

What makes a good wedding photo and are some couples harder to shoot than others? A great photo makes the viewer feel they were there, with the couple. It conveys that sense of joy present at weddings while also being really lovely to look at. Some couples are more relaxed in front of the camera while some are a little nervous, and say they feel very unphotogenic. However, it's those couples, who don't think they photograph well who are actually my favourite to shoot.

What are your favourite SH locations? There are so many venues I love with such a diverse range of styles that I honestly can't list my favourites. What I do LOVE is the fields, forests and paddocks we have. Incredible options for photos.

Got a favourite season to get married here? Autumn! Soft golden sunlight, cooler days, delicious colours in the trees.

Shooting a wedding looks like hard work. What's always your biggest concern? It is hard work but I remind myself that I'm not performing open heart surgery so there are tougher jobs. My biggest concern is the 'juggling act' as photographers are at the mercy of different elements, many out of our control. Things like locations, timing, weather, the chemistry of couples. And that, despite these ever changing factors, which all have an affect on our final images, we must deliver a top-quality product for which we've been paid. It's tough but also a wonderful challenge.

What's one wedding that always sticks in your mind?

I shot a wedding at the incredible venue, Mali Brae Farm a few years ago. The bride's grandmother came to the wedding in a patient transport vehicle as she was permanently in bed and couldn't walk. The ceremony was in a spot that required some walking and grandma's vehicle couldn't access it. Greg, the owner, literally dug up and removed part of the fence to allow the vehicle to get through so granny could be at the ceremony. She watched the whole thing from the comfort of her hospital bed. It was a wonderful thing to see, and a true reminder of what's important at weddings.

Wedding Celebrant Diana Kelly

Why a marriage celebrant? Flattery!

I became a celebrant four years ago when one of our venue owners suggested I would make a good one! It wasn't too long before I found myself sitting in a training course in Canberra, and I loved it from day one. I worked as a television and theatre



producer for years which gave me a great understanding of how people can react in stressful and stimulating situations. I love to be able to hold their hand or lead the way.

What makes a good wedding ceremony, and are some couples harder to marry than others?

I always try to ensure the ceremonies I do are personal and totally reflective of who the couple are; it can only be their ceremony. I never presume or apply a "one for all" approach. If a couple doesn't know exactly what they want at the time you meet with them, they usually know what they don't want once they see it on paper with the first draft. Every couple is different and I love that.

Favourite marrying locations here? The Southern Highlands is a unique location because of its natural beauty and seasons and all our venues offer something different and special. For me it's all about the atmosphere created. Capture the love in the room and the ceremony will be all the more memorable and beautiful.

Favourite season to utter those famous words, "by the power vested in me"...? Winter. There is something special about winter in the Highlands and what can be conjured up with colours, flowers and candlelight! So romantic.

Is there one particular wedding that always sticks in your mind? It was my very first actually. They were a great young couple, first marriage for both but we just connected on our first meeting. I was very nervous of course and it remains one of the biggest weddings I have ever done but it all came together on the day. It was very special. Another one that sticks in my mind was for two friends. They hired Kangaloon Hall, and had a bagpipe player and we held the ceremony on the stage which was decorated like a forest setting. It was such a happy, fun and crazy wedding. I shall never forget it.

What makes a good wedding feast? When we married, we chose a cocktail reception and we love this style as it is elegant yet informal with plenty of food. 14 courses all up! Why a florist? I have a BA in Set & Costume Design for Film & Theatre, which turned out to be a fantastic foundation for wedding design. I felt really passionate about creating beautiful things and found myself getting frustrated with compromising aesthetics for practicalities. I threw myself into a floristry course and never looked back. I come from a long line of watercolour artists and garden designers so I think it's in my blood.

What do flowers bring to a wedding, and what's the secret to amazing flowers? Flowers absolutely establish the mood in a space and bring about a sense of occasion. Flowers bring life to an old stone church and transform a restaurant into a reception. My top industry insider tip is to use the flowers when they're at their absolute best. The more open and voluminous, the more fragrant and frankly more value for money. Sometimes that means day four or five.

Do you have favourite flowers for the different seasons in the Highlands? Oh absolutely! I love to draw inspiration from the changing seasons and whenever possible use locally seasonally grown product. For spring weddings, I love to use delicate Lily of the Valley, Forget Me Nots, fragrant Lilac, everyone's favourite - Peonies. Summer often calls for bigger blowsier blooms such as Dahlias, hydrangeas, heavy garden roses, vast

foliage branches. I love incorporating dried botanicals into late summer weddings. Autumn is divine in the Highlands, faded late summer roses, Japanese maple, berry laden branches. Winter evokes a more sculptural aesthetic and dramatic blooms, flowering magnolia branches, decadent parrot tulips, hellebores, dramatic black centre anemones.

Installations seem to be big news – does bigger mean better? I will always advocate for quality over quantity. That being said, the Highlands is the destination for luxury weddings and installations like the beautiful ones we create at venues such as Bendooley Estate are fast becoming the norm. A statement arch installation or ceiling dripping with blooms will guarantee the wow facture and ooze romance and glamour.

If you had to choose one wedding flower, what would it be? Roses because they're so versatile, virtually available year round and the variety is amazing. Sweet lace cluster roses. Fragrant David Austin's and heritage varieties. Wild climbing roses like Cecile Brunner. Voluptuous imported blooms purposely bred in the most perfect toffee, latte and champagne tones. 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
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rnithorynchus anatinus is a curious creature. This iconic Australian monotreme with its duck bill, beaver tail and webbed feet so confounded the first Europeans to examine a specimen, they judged it a hoax, believing it several animals sewn together

Taxonomy aside, the publicity shy platypus (Mulunggang in the local Gundungurra and Ngunnawal languages) can trace its lineage to prehistoric times and is particular about its habitat. Freshwater rivers throughout Tasmania and along the east and southeast coast of Australia, such as the Wollondilly River in our own backyard, are their lifeblood. Roger Fagan totally gets this. Seventeen years ago when Roger, 76, first laid eyes on his 80 hectare property at Paddys River with its three kilometres of pristine river frontage, he also knew this was the perfect home for him

"I had always dreamed of having river frontage because when there is a drought and the dams run dry and you haven't got any water, the river keeps on flowing," Roger says. "The estate agent drove me down to the river that day and I said 'where do I sign'?" Owner of a company which manufacturers camping trailers, in 2015 Roger handed control to his son, made the move permanently to Paddys Creek and started Platypus Valley

Today his secluded property has 15 different camp sites scattered along the river. One site has power while others have hot showers and long drop compost loos. All have fire pits and there are BBQs. There is a bush hut which sleeps two and a


homestead which sleeps more than 14. With pets welcome and motorbikes and quads not, this camping retreat has proved the perfect way to bankroll his and partner Nikki's retirement.

"We are so busy at the moment which is fabulous given the past few months we've all had. All our camp sites are booking up before long weekends and the Cliff House at Platypus Gorge has

I'm here with my eldest teenager for a midweek stay. The promise of spotting a platypus did it for me. The teenager is happy at the promise of WiFi.

These are the traditional lands of the Gundungurra and Ngunnawal peoples. In 1818 Charles Throsby, surveyor James Meehan and Hamilton Hume crossed Paddys River from Moss Vale in the hope of finding a road to the coast and Jervis Bay. Our trip is easier. It takes 30 minutes from Moss Vale out across the Hume Highway, past Cayonleigh and onto the rich grazing paddocks of Paddys River. The last part of the trip is via dirt road and prone to flooding so leave the Porsche at home and bring the 4WD instead

Perched high on a cliff, the Cliff House barn conversion is tucked away from all other campers. It is also toasty warm thanks to a wood heater. Inside an open plan kitchen and living atrium opens onto three bedrooms, two with queen beds and fabulous views over the Wollondilly and the other with two singles. There is also a queen sofa bed. Linen and towels are supplied. There are basic essentials like tea and coffee provided but you'll need everything else foodwise. It's 20 minutes away to Sutton Forest

Nothing added, nothing taken away

Winemaker Tony Zafirakos has taken inspiration from his father's lifelong hobby and turned it into a natural growing business.

rowing up the son of Greek migrants in Sydney in the 1980s, Tony Zafirakos realised the wine his parents drank didn't look much like other wine. As his friends' parents sipped clear, yellow chardonnays and lighter rieslings, Ari and Anthea Zafirakos' chosen tipples were cloudy, brightly coloured and always homemade.

"I vividly remember end of season soccer barbecues where Dad would take along these clear glass bottles," says vintner Tony, who started Ari's Natural Wine Co in 2017, now based in Sutton Forest.

"The bottles were always clear because Dad needed to see where the sediment was sitting, and the wine inside was always this really strong yellowy orange colour. Our wine never looked like shop bought wine but I also remember other parents being amazed with it."

Natural wines are part of a growing global movement, produced without the use of synthetic chemicals.

"The basic principle of natural winemaking is nothing added, nothing taken away, is what's generally said," says Tony. "The flavour and nose are very distinctive compared to traditional wine production, where the skins of the grapes are pressed off. Natural winemaking involves leaving the skins on the grapes and letting them stay in contact with the juice for a certain period of time."

Sales of natural wines are booming globally, with millennials especially concerned about the environment and what goes into their wine glass. Every part of Tony's winemaking process is done by hand, with no electricity or pumps. All his wine is wild fermented, unfiltered and unfined, which means its coloured is not clarified by filtration. Also, sulphur is not added at any stage. "Dad always made his wine without adding anything or taking anything away, including the skins from the grapes. He did everything by hand, and we helped."

Ari arrived in Australia alone as a 17 year old in 1962. He returned to his homeland often over the next 15 years, where he met and married Anthea. In 1983 the couple moved to Coogee, where they raised three children.

"Mum and Dad both grew up in villages in Greece where people grow up knowing how to grow their own vegies, make bread, forage for edible weeds and ferment wine," says Tony, 35.
"By the time I came along in 1984, my parents had already started doing the whole home-wine operation thing because Dad missed it from his childhood.

"He would go out to the markets in western Sydney each year in March or April and come home with buckets full of grapes, which we would all stomp in the backyard. Then those buckets would be moved to the garage for fermentation, and when the



wine was ready, Dad would bottle it and move the bottles to a little sandstone cellar he built under the house until they were ready to drink."

Growing up, tasting the first of Ari's bottles became a celebration for family and friends, says Tony.

"There was always an open policy in our house that any family or friends could have the wine for free. But over the years, natural wine started becoming a thing and my friends said, 'You should put a price on this', because as soon as Dad would bottle, we'd keep some for ourselves but the rest would get snapped up."

In 2013, Ari and Anthea retired to Bowral. Tony, then a graphic designer with his own agency in Sydney, began to spend more time in the Southern Highlands with his parents.

"I fell in love with the area and wanted to spend more time here because I found the open space so inspiring and I've always loved the countryside so I was inspired to begin."

In 2016, he decided to make a major life change and started winemaking full-time.

"Natural wines were really starting to become a thing and my friends were all in my ear to give it a go so I took some time off from work. I started Ari's Natural Wine Co in honour of my Dad and decided to go for it. I've never looked back."

Between his 2016, 2017 and 2018 vintages, Tony spent time in Italy and Germany with natural winemakers who are gaining international recognition: Michael Völker at 2naturkinder in Kitzingen, Bavaria, and Jacopo Battista at Ajola winery in Orvieto, Umbria.

"As a winemaker, you probably do only 30 to 40 vintages in a lifetime so I think going overseas doubled my experience and

learning curve," says Tony.

Determined to source fruit within a three-hour radius, initially Tony started buying grapes from Marist Brothers Wines in Mittagong. When production stopped there, he found Willow Vale vineyard, a small local affair near Mittagong. He also sourced gapes from Hill Top, Marulan, Goulburn and Canowindra. This year, due to the bushfires and the damage to local grapes, Tony bought from Ricca Terra vineyards in South Australia.

Ari's Natural Wines' core range is named after the colour spectrum of naked wines. There's a Big Red, Little Red, Pink Orange and Whiteish, as well as five other varieties including three natural sparklings referred to as Petillant Naturel, or Pet-Nats. The wines are available online or locally at Moonacres Kitchen, Robertson or BIRCH, Moss Vale. Tony also supplies bars and restaurants nationally and in South Korea and Japan.

Last year production moved to friends' property at Rockaway Farm, Sutton Forest, and Tony also credits fellow Exeter winemakers Michael and Katrina Archer of Dawning Day for their help. Now planting for next year's vintage, he says Ari and Anthea are always on hand to give advice and taste test.

"For Dad, taking his hobby full-time was too difficult when I was growing up," says Tony. "He was a taxi driver for 40 years and although he sometimes talked about doing it, he had three children and a family to support so it wasn't easy. It's nice we all get to share in this today."

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


