fell in love with it.'


It's easy to see why. Joadja Estate is the region's oldest vineyard and has a relaxed charm that sits well with its artisan approach to winemaking. From the wisteria framed entrance opening onto a shady courtyard to the earthy hues of the cellar door, the historic estate is a delightful mix of family home, established winery and popular weekend

picnic spot. Matt and Siobhan (along with Siobhan's parents) became Joadja Estate's new owners and have maintained the vibe that encourages visitors to stay longer and return often.

Original owners Kim and Frances Moginie planted the region's first vines here more than three decades ago and started making wines that helped put the Southern Highlands on the map of Australian cool climate wine regions.

Since taking over in 2016, Matt and Siobhan have infused their own style, including the tasting room with a feature wall that invariably sparks conversation. Using the staves of discarded wine barrels, Matt spent countless hours seasoning the timber strips and fixing them individually to the wall to create an inspired work of upcycled art. Siobhan had a vision for the wine bottles and, with the help of a Texan based artist who happened to get in touch







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
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












Bonnum Pic, High Range

A 16km walk that goes to Bonnum Pic on the knife edge ridge that juts out into the Wollondilly Valley in Nattai National Park. Best in the cooler months, this walk has everything, including valley views, on and off track walking, rock scrambling and route finding. Great vistas. After Mittagong, take Wombeyan Caves Road and turn right into Wanganderry Road. Parking is at the end of the dirt road. The grade is easy to intermediate. Seven hours round trip.

Wombat Hill Lookout Trail, Meryla

This 13km walk begins at Meryla Pass in Morton National Park and follows the fire trail along the ridge with views towards Crankeys Creek and Lake Yarrunga overlooking Kangaroo Valley. Mixture of fire and rough off track. Easy to intermediate.

Dtharowal Creek and Missingham Steps, Robertson

This is an 8km return walk through Budderoo

National Park with a steep descent through rainforest to Dtharowal Creek and Lorna Doone's Pool via Missingham Steps (carved last century). It is a more challenging walk, graded as medium to hard.

Tooth's Walking Track to Bundanoon Creek, Bundanoon

A challenging 3km walk for those who are fit and don't mind a steep climb. It has spectacular views and an alluring swimming hole when you reach the creek level. The walk, for the experienced, begins at Tooth's Lookout. Allow 3 1/2 hours for the round trip.

Box Vale Walking Track, Mittagong

This 4km walk follows the historic railway line through the bush and cuttings. There is also a 1.8km track to 40 Foot Falls and a steep track that leads to a vantage point below the falls. The initial 4km is an easy walk but allow three hours.

Mount Jellore, High Range

An outstanding landmark in the Nattai National Park, Mount Jellore is reached via a 10km walk at the end of Soapy Flat Road off Wombeyan Caves Road. The walk follows a fire trail through private property and is very steep in some places but has spectacular views with a long, steep ascent and descent. A challenging walk for experienced walkers. Allow five hours.

Belmore Falls, Wildes Meadow

These beautiful waterfalls are accessible by a track near a cliff side, but please take care because it is not maintained by National Parks.

Amphitheatre Walk, Bundanoon

The three hour walk from Gambell's Rest travels through the Bundanoon gullies in Morton National Park and leads to Fairy Bower Falls. There is some steep stair climbing to do so reasonable fitness is required. **shb.org.au**



ON TWO WHEELS

If you prefer to ride, you can join the thousands of cyclists who descend on the Highlands every year to compete in races such as the Twin Falls Cottages Rare Cancers Australia Mountain Bike Challenge in May or the Bowral Classic in October. Local Zac Hulm, the president of the Southern Highlands Cycling Club and one of the organisers of the recent P2P Cycle Challenge and Kosi Climb (a 200km race from Parliament House in Canberra to Thredbo in the Snowy Mountains to raise money for Rare Cancers Australia), is a keen racer and rider shares his favourite road and mountain bike rides with Escape SH.

Road bikes for the pros

The Mount Gibraltar Hill Climb is used as part of the road championships. It is a challenging Cat 2 Climb that is both tough and scenic.


Greenhills Road represents all the Highlands has to offer in terms of challenging courses, with very little in the way of flat terrain. Comes in both summer (one lap) and winter (two laps) versions, and is often used as part of the Southern Division Interclub series of races.

Hanging Rock at Penrose has a Classics
Finish feel, with the final climb to the line
favouring those who like a solid climbing sprint.

Out at High Range the Wombeyan Caves Road features the same starting climb as that of Greenhills and then extended sections of rolling road that always feature a lot of Highlands wind.

Bundanoon is frequently used as the final race in the Southern Division Interclub series. It follows the Highland Way from Bundanoon to Tallong and back.

Another winter course, Canyonleigh is a challenging rolling road with short, punchy climbs. Almost always used as part of the Road Racing Championships, it demands attention and the ability to maintain a high amount of momentum for extended periods.



On the Track

The Eridge Park Velodrome in Burradoo is home of the Bowral Cup and the proving ground of many a young State and World track champion, including local hero Caleb Ewan. The outdoor velodrome is 333m in length with 30 degree banking and a smooth, grippy concrete surface.

Mountain Biking

Close to both Mittagong and Bowral, Welby is one of the few locations in the Highlands where riders can easily access single track riding

On the other side of the Highlands, Wingello State Forest is frequently used for mountain biking competitive events both short and long. Trails are well marked for a variety of abilities and are well maintained by club trail builders. The annual Willo Enduro takes place there on March 10 and the Shimano MTB Grand Prix happens there on May 18.

Located on the private grounds of Brad McGee's Twin Falls Bush Cottages in Fitzroy Falls is a ride that is frequently used as part of the National Series as well as various three hour events that operate within the area. It is the home of Rare Cancers Australian Mountain Bike Challenge on May 19 rarecancersaustralia.com.au southernhighlandscc.com.au

The Willo Endurance, Wingello

Another terrific bike event to get involved with this autumn. The Willo Enduro was started in memory of much loved local, keen mountain biker and editor of Enduro magazine James Williamson, who died in his sleep in 2010 from a previously undiagnosed heart condition. It is an annual race which attracts more than 500 riders to the Highlands, and this year is part of the XCM MTBA Mountain Bike Cup. Riders of all ages can choose to compete in 25km, 50km or 75km around a 25km loop in Wingello State Forest. All entry fees go back into local junior mountain bike development in the area and an annual training camp for juniors held every year in November. **Sunday March 10, Wingello State**

The Legendary Australia Wingello Forest Endurance Ride, Wingello

Endurance riding is a marathon sport on four legs and the annual Wingello Forest Endurance Ride is one of the largest endurance horse races held in Australia every year. Attracting a diversify range of riders (from competitive riders to the just starting out on a horse variety) choose from ride distances of 5km, 10km, 20km for beginners, 41km-61km for intermediate riders and 80km. Riders will race at speed for the first time on a new network of permanently marked horse trails our local Wingello State Forest. 



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

essica and Joel Spiteri met through music. Although now an insight analyst, at the time Joel was studying a Bachelor of Music (Education) in Sydney when he was set up by friends to attend a music concert where Jess was also expected. She welcomed us in her gumboots and gave us homemade jam made from kumquats from the beautiful tree we used as a backdrop for a few of the photos. As we walked around the grounds hearing her speak about how much she loved the place, we fell in love with it instantly. It was the only venue we looked at.' >







Joel agrees. 'The whole place, as well as Nadine and her partner, Seb, gave us an overall sense of calm and love, which suited our vibe perfectly. We loved how the beauty and grandness of the actual Somerley House was toned down by the leafy forests and slightly overgrown gardens. 'The reception was held in the Garden Room, which has beautiful high ceilings and is so effortlessly elegant.'

Marrying in the Highlands in autumn with its typical four seasons in one day has its challenges, but for Jess and Joel, the weather was all part of the charm.

'We both love everything autumn has to offer,' explains Joel. 'The colours are the most obvious beautiful thing but the hint of cool air is our idea of perfect. It's a season that reminds everyone of change and I think getting married is such a time of change, and it's nice to have that to reflect upon.'

As their big day approached, Jessica kept her eyes firmly on the weather forecast, determined to take whatever the heavens threw at them. And it delivered. 'Emerging from the forest and seeing each other in the wet setting was one of my favourite parts of the whole day,' says Jess. 'We didn't really adapt any plans for the weather. Jessica and her bridesmaids spent the night before the wedding in the Somerleys guesthouse. Their morning stroll was a highlight: 'It was absolutely beautiful with the light rain and mist mixed in with the smoke from the fireplace.'

The couple had put a lot of thought into having the perfect wedding, and many of their 80 guests travelled significant distances to get there. 'Jess has family who came across from New Zealand, which made it really special,' says Joel. 'We also had friends and family fly in from Victoria and the Northern Territory. It was great to have everyone we love so dearly in the same room for the first time!'We just wanted everyone to feel relaxed, not to have it as a formal event but rather a big love party.'

They personalised the day with lots of DIY touches. 'Jess, her mum and her bridesmaids went to a flower farm on the way down from Sydney to pick up fresh flowers for making their own bouquets. It was something nice to do the night before the ceremony, to get everyone involved.

DIGGING DEEP

WE SPOKE TO FRIENDS OF THE SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS BOTANIC GARDENS ABOUT THE SEED FOR THE NEW BOTANIC GARDENS IN BOWRAL AND HOW THE \$25 MILLION PLUS PROJECT IS GERMINATING.

Go to any major city or region around the world and you'll likely find botanic gardens as the horticultural and cultural centrepiece. Think New York's Botanical Gardens, London's Kew Gardens, Rio de Janeiro's Jardim Botanico, Sydney's Royal Botanical Gardens. Always beautiful, with rare and one of a kind plant life and displays, sprawling gardens and themed events, these public spaces are created to inspire and amaze. And we have the same hopes for the Southern Highlands' version, along with its visitors centre, explains Friend of the SHBG Lyn Collingridge.

When was the idea of a Southern Highlands Botanic Gardens first mooted and by whom?

The concept was first proposed by a group of local garden enthusiasts including our current board members Charlotte Webb and her husband, Chris Webb. The search for a suitable site took until 2010. The 15 hectare site, which sits on the corner of Old South Road and Kangaloon Road in East Bowral, was officially opened by then NSW Governor Marie Bashir in 2013 and the lease was signed with the Wingecarribee Council in June 2015.

How's it progressing?

Well it's a unique one because it is one of the few botanic gardens in Australia that is not funded by any government or council. It is a garden for the community and funded by the community. For this reason, it will take considerable time to raise the \$15 million needed to fully design and construct the garden. The visitors centre is also expected to cost approximately \$15 million. The sooner we can get funding, the sooner we will see our dream come true.

What is the grand vision for the gardens?

The design of the garden was done by Kate Cullity of Taylor Cullity Lethlean, who are award winning landscape architects from Adelaide. And John Wardle Architects won the competition we launched for the botanic gardens visitors centre. The garden will be a series of journeys through the landscapes and changing seasons of the cool climate Southern Highlands.

The design of the Town Garden, to be positioned near the new visitors centre, was inspired by the spontaneous and energetic paintings of local artistic statesman John Olsen, who also recently donated a beautiful sculpture to the gardens. This will include parterre hedging, ordered floral displays and an elevated Arbour Walk offering views into the parterre and beyond. ▶

The Country Garden is likened to a spacious garden estate with an expansive lawn, long vistas and serpentine walks.

The Meadow is a generous central lawn held on both sides by curvaceous sweeps of garden beds filled with seasonal perennials and sub shrubs. A water rill runs alongside the eastern edge of the lawn, a magnet for children's play.

The Woodland Walk is filled with exotic trees, shrubs and ground covers that create a semi enclosed lush garden walk.

The design of the Regional Garden, which will include a fern garden, is inspired by Louisa Atkinson, a botanical artist and environmentalist who lived in the Southern Highlands in the mid 19th century (see page 93). The chain of ponds has a serpentine boardwalk weaving through layers of indigenous woodland vegetation, including rare and endangered species.

Who are the Friends of SHBG?

To date there are more than 350 active local households who are Friends of the Garden. Everyone is a volunteer, except for one part time employee, the development manager, whose major focus along with the SHBG board is to raise the funds to build the garden and visitors centre.

Friends of the Garden help with working bees at the garden twice monthly. They complete minor construction and maintenance work, and propagating and growing plants for sale is a major task for volunteers.

How are you fundraising?

Mostly from events at present. Last year we raised \$200,000 from fundraising events and we estimated that last year volunteers also donated another \$200,000 in manpower. Generous local businesses also support by providing mulch, donating potting mix and fertiliser, giving discounted prices on skilled labour and so on. And Probus and Rotary are local community groups actively supporting us, along with many local garden clubs.

Another important source of income is grants. We are very active in submitting grant applications but at the rate of our funding to date, it will take a lifetime to complete the gardens so we are also actively working on other strategies to raise the necessary funds.

Recently, with the help of celebrity landscape gardener Charlie Albone, we launched an appeal for the Education Centre, to try and raise \$500,000 to build it, although that cost doesn't include the fit out. We are reaching out to the commity for help and support.

To date how many species of plants there?

About 500. These comprise 23 species of birch and 21 species of box, both of which have been registered on the National Plant Collections
Register. In addition there are three types of crepe myrtle and 56 trees, including eucalypts, oaks, tulip, crab apples, birch, maples, ash, dogwood, elm, ginkgo, nyssa, horst chestnut, chinese pistachio, tortured hazel, dwarf birch. There are also six types of hedging and lots of perennials.

How will the garden aim to share its botanical knowledge?

The two major purposes of the garden are recreational and educational, for both adults and children. Our children's education program has been kick started by a number of local schools, such as Bowral High and the Steiner School. Looking forward, our children's education program will provide learning in subjects such as biology, mathematics, art, photography, drama, environmental issues, climate and much more

Our adult education program, which presently encompasses propagation of plants, nurturing plants, and plant health and maintenance, will be expanded to

include information sessions on endangered and threatened species, some of which will be planted in our native garden. The garden is for the whole community to enjoy.

What will the SHBG bring to the region?

We really believe the gardens will become a major tourist attraction in the Southern Highlands and we estimate that, once fully constructed, will attract around 85,000 visitors each year. The gardens will also be a major venue for temporary and permanent sculpture exhibitions, and will be a centre for community events.

Careful number crunching has also shown the SHBG will bring significant economic benefits to the region, with the potential to deliver around 140 additional jobs and more than \$300 million over the next 15 years. The gardens will be a huge green space and one of the largest public parks in the Highlands, that will bring social, health and recreational benefits. **shbg.com.au**



Who was LOUISA ATKINSON?

Louisa Atkinson was an artist, author and a botanist. She was born in 1834 at historic property Oldbury in Sutton Forest, the site of SHBG's recent launch for its Education Centre appeal.

Louisa was reputedly the first born Australian female novelist, a noted naturalist and illustrator, naturist, ecologist, and one of our

earliest female journalists. She was also one of the first Australian writers to illustrate her own work.

Her novels, including Gertrude the Emigrant are among the first works to depict the lives of ordinary Australians, and her botanical finds were praised by eminent botanists. Several plants were named after her.

Louisa's granddaughter Janet Cosh grew up in Moss Vale and was also a recognised botanist and historian, who helped establish the Berrima District Historical Society in 1960. After her death in 1989, Janet's botanical records, drawings, watercolours and specimen collections were bequeathed to the University of Wollongong, where the Janet Cosh Herbarium was created in her honour. Fitzroy Falls Visitors Centre named the Janet Cosh Room to honour the legacy of this quiet and unassuming woman who did much to advance local history and the district's botanical record, and who followed in some of the steps of her grandmother, Louisa Atkinson. Much of Louisa Atkinson's work is in the State Library of NSW.

Convict Ancestry Heritage Festival, Harper's Mansion, Berrima

Harper's Mansion, the lovely Georgian building that overlooks Berrima, was built by Australian born James Harper and his freed convict wife Mary in 1834 and is now run by a dedicated local team for The National Trust. This autumn the important building will be the site of a heritage festival among the acres of English gardens, heritage roses and one of the largest hedge mazes in the Southern Highlands, and visitors will be encouraged to commemorate any convict ancestors on the convict tree. There will also be a display of convict bonnets, lent by the local chapter of the Fellowship of First Fleeters, as well as convict bricks, leg irons and clay pipes, and the stories of convicts and ex convicts who established themselves in the Berrima area. To tie in with the inaugural Irish Heritage Festival (see right), Harper's Mansion will also highlight the exploits of Irish locals such as publicans Michael Doyle and Bryan McMahon, storekeeper James Jerome Higgins, the McCurdy family and several others who came from the Emerald Isle to begin life in the new colony.

Annabelle Chauncy is the sort of person you would love your child to emulate. Founder of the School for Life which educates hundreds of children in Uganda, Annabelle was raised in Cayonleigh. She talks to ESH about hard work, the value of education and bringing purpose to your life.

You grew up in Canyonleigh? I had the most amazing childhood on a sheep and cattle farm with my mum, dad and two brothers. It was filled with outdoor adventures like building cubby houses in the trees, planting vegie gardens, riding my Shetland pony and motorbikes, and helping Dad with work in the sheep and cattle yards. Do you still have family connections there? Mum and Dad still live there and my brother and sister-in-law have a property in Sutton Forest. My grandma, who was a big influence, is in a nursing home in the Highlands. She contracted polio as a child and was told she would never walk again, ride horses or have children. She defied all the odds with her determination and resilience. She had two children, she rode horses and she walked. No one was going to get in her way! She also has a Medal of the Order of Australia for her service to people with disabilities. Where did the desire to do something remarkable with your life come from? I come from a family with strong values of respect, hard work, integrity, grit and positivity. I knew that nothing worth having comes easy and that you can't expect things to happen without hard work and determination. Mum has been my teacher throughout my life, starting at the tiny Sutton Forest Primary School. I then went to Frensham as a weekly boarder. Mum had a job at Gib Gate and Frensham while I was there. She's still there now. Frensham was absolutely instrumental in me setting up School for Life. Its motto is 'In Love Serve One Another'. How did School for Life begin? When I left Frensham I ended up studying Arts/Law but found it difficult to find purpose in my legal studies. I worked part time in a law firm and knew then I wasn't going

to be passionate about a career as a lawyer. So I signed up to a three month volunteer program teaching English to children in Kenva. It changed my life. I taught English (badly!) to children who spoke only Swahili, witnessed pure joy from children who have absolutely nothing, and saw the deep values of community and sharing from people who would literally give you the shirt off their back. When did you think, 'I have to do something!'? I was teaching English to children in a mud hut with a scratched out blackboard and no pens or pencils. The kids didn't have uniforms, books or desks. Many had walked up to 15 kilometres with no shoes on and an empty stomach to get there. But they did so with smiles on their faces and determination. They wanted to be educated. I knew in that moment that I could use my time. talent and networks to do something to help others. I realised my law degree was about something so much bigger. What does School for Life look like today? We currently have two primary schools and one high school in Uganda. We are educating 680 students and about to enrol another 320. We are also in the early stages of partnering with another amazing organisation operating in Uganda with the same model. Our schools are holistic community development models, and include provision for clean water, health care. vocational training and employment opportunities to lift entire communities out of poverty. I would love to see School for Life educating 10,000 kids across the developing world in at least 30 schools. How do the schools help the communities? We employ 78 full time staff: teachers, nurses, counsellors, cooks, cleaners, and maintenance, security and support staff, plus 50 extra part time staff when we are building. All of these staff are Ugandan, with as many from the local area as possible. We also provide scholarships to four

staff a year to go back to university for upskilling. You have achieved many accolades for your work, including an Order of Australia. The awards are beautiful acknowledgements of the hard work I put into School for Life, but for me it's about the children. I see tangible and real change with the dollars I raise. It is remarkable to see a child learn who otherwise may have been pregnant aged 13, or working on the family's subsistence farm. How do you find work/life balance? It can be a struggle, but I try to dedicate weekends to spending time with my partner. Marc. and my family and friends. Marc and I met when he volunteered to upskill our foreman on the construction site in Uganda. He believes in School for Life and the difference we are making, which makes it easy. When you're home in the Highlands where do you always like to visit? I'm partial to a delicious Gumnut Patisserie sausage roll or lemon citron cake. I love supporting locals. I am always excited when I see small businesses succeed due to hard work and determination. Highlands Merchant in Moss Vale is a personal fave. And Suzie Anderson Home. How can we help support School for Life? The best thing is to sponsor a child for \$42 a month. Our charity is so small that the money makes a remarkable difference in the life of the child and their family. We also have a Mount Kosciuszko climb on April 7 which is a great opportunity to get your family fit whilst fundraising, and our 10 Year Anniversary Gala will be held on May 4 at The Star in Sydney. What is your message to Australian children? You are one person but one person can make a difference. We all have the ability to create positive change. schoolforlife.org.au



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


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


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IN MY BACKYARD

Vigneron Mark Bourne is owner and founder of Cuttaway Hill Wines and, until recently, president of Southern Highlands Food and Wine Association. Now keeping busy with the NSW Wine Industry Association and the National Wine and Grape Industry Centre at Charles Sturt University, Mark talks to ESH about bugs, the local industry and jobs still to do.

y wife Debra and I moved to the Highlands in 1996. We moved from Walgett in northern NSW where Debra was a teacher and I taught at TAFE helping kids who weren't suited to school to find a job. Debra's family had a property, Giruvian Park on Old South Road in Mittagong, and we started planting eight acres of chardonnay, cabernet and semillon blanc.


I had always been interested in horticulture, and I'd worked as a tree surgeon for a bit. We arrived before the boom in cool climate viticulture, and were only about the fourth vineyard here. There was only Joadja, Ealing Forest, Howards Lane and us. Our two daughters, who are now aged 22 and 20, both grew up on the vineyard. It was a big life change.

I suppose we were ahead of the curve before the boom in the wine industry in Australia. The industry really took off from the late 1990s to the early 2000s when the big planting boom took place in Australia. It was basically driven by tax offset incentives, and there was a program to plant so many plants in Australia within 20 years. I think they reached the figure in eight years.

When we started there was no cohesion between wine growers here, so in 1998 we formed the Southern Highlands Vignerons Association. That meant we could start planning with a shared vision, but first we had two big jobs to get done. The first was to get the Southern Highlands recognised as a wine region, because no one knew there were even grapes growing here.

In actual fact, there are historic records of vines being first grown out near Mandemar on the site of what was to become Tertini, and Joadja Vineyards celebrates its 32nd birthday this year. So we had our region defined as a high altitude cool climate region. That is basically 500 metres and above in the Wingecarribee Shire, and today our region is recognised around the world.

The second big job was to get the region declared as a phylloxera free region. Phylloxerae are nasty little aphid pests that are devastating vineyards around the world. It's endemic and it's very expensive because you can't take grapes out of a phylloxera affected area, or take machinery out. You are basically under quarantine. So it's a huge restriction on trade.



There are 18 cellar doors in the Southern Highlands open every weekend. There are still a few vineyards who don't have cellar doors but the region remains boutique sized and family owned.

People often get confused about the difference between a vineyard and a winery. A vineyard is where the grapes are grown and a winery is where production or sales take place. Local wineries are Southern Highlands Wines, Joadja Estate, Ealing Forest, Centennial, Tertini and Artemis.

Here at Cuttaway Hill we have 15 acres under cultivation and we generally grow pinot noir, semillon blanc, chardonnay, pinot gris, cabernet and merlot. The grape production is one facet of the vineyard, but there's much more involved of course. It's the site, the grapes, the climate and the soils that determine the quality of the grapes and the wine, and there's a huge difference in local wines, from grapes grown at the top of the hill to grapes grown at the bottom, and so on. It's a combination of how you manage the vines, as well as the soil and climate, so each label

has its own microclimate. The French call it 'terroir'.


I've heard talk over the years that winemakers in the region don't really get on but that's never been the case. It's Southern Highlands gossip. We are not in competition but rather in the same boat and we work together well to attract more visitors and wine drinkers to our region. I think it's safe to say we share that common goal, and we've still got work to do.

Last year, for the first time, the Southern Highlands hosted the NSW Wine Awards. It was an important step for us and has helped bring credibility and focus to our region. For the awards, 16 judges tasted 900 wines from all over NSW. It's the most subjective system you can get because it's totally blind. The judges sit there with a blank glass in front of them with a number on it. It's quite a humbling thing to get your wine judged in the show system, objectively in a line up with all the same style wines. It's a great leveller.

Cuttaway Hill was the first vineyard to plant pinot noir here and we were the first people to make sparkling wine here with traditional methods (the bottle you buy it in is the bottle it's made) in 17 years ago. Centennial, Artemis, Cherry Tree and Tertini are all making some great sparklings here too now, so it's got a very strong future around here. It's a premium product that suits a premium region like ours.
